This appliance is supplied with a molded three pin mains plug for your safety and convenience. A 13 amp fuse is fitted in this plug. Should the fuse need to be replaced, please ensure that the replacement fuse has a rating of 13 amps and that it is approved by ASTA or BSI to BS1362.

Check for the ASTA mark 0 or the BSI mark 0 on the body of the fuse.

If the plug contains a removable fuse cover, you must ensure that it is refitted when the fuse is replaced. If you lose the fuse cover, the plug must not be used until a replacement cover is obtained. A replacement fuse cover can be purchased from an Authorized Service Center.

If the fitted molded plug is unsuitable for the mains socket in your home, then the fuse should be removed and the plug cut off and disposed of safely. There is a danger of severe electrical shock if the cut off plug is inserted into any 13 amp socket.

If a new plug is to be fitted, please observe the wiring code as shown below. If in any doubt, please consult a qualified electrician.

The wire which is colored BROWN must be connected to the terminal in the plug which is marked with the letter L or colored RED.

How to replace the fuse: Open the fuse compartment with a screwdriver and replace the fuse.



## ■ Hazard distance (IEC 62471-5:2015)

The distance from the projection lens surface, at which the level of exposure has reached the level of the applicable Exposure Limit Value, is known as the hazard distance (HD) or safety distance.

Do not look into the projected light from inside the hazard distance (within RG3 range). The eyes may be damaged by the direct irradiation. It is considered to be safe to look into the projected light from outside the hazard distance (within RG2 range).



## Risk group

The combination of the projector and the projection lens is categorized as the risk group 2 when the hazard distance is less than 1 m (39-3/8"). It is categorized as the risk group 3 when the hazard distance exceeds 1 m (39-3/8"), and it will be for professional use instead of consumer use.

In case of risk group 3, there is a possibility of damaging the eyes by direct irradiation when looking into the projection light from inside the hazard distance (within RG3 range).

In case of risk group 2, it can be used safely without damaging the eyes in any condition.

Combinations with any projection lens are categorized as risk group 2 for this projector.

## WARNING:

## POWER

## The wall outlet or the circuit breaker shall be installed near the equipment and shall be easily accessible when problems occur. If the following problems occur, cut off the power supply immediately.

Continued use of the projector in these conditions will result in fire or electric shock, or will cause visual impairment.

- If foreign objects or water get inside the projector, cut off the power supply.
- If the projector is dropped or the cabinet is broken, cut off the power supply.
- If you notice smoke, strange smells or noise coming from the projector, cut off the power supply. Please contact an Authorized Service Center for repairs, and do not attempt to repair the projector yourself.

## During a thunderstorm, do not touch the projector or the cable.

Electric shocks can result.

#### Do not do anything that might damage the power cord or the power plug.

If the power cord is used while damaged, electric shocks, short-circuits or fire will result.

• Do not damage the power cord, make any modifications to it, place it near any hot objects, bend it excessively, twist it, pull it, place heavy objects on top of it or wrap it into a bundle.

Ask an Authorized Service Center to carry out any repairs to the power cord that might be necessary.

#### Do not use anything other than the provided power cord.

Failure to observe this will result in electric shocks or fire. Please note that if you do not use the provided power cord to ground the device on the side of the outlet, this may result in electric shocks.

#### **Completely insert the power plug into the wall outlet and the power connector into the projector terminal.** If the plug is not inserted correctly, electric shocks or overheating will result.

• Do not use plugs which are damaged or wall outlets which are coming loose from the wall.

#### Do not handle the power plug and power connector with wet hands.

Failure to observe this will result in electric shocks.

#### Do not overload the wall outlet.

If the power supply is overloaded (ex., by using too many adapters), overheating may occur and fire will result.

#### Clean the power plug regularly to prevent it from becoming covered in dust.

Failure to observe this will cause a fire.

- If dust builds up on the power plug, the resulting humidity can damage the insulation.
- If not using the projector for an extended period of time, pull the power plug out from the wall outlet.
- Pull the power plug out from the wall outlet and wipe it with a dry cloth regularly.

## ■ ON USE/INSTALLATION

#### Do not place the projector on soft materials such as carpets or sponge mats.

Doing so will cause the projector to overheat, which can cause burns, fire or damage to the projector.

## Do not set up the projector in humid or dusty places or in places where the projector may come into contact with oily smoke or steam.

Using the projector under such conditions will result in fire, electric shocks or deterioration of components. Oil may also distort the plastic and the projector could fall such as when mounted on the ceiling.

## Do not install this projector in a place which is not strong enough to take the full weight of the projector or on top of a surface which is sloped or unstable.

Failure to observe this will cause projector to fall down or tip over the projector, and severe injury or damage could result.

#### Do not install the projector in a location where people pass through.

People may bump into the projector or trip on the power cord, which may result in fire, electric shock, or injury.

#### Do not cover the air intake/exhaust ports.

Doing so will cause the projector to overheat, which can cause fire or damage to the projector.

- Do not place the projector in narrow, badly ventilated places.
- Do not place the projector on cloth or papers, as these materials could be drawn into the air intake port.
- Provide at least 1 m (39-3/8") of space between any walls or objects and the exhaust port, and at least 50 cm (19-11/16") of space between any walls or objects and the intake port.

## WARNING:

Do not look at or place your skin into the light emitted from the lens while the projector is being used. Do not enter the projection luminous flux using an optical device (such as magnifier or mirror). Doing so can cause burns or loss of sight.

- Strong light is emitted from the projector's lens. Do not look at or place your hands directly into this light.
- Be especially careful not to let young children look into the lens. In addition, turn off the power and disconnect the power plug when you are away from the projector.

#### Do not project an image with the lens cover attached.

Doing so can cause fire.

#### Never attempt to remodel or disassemble the projector.

High voltages can cause fire or electric shocks.

• For any inspection, adjustment and repair work, please contact an Authorized Service Center.

## Do not allow metal objects, flammable objects, or liquids to enter inside of the projector. Do not allow the projector to get wet.

Doing so may cause short circuits or overheating, and result in fire, electric shock, or malfunction of the projector.

- Do not place containers of liquid or metal objects near the projector.
- If liquid enters inside of the projector, consult your dealer.
- Particular attention must be paid to children.

#### Use the ceiling mount bracket specified by Panasonic.

Using the ceiling mount bracket other than the specified one will result in falling accidents.

• Attach the supplied safety cable to the ceiling mount bracket to prevent the projector from falling down.

## Installation work such as mounting the projector on the ceiling should only be carried out by a qualified technician.

If installation is not carried out and secured correctly, it can cause injury or accidents, such as electric shocks.

### ACCESSORIES

#### Do not use or handle the batteries improperly, and refer to the following.

Failure to observe this will cause burns, batteries to leak, overheat, explode or catch fire.

- Do not use unspecified batteries.
- Do not charge dry cell batteries.
- Do not disassemble dry cell batteries.

## ON USE/INSTALLATION

#### Do not place heavy objects on top of the projector.

Failure to observe this will cause the projector to become unbalanced and fall, which could result in damage or injury. The projector will be damaged or deformed.

#### Do not put your weight on this projector.

You could fall or the projector could break, and injury will result.

• Be especially careful not to let young children stand or sit on the projector.

#### Do not place the projector in extremely hot locations.

Doing so will cause the outer casing or internal components to deteriorate, or result in fire.

• Take particular care in locations exposed to direct sunlight or near heaters.

## Do not place your hands in the openings beside the optical lens, while shifting the lens.

Failure to observe this could cause injury.

#### **Do not install the projector in a location where salt pollution or corrosive gas may occur.** Doing so may result in falling due to corrosion. Also, it may result in malfunctions.

#### Do not stand in front of the lens while the projector is being used.

- Doing so can cause damage and burns to clothing.
- Strong light is emitted from the projector's lens.

#### Do not place objects in front of the lens while the projector is being used.

#### Do not block the projection by placing an object in front of the projection lens.

- Doing so can cause fire, damage to an object, or malfunction of the projector.
- Strong light is emitted from the projector's lens.

#### Always disconnect all cables before moving the projector.

Moving the projector with cables still attached can damage the cables, which will cause fire or electric shocks to occur.

#### Never plug headphones and earphones into <VARIABLE AUDIO OUT> terminal.

Excessive sound pressure from headphones and earphones can cause hearing loss.

## When mounting the projector on the ceiling, keep mounting screws and power cord from contact with metal parts inside the ceiling.

Contact with metal parts inside the ceiling can cause electric shocks.

## When not using the projector for an extended period of time, remove the batteries from the remote control.

Failure to observe this will cause the batteries to leak, overheat, catch fire or explode, which may result in fire or contamination of surrounding area.

### MAINTENANCE

#### Do not attach the air filter unit while it is wet.

Doing so may result in electric shock or malfunctions.

• After you clean the air filter units, dry them thoroughly before reattaching them.

## Ask your dealer about cleaning inside the projector every 20 000 hours of usage as an estimated duration.







Fig. 1 Como isolar os terminais





# Chapter 1 **Preparation**

This chapter describes things you need to know or check before using the projector.


## **Precautions for use**

## Lens protection material

If you purchased the projector with the standard zoom lens, remove the lens protection material before use, and store it for the future use. Move the lens position to the home position and attach the lens protection material when transporting.

If you purchased the projector with the lens sold separately, remove the lens hole cover before use, and store it for the future use. Move the lens position to the home position, remove the projection lens, and attach the lens hole cover when transporting.

For the steps to move the lens position to the home position, refer to "Moving the lens position to the home position" (+ page 69).



## **Cautions when transporting**

- When transporting the projector, hold it securely by its bottom and avoid excessive vibration and impacts. They may damage the internal components and result in malfunctions.
- Do not transport the projector with the adjustable feet extended. Doing so may damage the adjustable feet.

## Cautions when installing

#### Do not set up the projector outdoors.

The projector is designed for indoor use only.

#### Do not set up the projector in the following locations.

- Places where vibration and impacts occur such as in a car or vehicle: Doing so may cause damage to internal components or malfunction.
- Location close to sea or where corrosive gas may occur: The projector may fall due to corrosion. Also, failure to do so may shorten the life of the components and result in malfunction.
- Near the exhaust of an air conditioner: Depending on the conditions of use, the screen may fluctuate in rare cases due to the heated air from the air exhaust port or the hot or cooled air from the air conditioner. Make sure that the exhaust from the projector or other equipment, or the air from the air conditioner does not blow toward the front of the projector.
- Places with sharp temperature fluctuations such as near lights (studio lamps): Doing so may shorten the life of the light source, or result in deformation of the projector due to heat, which may cause malfunctions. Follow the operating environment temperature of the projector.
- Near high-voltage power lines or near motors: Doing so may interfere with the operation of the projector.

#### Ask a qualified technician or your dealer for the installation work such as installing to a ceiling, etc.

To ensure projector performance and safety, ask a qualified technician or your dealer when installing to a ceiling or in a high place.

## Ask a qualified technician or your dealer to install the cable wiring for DIGITAL LINK connection.

Image and sound may be disrupted if cable transmission characteristics cannot be obtained due to inadequate installation.

### The projector may not work properly due to strong radio wave from the broadcast station or the radio.

If there is any facility or equipment which outputs strong radio waves near the installation location, install the projector at a location sufficiently far from the source of the radio waves. Or, wrap the LAN cable connected to the <DIGITAL LINK/LAN> terminal using a piece of metal foil or a metal pipe which is grounded at both ends.

## Focus adjustment


The high clarity projection lens is thermally affected by the light from the light source, making the focus unstable in the period just after switching on the power. It is recommended that images be projected continuously for at least 30 minutes before the focus is adjusted.

## Do not install the projector at an altitude of 2 700 m (8 858') or higher above sea level.

## Do not use the projector in a location that the ambient temperature exceeds 45 °C (113 °F).

Using the projector in a location that the altitude is too high or the ambient temperature is too high may reduce the life of the components or result in malfunctions.




### Cautions when setting up the projector

- Use the adjustable feet only for the floor standing installation and for adjusting the angle. Using them for other purposes may damage the projector.
- When installing the projector with a method other than the floor installation using the adjustable feet or the ceiling installation, use the four screw holes for ceiling mount (as shown in the figure) to fix the projector. (Screw diameter: M6, tapping depth inside the projector: 12 mm (15/32"), screw tightening torque: 4 ± 0.5 N·m) In such case, make sure that there is no clearance between the screw holes for ceiling mount on the projector bottom and the setting surface by inserting spacers (metallic) between them.



Positions of screw holes for ceiling mount and adjustable feet

- Do not stack projectors on top of each other.
- Do not use the projector supporting it by the top.
- Do not block the ventilation ports (intake and exhaust) of the projector.
- Prevent hot and cool air from the air conditioning system to blow directly to the ventilation ports (intake and exhaust) of the projector.



Do not install the projector in a confined space.
 When installing the projector in a confined space, provide air conditioning or ventilation separately. Exhaust heat may accumulate when the ventilation is not enough, triggering the protection circuit of the projector.

• Panasonic takes no responsibility for any damage to the product caused by an inappropriate choice of location for installing the projector, even if the warranty period of the product has not expired.

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#### Security

When using this product, take safety measures against the following incidents.

- Personal information being leaked via this product
- Unauthorized operation of this product by a malicious third party
- Interfering or stopping of this product by a malicious third party

Take sufficient security measures.

- Make your password difficult to guess as much as possible.
- Change your password periodically. The password can be set in the [SECURITY] menu → [SECURITY PASSWORD CHANGE] or the [NETWORK/USB] menu → [Panasonic APPLICATION] → [PASSWORD CHANGE].
- Panasonic Corporation or its affiliate companies will never ask for your password directly. Do not divulge your password in case you receive such inquiries.
- The connecting network must be secured by a firewall, etc.
- Set a password for the web control and restrict the users who can log in. A password for the web control can be set in the [Change password] page of the web control screen.

## Security when using the wireless LAN product

The advantage of a wireless LAN is that information can be exchanged between a computer or other such equipment and a wireless access point using radio waves, instead of using a LAN cable, as long as you are within range for radio transmissions.

On the other hand, because the radio wave can travel through an obstacle (such as a wall) and is accessible from anywhere within a given range, following problems may occur if security setting is insufficient.

- Transmitted data may be intercepted
  - A malicious third part may intentionally intercept radio waves and monitor the following transmitted data.
  - Personal information such as your ID, password, credit card number
  - Content of an Email
- Illegally accessed

A malicious third party may access your personal or corporate network without authorization and engage in the following types of behavior.

- Retrieve personal and/or secret information (information leak)
- Spread false information by impersonating a particular person (spoofing)
- Overwrite intercepted communications and issue false data (tampering)
- Spread harmful software such as a computer virus and crash your data and/or system (system crash)

Since most wireless LAN adapters or access points are equipped with security features to take care of these problems, you can reduce the possibility of these problems occurring when using this product by making the appropriate security settings for the wireless LAN device.

Some wireless LAN devices may not be set for security immediately after purchase. To decrease the possibility of occurrence of security problems, be sure to make all security related settings according to the operation instructions supplied with each wireless LAN device before using a wireless LAN device.

Depending on the specifications of the wireless LAN, a malicious third party may be able to break security settings by special means.

Panasonic asks customers to thoroughly understand the risk of using this product without making security settings, and recommends that the customers make security settings at their own discretion and responsibility.

## Notes regarding the wireless LAN

Radio wave in the 2.4 GHz/5 GHz band is used when the wireless LAN connection function of the projector is used. The license of wireless station is not required, but understand the following when using.

To use the wireless LAN function with the projector, it is necessary to attach the optional Wireless Module (Model No.: ET-WM300).

For details on how to attach the optional Wireless Module (Model No.: ET-WM300), refer to "Attaching the Wireless Module" (→ page 51).

#### Do not use close to other wireless devices.

Following devices may be using radio wave in the same bandwidth as the projector. Using the projector close to these devices may cause the communication to be disabled or the communication speed to slow down due to interference of radio wave.

Microwave oven, etc.

- Industrial, scientific, or medical devices, etc.
- In-plant wireless station for identifying moving vehicles used in the manufacturing lines at a plant
- Specified low power wireless station

### Do not use cell phone, television, or radio as much as possible close to the projector.

Cell phone, television, or radio is using radio wave with different bandwidth from the projector, so there is no effect on the wireless LAN communication or the send/receive on these devices. However, noise may occur in the audio or video due to the radio wave from the projector.

### Radio wave for wireless LAN communication does not go through the reinforcing bars, metal, or concrete.

The projector can communicate through wall or floor made of wood or glass (excluding the glass with metal mesh embedded), but it cannot communicate through wall or floor made of reinforcing bars, metal, or concrete.

## Do not use the projector as much as possible in a location where static electricity is generated.

The communication via wireless LAN or wired LAN may be prone to disruption when the projector is used in a location where static electricity or noise is generated.

There is a rare case that the LAN connection may not be established due to static electricity or noise, so in such case, turn off the projector, remove the source of problematic static electricity or noise, and turn the projector back on.

## This device is restricted to indoor use when operated in the 2.412 to 2.472 GHz band, in the 5.18 to 5.825 GHz frequency range (Channels 36 to 165).

### Using the projector outside the country

Note that depending on countries or regions there are restrictions on the channels and frequencies at which you can use the wireless LAN.

## Light ID

Light ID is one of the visible light communication technologies to transfer information with fast speed and stability using flashing of light. This projector is equipped with a function to transmit the Light ID signal, and following usage is possible by utilizing the LinkRay Light ID solution service provided by Panasonic.

• By receiving the Light ID signal transmitted by the projector using the camera on a device (smartphone/tablet) and a dedicated application software, the contents linked to that Light ID signal are acquired and displayed on the screen of the device.

#### Note

- A separate contract is necessary to use the LinkRay Light ID solution service.
- The smartphone application software "LinkRay Light ID Solution" is required. Search and download "LinkRay" from App Store or Google Play. For the latest information of devices that the operation has been verified, visit the Panasonic website (https://panasonic.net/cns/LinkRay/).

## Notes regarding Light ID function

- The projected image may flicker when the Light ID signal is transmitted, but this is caused luminance change during the transmission of the Light ID, and it is not a malfunction.
- A striped pattern may generate on the recorded image when the projected image is recorded by a camera, etc.
- The light output will decrease while the Light ID function is used.
- The Light ID signal may become difficult to receive by a device (smartphone/tablet) in following cases.
  - When strong light such as outside light is illuminating on the projected screen
  - When a Light ID transmitting device other than this projector is installed nearby
  - When receiving a signal in a location far from the screen
  - When receiving a signal in a location that is angled against the screen
  - When the light reflection loss is large due to the screen characteristics
  - When the size of the projected image is small
  - When the displayed projected image is dark

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- When using a laser format bar code reader, take care not to illuminate the bar code reading surface with the projection light or its reflected light. Doing so may cause bar code reader not to read or misread.
- The Light ID function of the projector is not guaranteed to operate on all devices.

## **DIGITAL LINK**

"DIGITAL LINK" is a technology to transmit the video, audio, Ethernet, and serial control signals using a twisted pair cable by adding unique functions by Panasonic to the HDBaseT™ communication standard formulated by HDBaseT Alliance.

This projector supports the optional Panasonic DIGITAL LINK output supported device (Model No.: ET-YFB100G, ET-YFB200G) and peripheral devices by other manufacturers (twisted-pair-transmitters such as the "XTP transmitter" of Extron Electronics) based on the same HDBaseT™ standard. For the devices of other manufacturers that the operation has been verified with this projector, visit the Panasonic website (https:// panasonic.net/cns/projector/). Note that the verification for devices of other manufacturers has been made for the items set by Panasonic Corporation, and not all the operations have been verified. For operation or performance problems caused by the devices of other manufacturers, contact the respective manufacturers.

Multi Monitoring & Control Software

This application software monitors and controls the multiple display devices (projector and flat panel display) connected to an intranet.

#### Early Warning Software

This plug-in software monitors the status of the display devices and their peripherals within an intranet, and notifies of abnormality of such equipment and detects the signs of possible abnormality. "Early Warning Software" is preinstalled in the "Multi Monitoring & Control Software". To use the early warning function of this plug-in software, install "Multi Monitoring & Control Software" in the PC to be used. By enabling the early warning function, it will notify of the approximate time to replace the consumables for the display devices, to clean each part of the display devices, and to replace the components of the display devices, allowing to execute maintenance in advance.

The early warning function can be used by registering maximum of 2048 display devices free of charge for 90 days after installing the "Multi Monitoring & Control Software" into a PC. To continuously use after the 90 days, it is necessary to purchase the license of "Early Warning Software" (ET-SWA100 Series) and perform the activation. Also, depending on the type of license, the number of display devices that can be registered for monitoring varies. For details, refer to the Operating Instructions of "Multi Monitoring & Control Software".

#### • Wireless Manager ME6.4

This application software transmits the computer screen to the projector via wireless LAN or wired LAN. Simultaneous projection from one computer to multiple projectors, or simultaneous projection from multiple computers to one projector is possible.

#### Plug and Share

This application software makes it possible to project the computer screen with the projector easily by omitting the selection of the device when connecting the computer via network by pairing a projector and a computer using the USB memory.

#### Wireless Projector

This application software for iOS/Android is used to project files such as PDF or image by transmitting to the projector via wireless LAN.

#### Disposal

To dispose of the product, ask your local authorities or dealer for correct methods of disposal. Also, dispose of the product without disassembling.

#### Storing

To store the projector, store in a dry room.

### Cautions on use

### To get a good picture quality

In order to view a beautiful image in higher contrast, prepare an appropriate environment. Draw curtains or blinds over windows and turn off any lights near the screen to prevent outside light or light from indoor lamps from shining onto the screen.

### Do not touch the surface of the projection lens with your bare hands.

If the surface of the projection lens becomes dirty from fingerprints or anything else, this will be magnified and projected onto the screen.

## LCD panel

The LCD panel is manufactured by a technology with extremely high precision, but there may be missing pixels or pixels that is constantly illuminated in a rare case. Note that these phenomenon are not malfunction. Also, a residual image may remain in the image of the LCD panel when a still image is projected for long time, and in such case, project a full white image for 1 hour or longer. Note that the residual image may not be completely erased.

## Optical parts

The replacement cycle for the optical parts such as the LCD panel or polarization plate may become shorter even if it is used for less than one year when the ambient temperature is high or in an environment with large amount of dust or cigarette smoke. For details, consult your dealer.

## Light source

The light source of the projector uses lasers, and has the following characteristics.

- Depending on the operating environment temperature, the luminance of the light source will decrease. The higher the temperature becomes, the more the luminance of the light source decreases.
- The luminance of the light source will decrease by duration of usage.



## When using the multiple projectors

When you use the multiple projectors together, you can operate all the projectors simultaneously or each projector individually using single remote control, if a unique ID number is assigned to each projector.

When using the projectors by setting the ID numbers, set the ID number of the projector body after initial settings have been completed. Then, set the ID number of the remote control. For initial settings, refer to "When the initial setting screen is displayed" ( $\Rightarrow$  page 61).

The factory default ID number of the projector (projector body and remote control) is set to [ALL], so you can use it as it is. Set the ID numbers of the projector body and remote control as necessary.



## Connecting the remote control to the projector with a cable

To control the projector with a wired remote control, connect the remote control wired terminal of the remote control with the <REMOTE 2 IN> terminal of the projector with commercially available M3 stereo mini plug cable. This is effective when using the projector in location where there is an obstacle between the projector and the remote control or location that is affected by the outside light.

 The wireless remote control cannot be used when a cable is connected to the <REMOTE 2 IN> terminal of the projector.



#### Attention

• Use a cable that is 15 m (49'3") or shorter, with 2 core shielded. The remote control may not operate when the length of the cable exceeds 15 m (49'3") or when the shielding of the cable is inadequate.



When the projector is mounted to the existing Ceiling Mount Bracket (in combination with the Model No.: ET-PKD120H (for High Ceilings) or ET-PKD120S (for Low Ceilings), and the Model No.: ET-PKE300B (Projector Mount Bracket)), it is necessary to replace the drop-prevention wire rope with the one corresponding to this projector. Consult your dealer.

#### Drop-prevention set (service model no.: DPPW1004ZA/X1)

- Be sure to use the Ceiling Mount Bracket specified for this projector.
- Refer to the Installation Instructions of the Ceiling Mount Bracket when installing and setting up the projector.





## Formula for calculating the projection distance per projection lens

To use a projected image size not listed in this manual, check the projected image size SD (m) and use the respective formula to calculate projection distance.

All the units for the formula are m. (Value obtained by the following calculation formula contains a slight error.) When calculating a projection distance using image size designation (value in inches), multiply the value in inches by 0.0254 and substitute it into SD in the formula for calculating the projection distance.

## Adjusting adjustable feet

Install the projector on a flat surface so that the front of the projector is parallel to the screen surface and the projection screen is rectangular.

If the screen is tilted downward, extend the front adjustable feet so that the projected image becomes rectangular. The adjustable feet can also be used to adjust the projector to be level when it is tilted in the horizontal direction. Adjustable feet can be extended by turning them as shown in the figure. Turning them in the opposite direction will return them to the original position.



Maximum adjustable range Adjustable feet: 23 mm (29/32") each

#### Attention

 Be careful not to block the intake/exhaust ports with your hands or any objects when adjusting the adjustable feet while the light source is on. (+ page 31)

## **Removing/attaching the projection lens**

Removing and attaching methods of the projection lens are same for both standard zoom lenses and optional lenses.


Move the lens position to the home position before replacing or removing the projection lens. (+ page 69)

### Attention

- Replace the projection lens after turning off the projector.
- Do not touch the electric contacts of the projection lens. Dust or dirt may cause poor contact.
- Do not touch the surface of the projection lens with your bare hands.
- Before attaching the projection lens, remove the lens cover attached to the projection lens.
- Before attaching the projection lens, remove the lens hole cover (only model with the lens sold separately) and the lens cover attached to the projection lens.
- Panasonic takes no responsibility for any damage or malfunction of the product resulting from the use of projection lenses which are not
  manufactured by Panasonic. Always use the standard zoom lens supplied with the projector or the specified projection lens.

## Removing the projection lens

Remove the projection lens using the following procedure.




- 1) Slide the top slide cover. (Fig. 1)
  - Turn the top slide cover fixing screw (x 1) counterclockwise until it turns freely using a Philipps screwdriver, and slowly slide the top slide cover.
- 2) While pressing the lens release lever, turn the projection lens counterclockwise to the end, and remove the projection lens. (Fig. 2)

## Attention

• Store the removed projection lens where it will be free from vibration and impact.

## Attaching the projection lens

Attach the projection lens using the following procedure.



- 1) Align the mark (red dot) on the projection lens with the mark (red dot) on the projector, and insert it all the way in. (Fig. 1)
- 2) Turn the projection lens clockwise to the end. (Fig. 2)

### Attention


• Turn the projection lens counterclockwise to confirm that it does not come out.

## Attaching the Wireless Module

To use the wireless LAN function with the projector, it is necessary to attach the optional Wireless Module (Model No.: ET-WM300).



## Attaching the Wireless Module



## 1) Turn off the power of the projector.

• Always follow the procedure of "Switching off the projector" (+ page 66) when turning off the power.

## 2) Remove the top slide cover. (Fig. 1)

• Turn the top slide cover fixing screw (x 1) counterclockwise until it turns freely using a Philipps screwdriver, slide the top slide cover until the top slide cover attachment line is visible, and remove it.

## 3) Attach the Wireless Module. (Fig. 2)

- i) Insert the Wireless Module into the wireless module connection terminal of the projector.
- ii) Confirm that the edge of the Wireless Module is aligned to the wireless module attachment line, and securely fix the Wireless Module with the fixing screw (x 1) supplied with the Wireless Module.

## 4) Attach the top slide cover. (Fig. 1)

- Align the top slide cover to the top slide cover attachment line, and attach it by sliding.
- Securely tighten the top slide cover fixing screw (x 1) using a Phillips screwdriver.

#### Attention

<sup>•</sup> When tightening the screws, use a Phillips screwdriver or similar, and do not use power screwdriver or impact screwdriver.

<sup>•</sup> Do not attach any USB device other than the optional Wireless Module (Model No.: ET-WM300).

## Connecting

## Before connecting

- Before connecting, carefully read the operating instructions for the external device to be connected.
- Turn off the power of all devices before connecting cables.
- Take note of the following points before connecting the cables. Failure to do so may result in malfunctions.
- When connecting a cable to a device connected to the projector or the projector itself, touch any nearby metallic objects to eliminate static electricity from your body before performing work.
- Do not use unnecessarily long cables to connect a device to the projector or to the projector body. The longer the cable, the more susceptible to noise it becomes. Since using a cable while it is wound makes it act like an antenna, it is more susceptible to noise.
- When connecting cables, connect GND first, then insert the connecting terminal of the connecting device in a straight manner.
- Acquire any connection cable necessary to connect the external device to the system that is neither supplied with the device nor available as an option.
- If video signals from video equipment contain too much jitter, the images on the screen may wobble. In this case, a time base corrector (TBC) must be connected.
- If synchronization signals output from computers or video equipment are disrupted due to changes in the video output setting or other reasons, colors of projected images may be temporarily disrupted.
- The signal that can be connected to the projector is video signal, YC<sub>B</sub>C<sub>R</sub>/YP<sub>B</sub>P<sub>R</sub> signal, analog RGB signal (synchronization signal is TTL level), and digital signal.
- Some computer models or graphic cards are not compatible with the projector.
- Use a cable compensator when you connect devices to the projector using long cables. Otherwise the projector may not project the image properly.
- For details of the types of video signals that can be used with the projector, refer to "List of compatible signals" (⇒ page 218).






• When connecting the projector to a computer or an external device, use the power cord supplied with each device and commercially available shielded cables.

### Note

- For the HDMI cable, use an HDMI High Speed cable that conforms to the HDMI standards. If a cable that does not conform to the HDMI standards is used, images may be interrupted or may not be projected.
- The <HDMI 1 IN>/<HDMI 2 IN> terminals can be connected to an external device with the DVI-D terminal by using an HDMI/DVI conversion cable. However, this may not function properly for some external devices, and image may not be projected.
- If you operate the projector using the computer with the resume feature (last memory), you may have to reset the resume feature to operate the projector.

## Connecting example using DIGITAL LINK

Twisted-pair-cable transmitter based on the communication standard HDBaseT<sup>™</sup> such as the optional DIGITAL LINK output supported device (Model No.: ET-YFB100G, ET-YFB200G) uses the twisted pair cable to transmit input images, audio, Ethernet, and serial control signal, and the projector can input such digital signal to the <DIGITAL LINK/LAN> terminal.

\*1 Control target is the projector or the twisted-pair-cable transmitter. The control itself may not be possible depending on the twisted-pair-cable transmitter. Check the operating instructions of the device to be connected.

#### Attention

- · Always use one of the following when connecting a VCR.
- Use a VCR with built-in time base corrector (TBC).
- Use a time base corrector (TBC) between the projector and the VCR.
- The image may be disrupted when nonstandard burst signal is connected. In such a case, connect the time base corrector (TBC) between the projector and the external devices.
- Ask a qualified technician or your dealer to install the cable wiring between the twisted-pair-cable transmitter and the projector. Image may be disrupted if cable transmission characteristics cannot be obtained due to inadequate installation.
- For the LAN cable between the twisted-pair-cable transmitter and the projector, use a cable that meets the following criteria:
  - Conforming to CAT5e or higher standards
  - Shielded type (including connectors)
  - Straight-through
  - Single wire
- When laying cables between the twisted-pair-cable transmitter and the projector, confirm that cable characteristics are compatible with CAT5e or higher using tools such as a cable tester or cable analyzer.
- When a relay connector is used, include it in the measurement.
- Do not use a hub between the twisted-pair-cable transmitter and the projector.
- When connecting to the projector using a twisted-pair-cable transmitter (receiver) of other manufacturers, do not place another twisted-pair-cable transmitter between the twisted-pair-cable transmitter of other manufacturers and the projector. This may cause image to be disrupted.
- The <DIGITAL LINK/LAN> terminal and <LAN> terminal are connected inside of the projector. If both the <DIGITAL LINK/LAN> terminal and <LAN> terminal are used, configure the system so that these terminals are not directly connected or connected through peripheral devices such as a hub or a twisted-pair-cable transmitter to the same network.
- Do not pull cables forcefully. Also, do not bend or fold cables unnecessarily.
- To reduce the effects of noise as much as possible, stretch out the cables between the twisted-pair-cable transmitter and the projector without any loops.
- Lay the cables between the twisted-pair-cable transmitter and the projector away from other cables, particularly power cables.
- When laying multiple cables, run them side by side along the shortest distance possible without bundling them together.
- After laying the cable, confirm that the value of [SIGNAL QUALITY] in the [NETWORK/USB] menu → [DIGITAL LINK STATUS] is displayed in green, which indicates a normal quality. (
   → page 140)

#### Note

- For the HDMI cable, use an HDMI High Speed cable that conforms to the HDMI standards. If a cable that does not conform to the HDMI standards is used, images may be interrupted or may not be projected.
- The projector does not support VIERA Link (HDMI).
- The maximum transmission distance between the twisted-pair-cable transmitter and the projector is 100 m (328'1"). It is possible to transmit up to 150 m (492'2") if the twisted-pair-cable transmitter supports the long-reach communication method. If this distance is exceeded, image may be disrupted or a malfunction may occur in LAN communication. Please note that Panasonic does not support the use of the projector outside the maximum transmission distance. When connecting with the long reach, video signal or distance that can be transmitted may be restricted, depending on the specification of the twisted-pair-cable transmitter.
- For twisted-pair-cable transmitters of other manufacturers that the operation has been verified with this projector, visit the Panasonic website (https://panasonic.net/cns/projector/). Note that the verification for devices of other manufacturers has been made for the items set by Panasonic Corporation, and not all the operations have been verified. For operation or performance problems caused by the devices of other manufacturers, contact the respective manufacturers.

# Chapter 3 Basic Operations

This chapter describes basic operations to start with.

## Switching on/off the projector

## Connecting the power cord

## Make sure that the supplied power cord is securely fixed to the projector body to prevent it from being removed easily.

Confirm that the <MAIN POWER> switch is on the <OFF> side before connecting the supplied power cord to the projector.

Use the power cord matching with the power supply voltage and the shape of the outlet.



## How to attach the power cord

For Taiwan

1) Check the shapes of the <AC IN> terminal at the rear of the projector and the power cord connector, and insert the connector completely in the correct direction.

For other countries or regions



 Check the shapes of the <AC IN> terminal at the rear of the projector and the power cord connector, and insert the connector completely in the correct direction (until you hear the side tabs click in place).

#### Attention

• Do not use the power cord with its tabs damaged. Doing so may result in a poor contact between the power cord connector and the <AC IN> terminal. Consult your dealer for repairing the power cord.

#### How to remove the power cord

#### For Taiwan

- 1) Confirm that the <MAIN POWER> switch at the rear of the projector is set to <OFF> side, and remove the power plug from the outlet.
- 2) While holding the power cord connector, pull out the power cord from the <AC IN> terminal of the projector.



- 1) Confirm that the <MAIN POWER> switch at the rear of the projector is set to <OFF> side, and remove the power plug from the outlet.
- 2) Remove the power cord connector from the <AC IN> terminal of the projector while pressing the side tabs.

## **Power indicator**

Indicate the status of the power. Check the status of the power indicator <ON (G)/STANDBY (R)> before operating the projector.

• While the power indicator <ON (G)/STANDBY (R)> lights in orange, the fan is running to cool the projector.

• For approximately five seconds after the projector is turned off, the indicator does not light up even if the power is turned on. Turn on the power again after the power indicator <ON (G)/STANDBY (R)> lights/blinks in red.


The projector consumes power even in standby mode (power indicator <ON (G)/STANDBY (R)> lights/blinks in red). Refer to "Power consumption" (+ page 220) for the power consumption.

• The power indicator <ON (G)/STANDBY (R)> will blink if the projector receives a remote control signal.

The power indicator <ON (G)/STANDBY (R)> will blink slowly in green while the shutter function is in use (shutter: closed).

## Switching on the projector

When using the optional projection lens, attach the projection lens before switching on the projector. Remove the lens cover first.



- 1) Connect the power cord to the projector.
- 2) Connect the power plug to an outlet.
- 3) Press the <ON> side of the <MAIN POWER> switch to turn on the power.
  - The power indicator <ON (G)/STANDBY (R)> lights/blinks in red, and the projector enters the standby mode.
- 4) Press the power < 0/| > button.
  - The power indicator <ON (G)/STANDBY (R)> lights in green and the image is soon projected on the screen.

#### Note

- When the [PROJECTOR SETUP] menu → [ECO MANAGEMENT] → [STANDBY MODE] is set to [ECO], it takes longer for the projection to start after the power is turned on, compared to when set to [NORMAL].
- When the [PROJECTOR SETUP] menu → [ECO MANAGEMENT] → [QUICK STARTUP] is set to [ON], and the power is turned on before the specified time elapses after the projector enters the standby mode, an image will be projected approximately one second after the power is turned on.
- The specified time is a time set in the [PROJECTOR SETUP] menu  $\rightarrow$  [ECO MANAGEMENT]  $\rightarrow$  [QUICK STARTUP]  $\rightarrow$  [VALID PERIOD].
- When the power is turned on or an input signal is switched, you may here a high-frequency driving sound. This is not a malfunction.
  If the power was turned off at the previous use by pressing the <OFF> side of the <MAIN POWER> switch or by using the breaker directly
- while projecting, the power indicator  $\langle ON (G) / STANDBY (R) \rangle$  lights up in green and an image is projected after a while when the power is turned on by pressing the  $\langle ON \rangle$  side of the  $\langle MAIN POWER \rangle$  switch or by turning the breaker on with the power plug connected to the outlet. This applies only when the [PROJECTOR SETUP] menu  $\rightarrow$  [INITIAL STARTUP] is set to [LAST MEMORY].

## When the initial setting screen is displayed

When the projector is switched on for the first time after purchase, or when the [PROJECTOR SETUP] menu  $\rightarrow$  [INITIALIZE]  $\rightarrow$  [ALL USER DATA] is executed, the focus adjustment screen is displayed immediately after the projection is started, and then the **[INITIAL SETTING]** screen is displayed. Set them according to the circumstances.

In other occasions, you can change the settings by menu operations.

If you press the <MENU> button while the **[INITIAL SETTING]** screen is displayed, you can go back to the previous screen.

Same operation is available by pressing the <RETURN> button.

## Focus adjustment

Adjust the focus to display the menu screen clearly.

Adjustment of the zoom and shift may also be necessary.

For details, refer to "Adjusting the focus, zoom, and lens shift" (> page 68).

- 7) Press the <ZOOM> button to adjust the projected image size to match the screen.

## Switching off the projector



- 1) Press the power  $< \oplus / | >$  button.
  - The [POWER OFF(STANDBY)] confirmation screen is displayed.
- 2) Press **♦** to select [OK], and press the <ENTER> button.

(Or press the power  $\langle 0/| \rangle$  button again.)

- Projection of the image will stop, and the power indicator <ON (G)/STANDBY (R)> on the projector body lights in orange. (The fan keeps running.)
- 3) Wait for a few seconds until the power indicator <ON (G)/STANDBY (R)> of the projector body lights/ blinks in red.
- 4) Press the <OFF> side of the <MAIN POWER> switch to turn off the power.

#### Note

- For approximately five seconds after the projector is turned off, the indicator does not light up even if the power is turned on.
- Even when the power <0/|> button is pressed and the projector is switched off, the projector consumes power if the main power of the projector is on.
- When the [PROJECTOR SETUP] menu  $\rightarrow$  [ECO MANAGEMENT]  $\rightarrow$  [STANDBY MODE] is set to [ECO], use of some functions is restricted, but the power consumption during standby mode can be conserved.
- While projecting, the power can be turned off by pressing the <OFF> side of the <MAIN POWER> switch, or by directly using the breaker under conditions where the <MAIN POWER> switch of the projector cannot be switched off/on easily such as while installing on the ceiling. However, the settings or adjustments performed right before the power is turned off may not be reflected.


## Projecting

Check the external device connection (→ page 52) and the power cord connection (→ page 58), and turn on the power (→ page 60) to start projection. Select the image to project, and adjust appearance of the projected image.

## Selecting the input signal

The input of the image to project can be switched. Method to switch the input is as follows.

- Press the input selection button on the remote control and directly specify the input of the image to project.
- Press the <INPUT SELECT> button on the control panel to display the input selection screen, and select the input to project from the list.



## Switching the input directly with the remote control

The input for projection can be switched by directly specifying it with the input selection button on the remote control.

1) Press the input selection button (<HDMI 1>, <HDMI 2>, <DIGITAL LINK>, <RGB1/2>, <VIDEO>, <NETWORK/USB>).

## Attention

- Images may not be projected properly depending on the external device, or the Blu-ray disc or DVD disc, to be played back. Set the [PICTURE] menu → [SYSTEM SELECTOR].
- Confirm the aspect ratio of the projection screen and the image, and switch to an optimum aspect ratio from the [POSITION] menu → [ASPECT].

Note

- To switch the input to MIRRORING, it is necessary to attach the optional Wireless Module (Model No.: ET-WM300).
- For details on how to attach the optional Wireless Module (Model No.: ET-WM300), refer to "Attaching the Wireless Module" (→ page 51). • When the optional DIGITAL LINK output supported device (Model No.: ET-YFB100G, ET-YFB200G) is connected to the <DIGITAL LINK/

LAN> terminal, the input on the DIGITAL LINK output supported device changes each time the <DIGITAL LINK> button is pressed. The input can also be changed using the RS-232C control command.

For twisted-pair-cable transmitters of other manufacturers, switch the input on the projector to DIGITAL LINK, and then switch the input on the twisted-pair-cable transmitter.

## 2) Press $\blacktriangle \forall$ to select the input for projection, and press the <ENTER> button.

#### Note

- [MIRRORING] is displayed when the optional Wireless Module (Model No.: ET-WM300) is attached.
- The input can also be switched by pressing the <INPUT SELECT> button while the input selection screen is displayed. The input will switch each time you press the <INPUT SELECT> button.
- If the optional DIGITAL LINK output supported device (Model No.: ET-YFB100G, ET-YFB200G) is connected to the projector, the input selection menu for the DIGITAL LINK output supported device is displayed when the <ENTER> button is pressed while the DIGITAL LINK input is selected in the input selection screen.
- If the optional DIGITAL LINK output supported device (Model No.: ET-YFB100G, ET-YFB200G) is connected to the projector, the DIGITAL LINK logo and the input name selected in the DIGITAL LINK output supported device are displayed in the display section of the [DIGITAL LINK] in the input selection screen.

## Adjusting the focus, zoom, and lens shift

Adjust the focus, zoom, and lens shift if the image projected to the screen or its position is shifted even if the projector and the screen are set up in the correct positions.

## Using the control panel

- 1) Press the <LENS/CANCEL> button on the control panel.
  - Pressing the button changes the adjustment screen in the order of [FOCUS], [ZOOM], and [SHIFT].
- 2) Select each adjustment item and press ▲▼◀▶ to adjust.

## Using the remote control

- 1) Press the lens buttons (<FOCUS>, <ZOOM>, <SHIFT>) on the remote control.
  - Pressing the <FOCUS> button: Adjusts the focus (adjustment of the lens focus position).
  - Pressing the <ZOOM> button: Adjusts the zoom (adjustment of the lens zoom position).
  - Pressing the <SHIFT> button: Adjusts the lens shift (vertical position and horizontal position of the lens).

## 2) Select each adjustment item and press ▲▼◀▶ to adjust.

## CAUTION

**During the lens shift operation, do not insert your hand in the opening around the lens.** Your hand may get caught, resulting in an injury.

## Note

It is recommended that images be projected continuously for at least 30 minutes before the focus is adjusted.

<sup>•</sup> The adjustment can be performed faster by holding down **AV()** for approximately three seconds or longer.

- Only [FOCUS] is displayed in yellow so that the displayed menu item can be recognized by color, even when the displayed characters are unreadable due to incorrect focus. (Factory default)
   The displayed color for [FOCUS] differs depending on the setting in the [DISPLAY OPTION] menu → [ON-SCREEN DISPLAY] → [OSD DESIGN].
- The current position and maximum movable range are displayed with a bar scale during shift adjustment. Also, the out of movable range from current position is indicated by red bar. The triangular mark under the bar scale indicates the home position.

## Moving the lens position to the home position

To move the lens position to the home position, operate in following procedure.

## 1) Press the <DEFAULT> button on the remote control while the [SHIFT] adjustment screen is displayed.

• The [HOME POSITION] screen is displayed.

- 2) Press the <ENTER> button while the [HOME POSITION] screen is displayed (approximately five seconds).
  - [PROGRESS] is displayed in the [HOME POSITION] screen, and the lens position returns to the home position.


Note

The home position of the lens is used when the lens is replaced or when the projector is stored, and it is not the optical center of the screen.
The [HOME POSITION] screen can also be displayed by pressing the <LENS/CANCEL> button on the control panel or the <SHIFT> button on the remote control for three seconds or longer.

## Adjustment range by the lens position shift (optical shift)

Based on the standard projection position using the optical axis shift function, the projection position can be adjusted in the range shown in the following figure.

Following figure shows the adjustment range when the projector is installed on the floor.



## Using the USB memory

This projector supports the attachment of the USB memory. Attach the USB memory to the <VIEWER/PAIRING> terminal when using the Memory Viewer function, the pairing function, or the data cloning function.

### Note

- For details on the Memory Viewer function, refer to "Projecting with MEMORY VIEWER input" (> page 186).
- For pairing of the projector and the USB memory, refer to "Using the pairing function" (+ page 194).
- For how to use the image transfer application software "Plug and Share" allowing to easily connect via the wireless LAN by pairing the commercially available USB memory with the projector, refer to following URL. https://panasonic.net/cns/projector/

For the method of pairing the projector and the USB memory, refer to "Using the pairing function" (+ page 194). By pairing, the connection information between the image transfer application software "Plug and Share", and the projector and the USB memory is written into the USB memory.

For the data cloning function, refer to the [PROJECTOR SETUP] menu → [DATA CLONING] (→ page 127).

## Notes on use

Observe following.

- Do not disassemble or modify the USB memory.
- Do not apply strong impact on the USB memory.
- Do not pour liquid such as water or get it wet.
- Do not place foreign object into the terminal section.
- Do not touch the metal terminal with hand or metal.
- Do not leave the USB memory in a place with high humidity or dust.
- Do not leave the USB memory in a place where static electricity or electromagnetic radiation is generated.
- Store the USB memory appropriately in a location that small children cannot reach.
- Immediately remove the USB memory from the projector when smoke or odor is noticed, and contact the manufacturer.
- Do not remove the USB memory from the projector while reading or writing the data.

## USB memory that can be used with the projector

This projector supports the commercially available USB 2.0 compatible USB memory formatted in FAT16 or FAT32.

• Only the single partition structure is supported.

#### Note

- The USB memory with a security function cannot be used for pairing.
- Free space of approximately 30 MB is required in the USB memory used for pairing.

## Attaching the USB memory

#### 1) Insert the USB memory all the way in to the <VIEWER/PAIRING> terminal.

#### Attention

- Take care of the orientation of the terminal when inserting the USB memory so that it will not get damaged.
- Do not use a USB extension cable or a USB hub, and directly insert the USB memory into the <VIEWER/PAIRING> terminal of the projector.
- Do not insert the USB memory into the <DC OUT> terminal. The USB memory cannot be used on the <DC OUT> terminal.

#### Note

- The USB memory can be attached even when the projector is turned on.
- The pairing data is written to the USB memory when the pairing function is used. If there is a write protection switch on the USB memory to be used, set it so that data can be written.

## Removing the USB memory

## 1) Remove the USB memory after confirming that the indicator on the USB memory is not blinking.

#### Attention

- The blinking of the indicator of the USB memory attached to the projector is indicating that the projector is accessing (reading or writing) the USB memory. Do not remove the USB memory from the projector when the indicator is blinking.
- The access status to the USB memory cannot be confirmed when a USB memory without the monitoring function such as indicator is used. In such case, remove the USB memory after waiting for one of following is completed.
  - Turn off the projector.
  - When using the Memory Viewer function, switch the input to anything other than the MEMORY VIEWER input.
  - When using the pairing function, wait until the pairing data write completion message is displayed on the standby screen.

## **Operating with the remote control**



## Using the shutter function

If the projector is not used for a certain period of time during the meeting intermission, for example, it is possible to turn off the image and audio temporarily.

- The power indicator <ON (G)/STANDBY (R)> will blink slowly in green while the shutter function is in use (shutter: closed).
- The fade-in/fade-out time of the image can be set in the [DISPLAY OPTION] menu → [SHUTTER SETTING] (⇒ page 109).
- To output audio while the shutter function is in use (shutter: closed), set the [PROJECTOR SETUP] menu → [AUDIO SETTING]
- ( $\Rightarrow$  page 123)  $\rightarrow$  [IN SHUTTER] to [ON].
- The light source may be lit dimly due to warm up when the shutter function is used in the operating environment temperature of around 0 °C (32 °F).

## Using the mute function

Audio can be temporarily turned off.



- 1) Press the <MUTE> button.
  - The audio is muted.
- 2) Press the <MUTE> button again.
  - The audio is turned on.

# Adjusting the volume

Adjust the volume of audio output.

1) Press the <VOL-> button/<VOL+> button on the remote control.

| <vol+></vol+> | Increases the volume. |
|---------------|-----------------------|
| <vol-></vol-> | Decreases the volume. |

#### Note

This operation can be also performed using <> on the control panel.

# Using the freeze function

The projected image can be paused and audio can be turned off regardless of the playback of the external device.



#### 1) Press the <FREEZE> button.

• The image freezes and audio is muted.

#### 2) Press the <FREEZE> button again.

• Freezing of the image is canceled and audio is turned on.

#### Note

- [FREEZE] is displayed on the screen when video is paused.
- When freezing of the moving image is canceled, the image may disappear or be disrupted temporarily.

# Using the on-screen display function

Turn off the on-screen display function (no display) when you do not wish the viewers to see the on-screen display, such as the menu or the input terminal name.

on screen button

- 1) Press the <ON SCREEN> button.
  - The on-screen display disappears.
- 2) Press the <ON SCREEN> button again.
  - The on-screen display appears.

#### Note

If you press the <MENU> button on the control panel for at least three seconds while the on-screen display is off (hidden), the on-screen display is turned on.

# Using the automatic setup function

The image position when the HDMI signal is input, or the dot clock, clock phase, and image position when the analog RGB signal is input can be adjusted automatically. (Analog RGB signal is a signal structured with dots just like the computer signal.)

It is recommended to input an image with bright white borders at the edges and high-contrast black and white characters when the automatic adjustment is being performed.

Avoid using images that include halftones or gradation, such as photographs and computer graphics.



#### 1) Press the <AUTO SETUP/CANCEL> button.

- [PROGRESS] is displayed while automatic setup is being executed.
- [COMPLETE] is displayed when automatic setup has completed without any problem.

#### Note

- The clock phase may shift even if it has completed without any incident. In such a case, adjust the [POSITION] menu → [CLOCK PHASE]
   (⇒ page 92).
- The automatic setup may not correctly adjust when a image that cannot determine the edge or dark image is input. In such a case, adjust the following settings.
  - [ADVANCED MENU] menu → [INPUT RESOLUTION] (→ page 97)
  - [POSITION] menu → [CLOCK PHASE] ( $\Rightarrow$  page 92)
  - [POSITION] menu → [SHIFT] ( $\Rightarrow$  page 90)
- Adjust special signals according to the [DISPLAY OPTION] menu → [AUTO SETUP] (⇒ page 101).
- Automatic adjustment may not be possible depending on the computer model.
- Automatic adjustment may not be possible for the synchronization signal for composite sync or SYNC ON GREEN.
- Image may be disrupted for a few seconds during automatic adjustment, but this is not a malfunction.
- Adjustment is required for each input signal.
- Automatic adjustment can be canceled by pressing the <MENU> button or the <RETURN> button during the automatic adjustment operation.
- Even if a signal possible to perform the automatic setup is being input, it may not be able to adjust correctly if the automatic setup function is used while the moving image is being input.
- If the [DISPLAY OPTION] menu → [SIGNAL SEARCH] is set to [ON], the signal search function is activated when the <AUTO SETUP/ CANCEL> button is pressed while no signal is input.
- For details of the signal search function, refer to the [DISPLAY OPTION] menu  $\rightarrow$  [SIGNAL SEARCH] ( $\Rightarrow$  page 108).

# Using the screen adjustment function

The [SCREEN ADJUSTMENT] menu can be displayed.

Correct the distortion of the image that occurs when the projector is installed tilted or when the screen is tilted or curved.

#### 

#### 1) Press the <SCREEN ADJ> button.

• The [SCREEN ADJUSTMENT] screen is displayed.

#### 2) Press **♦** to switch the item.

• The items will switch each time you press the button.

• Proceed to Step 3) when anything other than [OFF] is selected.

#### 3) Press the <ENTER> button.

• The [KEYSTONE] screen, the [CORNER CORRECTION] screen, or the [CURVED CORRECTION] screen is displayed.

#### Note

- To adjust [KEYSTONE] or [CURVED CORRECTION], press ▲▼ to select the item to adjust, and press ◀▶ to adjust the item.
- To adjust [CORNER CORRECTION], press ▲▼ to select the item to adjust. Individual adjustment screen is displayed by pressing the <ENTER> button. Adjust the item using ▲▼◀▶.
- Only one of the [KEYSTONE], [CORNER CORRECTION], or [CURVED CORRECTION] setting is enabled.
- Refer to the [POSITION] menu  $\rightarrow$  [SCREEN ADJUSTMENT] ( $\Rightarrow$  page 93) for details.


# Using the digital zoom function


(When RGB signal for still images, HDMI signal for still images, or DIGITAL LINK signal for still images is input. Or, when MEMORY VIEWER, Panasonic APPLICATION, or MIRRORING is input.) Enlarge the image or move the enlargement area of the image.



#### 1) Press the <D.ZOOM-> button/<D.ZOOM+> button.

- When executed from the remote control operation, the [DIGITAL ZOOM] individual adjustment screen is not displayed, and the move screen is displayed.
- When executed from the menu operation, the [DIGITAL ZOOM] individual adjustment screen is displayed.
   For details, refer to the [DISPLAY OPTION] menu → [DIGITAL ZOOM] (→ page 111).
- 2) Move the enlargement position or adjust the magnification with following button operation.
  - The digital zoom is canceled when the <AUTO SETUP/CANCEL> button on the remote control or the <LENS/CANCEL> button on the control panel is pressed while performing the digital zoom.





#### Note

- The magnification is not displayed in the move screen.
- The adjustment value of the digital zoom is canceled when the type of input signal is changed while performing the digital zoom.
- The freeze function is disabled while performing the digital zoom.
- The digital zoom will not operate in some of the still image signals.

# Switching the image aspect ratio

Switch the image aspect ratio according to the input.

#### <sup>ASPECT</sup> 9 button

- 1) Press the <ASPECT> button.
  - The setting will change each time you press the button.

#### Note

Refer to the [POSITION] menu → [ASPECT] (→ page 90) for details.

# Using the presentation timer function

The presentation timer can be operated.

The presentation can be performed while confirming the elapsed time or remaining time against the specified time.



- 1) Press the <P-TIMER> button.
  - Starts the count.
- 2) Press the <P-TIMER> button again.
  - Stops the count.

#### Note

- The elapsed time or remaining time is displayed at the bottom right of the projected image while using the presentation timer.
- The count will restart when the <P-TIMER> button is pressed while the count is stopped.
- The presentation timer is ended when the <P-TIMER> button is pressed and held for 3 seconds or longer.
- For details such as setting of the presentation timer function, refer to the [DISPLAY OPTION] menu → [P-TIMER] (
   → page 110).

# Using the function button

By assigning the following functions to the <FUNCTION> button, it can be used as a simplified shortcut button. [SUB MEMORY], [SYSTEM SELECTOR], [DAYLIGHT VIEW]



#### 1) Press the <FUNCTION> button.

#### Note

Assignment of the function is performed from the [PROJECTOR SETUP] menu → [FUNCTION BUTTON] (⇒ page 122).

# **Displaying internal test pattern**

To confirm the status of the projector, ten types of internal test patterns can be displayed. To display test patterns, perform the following steps.



- 1) Press the <TEST PATTERN> button.
- 2) Press **♦** to select the test pattern.

#### Note

- Test patterns can also be displayed using the menu operation. Refer to "[TEST PATTERN] menu" (> page 132) for details.
- Settings of position, size, and other factors will not be reflected in test patterns. Make sure to display the input signal before performing various adjustments.



# Using the status function

Display the status of the projector.

#### Setting ID number of the remote control

When you use the multiple projectors together, you can operate all the projectors simultaneously or each projector individually using a single remote control, if a unique ID number is assigned to each projector.

After setting the ID number of the projector, set same ID number on the remote control.

The factory default ID number of the projector is set to [ALL]. When using a single projector, press the <ID ALL> button on the remote control. Also, you can control a projector by pressing the <ID ALL> button on the remote control even if you do not know the projector ID.



- 1) Press the <ID SET> button on the remote control.
- 2) Within five seconds, press and set the one-digit or two-digit ID number set on the projector body using the number (<0> <9>) buttons.
  - If you press the <ID ALL> button, you can control the projectors regardless of the ID number setting of the projector body.

#### Attention

Since the ID number of the remote control can be set without the projector body, do not press the <ID SET> button on the remote control carelessly. If the <ID SET> button is pressed and no number (<0> - <9>) buttons are pressed within five seconds, the ID number returns to its original value before the <ID SET> button was pressed.

• The ID number set on the remote control will be stored unless it is set again. However, it will be erased if the remote control is left with dead batteries. Set the same ID number again when the batteries are replaced.

#### Note

Set the ID number of the projector from the [PROJECTOR SETUP] menu → [PROJECTOR ID] (+ page 113).

<sup>•</sup> When the ID number of the remote control is set to [0], the projectors can be controlled regardless of the ID number setting on the projector, same as when set to [ALL].



- Individual adjustment screen is cleared automatically if no operation is performed for approximately five seconds.

- The cursor color depends on the setting in the [DISPLAY OPTION] menu → [ON-SCREEN DISPLAY] → [OSD DESIGN]. The selected item
  is displayed with the yellow cursor by the factory default.
- In the portrait setting, the on-screen menu is displayed sideways. To display the on-screen menu vertically, change the setting of the [DISPLAY OPTION] menu → [ON-SCREEN DISPLAY] → [OSD ROTATION].

#### Resetting adjustment values to the factory default

If the <DEFAULT> button on the remote control is pressed, the values adjusted in the menu items are restored to the factory default settings.



- To reset all the settings adjusted in the sub-menu item to the factory default one at a time, execute the [PROJECTOR SETUP] menu → [INITIALIZE].
- Some items cannot be reset to the factory default settings even when the <DEFAULT> button on the remote control is pressed. Adjust those
  items individually.
- The triangular mark under the bar scale in the individual adjustment screen indicates the factory default setting. The position of the triangular mark varies according to the selected input signals.





| [NORMAL] | Set this item when high luminance is required. The light power is 100 % and the estimated runtime is approximately 20 000 hours*1.  |

Make the following settings on the projector as the data copy destination in advance. For details, refer to "Setting [WRITE PROTECT]" (+ page 128).

<sup>•</sup> The data cloning function will not operate when the models of the projectors are different. For example, data of PT-MZ670 can be copied to other PT-MZ670 projectors, but it can not be copied to PT-MW630. Data cloning is limited to the same model.

#### Note

# Sub memory

The projector has a sub memory function that can register the multiple image adjustment data, even if it is recognized as the same signal by the frequency or format of the synchronization signal source. Use this function when you need to switch the aspect or adjust the picture quality such as the white balance while using the same signal source. The sub memory includes all the data that can be adjusted for each signal, such as the image aspect ratio and data adjusted in the [PICTURE] menu (items such as [CONTRAST] and [BRIGHTNESS]).

# Registering to the sub memory

- 1) While in the normal screen (where no menu is displayed), press ▲▼.
  - The sub memory registration screen is displayed if the sub memory is not registered. Proceed to Step 3).
  - A list of sub memories registered to the signal currently input is displayed.
  - The <FUNCTION> button on the remote control can be used instead of ▲▼ when [SUB MEMORY] is selected from the [PROJECTOR SETUP] menu → [FUNCTION BUTTON].

# Chapter 5 **Operations**

This chapter describes how to use each function.

## **Network connection**

The projector is equipped with the network function, and following is possible by connecting to a computer.

#### Web control

Setting, adjustment, and displaying status of the projector are possible by accessing the projector from a computer.

Refer to "Web control function" (→ page 159) for details.

#### Smart Projector Control

This application software sets and adjusts the projector connected via LAN using a smartphone or a tablet. For details or downloading application software, visit the Panasonic website (https://panasonic.net/cns/projector/).

#### Multi Monitoring & Control Software

"Multi Monitoring & Control Software", a software application to monitor and control multiple display devices (projector or flat panel display) connected to intranet, can be used.

Plug-in software "Early Warning Software", which monitors the status of the display devices and their peripherals within an intranet, and notifies of abnormality of such equipment and detects the signs of possible abnormality, can also be used.

For details, visit the Panasonic website (https://panasonic.net/cns/projector/).

#### Image transfer application software

Using the Panasonic image transfer application software, the image sent from a device can be displayed as a projected image.

For details, refer to "Projecting with Panasonic APPLICATION input" (

For how to use the image transfer application software "Wireless Manager ME6.4" compatible to the Windows computer or Mac, refer to the Operating Instructions of "Wireless Manager ME6.4".

For the method of pairing the projector and the USB memory, refer to "Using the pairing function" (→ page 194). By pairing, the connection information between the image transfer application software "Plug and Share", and the projector and the USB memory is written into the USB memory.

The application software and Operating Instructions for "Wireless Manager ME6.4" and "Plug and Share" can be used by downloading from the Panasonic website (https://panasonic.net/cns/projector/).

For details of the image transfer application software "Wireless Projector" compatible with the iPad/iPhone/iPod touch or Android device, refer to the Panasonic website (https://panasonic.net/cns/projector/).

#### • Mirroring

By using the mirroring function, the screen of the device connected via wireless LAN can be displayed as a projected image.

PJLink

Operation or status query of the projector can be performed from a computer using the PJLink protocol. Refer to "PJLink protocol" (
page 210) for details.


### Command control

Operation or status query of the projector can be performed from a computer using the control command. Refer to "Control commands via LAN" ( page 211) for details.

#### Connecting via wired LAN

This projector can receive the Ethernet signal from the twisted-pair-cable transmitter together with the video, audio, and serial control signal via a LAN cable.

#### Example of a normal network connection




#### Attention

. When a LAN cable is directly connected to the projector, the network connection must be made indoors.

#### Note

- A LAN cable is required to use the network function via wired LAN.
- Connect a LAN cable to send and receive the Ethernet signal to the <LAN> terminal or the <DIGITAL LINK/LAN> terminal of the projector.
- Use a straight or crossover LAN cable that is compatible with CAT5 or higher. Either the straight or the crossover cable, or both cables
  can be used depending on the system configuration. Consult your network administrator. The projector will determine the type of the cable
  (straight or crossover) automatically.
- Use a LAN cable of 100 m (328'1") or shorter.

#### Example of network connections via a twisted-pair-cable transmitter



#### Attention

When a LAN cable is directly connected to the projector, the network connection must be made indoors.

#### Note

- For the LAN cable between the twisted-pair-cable transmitter and the projector, use a cable that meets the following criteria:
- Conforming to CAT5e or higher standards
- Shielded type (including connectors)
- Straight-through
- Single wire
- The maximum transmission distance between the twisted-pair-cable transmitter and the projector is 100 m (328'1"). It is possible to transmit up to 150 m (492'2") if the twisted-pair-cable transmitter supports the long-reach communication method. However, the signal that the projector can receive is only up to 1080/60p (1 920 x 1 080 dots, dot clock frequency 148.5 MHz) for the long-reach communication method. If this distance is exceeded, image may be disrupted or a malfunction may occur in LAN communication.

- When laying cables between the twisted-pair-cable transmitter and the projector, confirm that cable characteristics are compatible with CAT5e or higher using tools such as a cable tester or cable analyzer.
- When a relay connector is used, include it in the measurement.
- Do not use a hub between the twisted-pair-cable transmitter and the projector.
- Do not pull cables forcefully. Also, do not bend or fold cables unnecessarily.
- To reduce the effects of noise as much as possible, stretch out the cables between the twisted-pair-cable transmitter and the projector without any loops.
- Lay the cables between the twisted-pair-cable transmitter and the projector away from other cables, particularly power cables.
- When laying multiple cables, run them side by side along the shortest distance possible without bundling them together.
- After laying the cable, confirm that the value of [SIGNAL QUALITY] in the [NETWORK/USB] menu → [DIGITAL LINK STATUS] is displayed in green, which indicates a normal quality.
- For twisted-pair-cable transmitters of other manufacturers that the operation has been verified with this projector, visit the Panasonic website (https://panasonic.net/cns/projector/). Note that the verification for devices of other manufacturers has been made for the items set by Panasonic Corporation, and not all the operations have been verified. For operation or performance problems caused by the devices of other manufacturers, contact the respective manufacturers.

#### Setting the projector

- 1) Connect the projector to a computer using a LAN cable.
- 2) Turn on the power of the projector.
- 3) From the main menu, select the [NETWORK/USB] menu  $\rightarrow$  [WIRED LAN], and press the <ENTER> button.

#### 4) Perform the [WIRED LAN] setting.



The status of the projector is displayed by clicking this item.

#### 3 [Projector control]

The [Projector control] page is displayed by clicking this item.

#### 4 [Detailed set up]

The [Detailed set up] page is displayed by clicking this item.

#### 5 [Change password]

The [Change password] page is displayed by clicking this item.

6 [Crestron Connected(TM)] The operation page of Crestron Connected™ is displayed by clicking this item.

#### [Projector status] page

Click [Status]  $\rightarrow$  [Projector status].

Display the status of the projector for the following items.



1 [PROJECTOR TYPE]

Displays the type of the projector.

- 2 [PROJECTOR NAME]
- Displays the projector name set for the projector.
- 3 [MAIN VERSION]

Displays the main version of the firmware of the projector.

- 4 [POWER]
- Displays the status of the power.

#### 5 [SHUTTER]

Displays the status of the shutter function ([ON]: Enabled (closed), [OFF]: Disabled (open)).

6 [PICTURE MODE] Displays the setting status of [PICTURE MODE].

### 7 [SERIAL NUMBER]

- Displays the serial number of the projector.
- 8 [NETWORK VERSION] Displays the network version of the firmware of the projector.
- **9** [LIGHT POWER] Displays the setting status of [LIGHT POWER].
- 10 [VOLUME]

Display the volume status.

11 [REMOTE1 STATUS]

Displays the control status of the <REMOTE 1 IN> terminal.

- 12 [INPUT]
- Displays the status of the selected input.
- 13 [INTAKE AIR TEMPERATURE] Displays the status of the intake air temperature of the projector.
- 14 [EXHAUST AIR TEMPERATURE] Displays the status of the exhaust air temperature of the projector.
- **15** [LIGHT TEMPERATURE1] Displays the temperature status of light source 1.
- **16** [LIGHT TEMPERATURE2] Displays the temperature status of light source 2.
- 17 [LIGHT] Displays the lighting status and runtime of the light source.
- 18 [SELF TEST] Displays the self-diagnosis information.
- **19 [PROJECTOR RUNTIME]** Displays the runtime of the projector.


#### Error information page

When [Error (Detail)] or [Warning (Detail)] is displayed in the [SELF TEST] display field of the **[Projector status]** screen, click it to display the content of the error/warning.

• The projector may go into the standby status to protect the projector depending on the contents of the error.

 Displays the alphanumeric symbols and content of errors/ warnings that occur.

#### [Network status] page

#### Click [Status] $\rightarrow$ [Network status].

The current network setting status is displayed.



1 [WIRED LAN] Displays the settings of wired LAN.

#### 2 [WIRELESS LAN]

Displays the settings of wireless LAN when the optional Wireless Module (Model No.: ET-WM300) is attached.

#### [Access error log] page

Click [Status]  $\rightarrow$  [Access error log].

The error log on the web server is displayed such as access to the pages that do not exist or access with unauthorized user names or passwords.



#### [Mail error log] page

Click [Status]  $\rightarrow$  [Mail error log].

E-mail error log is displayed if periodic E-mail sending has failed.



#### Note

- [Access error log] and [Mail error log] display the recent few thousand accesses/requests. All information may not be displayed when many accesses/requests are made at once.
- Logs in [Access error log] and [Mail error log] are deleted from the oldest when exceeding a certain amount.
- Check [Access error log] and [Mail error log] periodically.

#### [Basic control] page

Click [Projector control]  $\rightarrow$  [Basic control].



#### 1 [POWER]

Turns off/on the power.

#### 2 [SHUTTER]

Switches whether to use the shutter function (enabled (shutter: closed)/disabled (shutter: open)).

3 [OSD]

Switches on (display)/off (hide) the on-screen display function.

4 [SYSTEM]

Switches the system method.

- 5 On-screen display of the projector Displays the same items as shown on the on-screen display of the projector. You can check or change the settings of the menus. It is displayed even if the on-screen display function is set to off (hide).
- 6 [INPUT SELECT] Switches the input signal.

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#### [Detail control] page

#### Click [Projector control] → [Detail control].



#### 1 Control of the projector

The projector is controlled by clicking the buttons in the same way as the buttons on the remote control. After control, the onscreen display of the projector at the right of the control page is updated.

### [SUB MEMORY] Switches the sub memory. [DAYLIGHT VIEW]

Switches the day light view setting.

4 [FREEZE] Temporarily pauses the image.

### 6 [STATUS]

[MUTE]

The [STATUS] screen is displayed on the projected image.

Switches whether to use the mute function.

7 [LENS]

Displays the [LENS] page.

- 8 [TEST PATTERN]
- Displays the test pattern.

#### 9 [GET OSD]

Updates the on-screen display of the projector at the right of the control page.

#### [LENS] page

Click [Projector control]  $\rightarrow$  [Detail control]  $\rightarrow$  [LENS].



#### 1 [HOME POSITION]

Moves the projection lens to the home position.

#### 2 [SHIFT]

Click  $\blacktriangle \lor \blacklozenge \lor$  to adjust the lens shift (vertical position and horizontal position).

The adjustment can be performed faster by holding down the button for approximately three seconds or longer.

#### 3 [FOCUS]

Click **♦** to adjust the focus. The adjustment can be performed faster by holding down the button for approximately three seconds or longer.

#### 4 [ZOOM]

Click ◀▶ to adjust the zoom. The adjustment can be performed faster by clicking and holding the button for approximately three seconds or longer.

#### 5 [Back]

Returns to the [Detail control] page.

#### [Network config] page


Click [Detailed set up]  $\rightarrow$  [Network config].

• To use the wireless LAN function with the projector, it is necessary to attach the optional Wireless Module (Model No.: ET-WM300).

For details on how to attach the optional Wireless Module (Model No.: ET-WM300), refer to "Attaching the Wireless Module" (→ page 51).

#### 1) Click [Network config].

• Click [Network config] to display the [CAUTION!] screen.



#### 2) Place a check mark in the item to change the setting.







Enter the subnet mask if the DHCP server is not used.

#### 4 [DEFAULT GATEWAY]

Enter the default gateway address if the DHCP server is not used.

#### 5 [DNS1]

Enter the DNS1 server address. Permissible characters for the entry of DNS1 server address (primary): Numbers (0 - 9), period (.)

#### 6 [DNS2]

Enter the DNS2 server address. Available characters for the entry of DNS2 server address (secondary):

Numbers (0 - 9), period (.)

#### 7 [SSID]


Enter the same string as the SSID registered to the access point.

#### 8 [Back], [Next]

Click the [Back] button to return to the previous screen. Click the [Next] button to proceed to the next screen.

#### 9 [AUTHENTICATION]

Select the user authentication method used in the network to which the projector is connected.



#### 10 [EAP]

Select the EAP set for the RADIUS server.

#### 11 [ENCRYPTION]

Select the encryption method used for the communication between the projector and the network.

#### 12 [Back], [Next]

Click the [Back] button to return to the previous screen. Click the [Next] button to display the screen to confirm the setting. Click the [Submit] button to update the setting.

#### 13 [KEY]

Set the key to be used with USER. Enter 8 to 63 characters of ASCII character, or 64-digit hexadecimal number.

#### 14 [USER NAME]

Enter the user name to be used for authentication in single-byte alphanumeric characters (excluding the space). (Maximum of 64 characters)

#### 15 [PASSWORD]

Enter the password to be used for authentication in single-byte alphanumeric characters. (Maximum of 64 characters)

#### 16 [DIGITAL CERTIFICATE] Registers the electronic cer

Registers the electronic certificate to be used for authentication (file extension:  $\mathsf{PFX}$ ).

#### 17 [CA CERTIFICATE]


Registers the CA certificate to be used for authentication (file extension: CER).

#### Note

• The content of setting varies depending on the authentication method of the wireless LAN to be connected.

#### [Adjust clock] page

Click [Detailed set up]  $\rightarrow$  [Adjust clock].



- 1 [Time Zone] Select the time zone.
- 2 [Set time zone] Updates the time zone setting.
- 3 [NTP SYNCHRONIZATION] Set to [ON] when setting the date and time automatically.

#### 4 [NTP SERVER NAME]

Enter the IP address or server name of the NTP server when you set to adjust the date and time manually. (To enter the server name, the DNS server needs to be set up.)

#### **[Date]** Enter the date to be changed.

6 [Time] Enter the time to be changed.


7 [Set date and time] Updates the date and time settings.

• The replacement of the battery inside the projector is required when the time goes out of alignment right after correcting the time. Consult your dealer.

#### [Ping test] page

Check whether the network is connected to the E-mail server, POP server, DNS server, etc.

Enter the IP address of the server to be tested.



Executes the connection test.

#### [E-mail set up] page

When there is a problem or the runtime of the light source reaches the preset value, an E-mail can be sent to previously set E-mail addresses (up to two addresses).

Click [Detailed set up]  $\rightarrow$  [E-mail set up].



#### 1 [ENABLE]

Select [Enable] to use the E-mail function.

#### 2 [SMTP SERVER NAME]

Enter the IP address or the server name of the E-mail server (SMTP). To enter the server name, the DNS server needs to be set up.

#### 3 [MAIL FROM]

Enter the E-mail address of the projector. (Up to 63 characters in single byte)

#### 4 [MEMO]

Enter information such as the location of the projector that notifies the sender of the E-mail. (Up to 63 characters in single byte)



#### 7 [E-MAIL ADDRESS 1], [E-MAIL ADDRESS 2]

Enter the E-mail address to be sent. Leave [E-MAIL ADDRESS 2] blank when two E-mail addresses are not to be used.

#### 5 [MINIMUM TIME]

Change the minimum interval for the temperature warning E-mail. The default value is 60 minutes. In this case, another E-mail will not be sent for 60 minutes after sending the temperature warning E-mail even if it reaches the warning temperature.

#### 6 [INTAKE AIR TEMPERATURE]

Change the temperature setting for the temperature warning mail. A temperature warning E-mail is sent when the temperature exceeds this value.



8 Settings of the conditions to send E-mail Select the conditions to send E-mail.
[MAIL CONTENTS]: Select either [NORMAL] or [SIMPLE].
[ERROR]: Send an E-mail when an error occurred in the self-diagnosis.
[INTAKE AIR TEMPERATURE]: Send an E-mail when the intake air temperature has reached the value set at the above field.
[PERIODIC REPORT]: Place a check mark on this to send an E-mail periodically.



#### 9 [Submit]

Update the settings.

#### [Authentication set up] page

Set the authentication items when POP authentication or SMTP authentication is necessary to send an E-mail. Click [Detailed set up]  $\rightarrow$  [Authentication set up].



#### 1 [Auth]

Select the authentication method specified by your Internet service provider.

#### [SMTP Auth] 2

Set when the SMTP authentication is selected.

#### 3 [POP server name]

Enter the POP server name. Allowed characters: Alphanumerics (A - Z, a - z, 0 - 9) Minus sign (-) and period (.)

#### [User name] 4

Enter the user name for the POP server or the SMTP server.

#### [ECO management set up] page

[Password] Enter the password for the POP server or the SMTP server.

- [SMTP server port] 6 Enter the port number of the SMTP server. (Normally 25)
- [POP server port] 7 Enter the port number of the POP server. (Normally 110)
- 8 [Submit] Update the settings.

#### 1 [LIGHT POWER]

Displays the [LIGHT POWER] setting.

- [AMBIENT LIGHT DETECTION] 2 Enables ([ON])/disables ([OFF]) the ambient light detection function.
- [SIGNAL DETECTION] 3 Enables ([ON])/disables ([OFF]) the signal detection function.
- 4 [POWER MANAGEMENT] Displays the [POWER MANAGEMENT] setting.

#### 5 [TIMER]

Select the time until the light source is turned off after the power management function is operated.

#### [QUIK STARTUP] 6 Displays the [QUICK STARTUP] setting.

- 7 [VALID PERIOD] Select the valid period until the [QUICK STARTUP] function is disabled after going into the standby mode. [Submit] 8
- Updates the setting

## **Projecting with Panasonic APPLICATION input**

Using the Panasonic application, the image sent from a device connected via LAN can be displayed as a projected image.

The image transfer application software used for Panasonic APPLICATION input are as follows.

- Plug and Share
- Wireless Projector for iOS, Wireless Projector for Android

- "Plug and Share" allows to write the connection information between the image transfer application software "Plug and Share", and the
  projector and the USB memory by attaching the USB memory to the <VIEWER/PAIRING> terminal of the projector. By connecting this
  paired USB memory to the USB terminal of the Windows computer or Mac, "Plug and Share" will automatically start up and perform the
  connection operation to the projector. For details on the pairing method, refer to "Using the pairing function" (+ page 194).



- 7) Enter the user name and password with moderator rights.
  - The factory default setting of the user name is moderator, and the password is @Panasonic.
- 8) Click OK.
  - The [MODERATOR MODE] page is displayed.



- 9) Click the device to allow connection.
  - Select the device to display the screen with the projector from the names of devices displayed in the [MODERATOR MODE] page.
  - After a while, the screen of the selected device is displayed as a projected image.



In this case, all the still image files inside a single folder is automatically played back following the setting in the [NETWORK/USB] menu  $\rightarrow$  [MEMORY VIEWER] ( $\Rightarrow$  page 146)  $\rightarrow$  [INTERVAL] and [EFFECT].

### 1) Press ▲▼◀▶ to select the file to project first from the thumbnail, and press the <ENTER> button.

- Playback starts in the full-screen display.
- Press the <ENTER> button during playback to pause automatic playback. Press it again to resume playback.
- After playback ends, playback of the next file starts.
- Press ▶ during playback to continue the automatic playback from the next image after skipping the file currently playing back.
- Press 4 during playback to continue the automatic playback after returning back to the previous file.
- Press **A** during playback to rotate the image 90° clockwise while retaining the aspect ratio.
- Press **v** during playback to rotate the image 90° counterclockwise while retaining the aspect ratio.

#### 2) Press the <AUTO SETUP/CANCEL> button.

• Automatic playback ends and the Memory Viewer screen (thumbnail view) returns.

#### When automatic playback is disabled

This section describes the operation method when the [NETWORK/USB] menu  $\rightarrow$  [MEMORY VIEWER]  $\rightarrow$  [AUTOPLAY] ( $\Rightarrow$  page 147) is set to [OFF]. In this case, files to be projected are selected and played back one by one.

#### 1) Press $\blacktriangle \lor \blacklozenge \lor \blacklozenge$ to select a file from the thumbnail, and press the <ENTER> button.

- The selected still image is played back in the full-screen display.
- Press > to playback the next file.
- Press ◀ to playback the previous file.
- Press **A** to rotate the image 90° clockwise while retaining the aspect ratio.
- Press ▼ to rotate the image 90° counterclockwise while retaining the aspect ratio.

#### 2) Press the <AUTO SETUP/CANCEL> button.

• Full-screen display ends and the Memory Viewer screen in thumbnail view returns.


#### Note

- When the recorded number of pixels is smaller than the maximum number of display dot<sup>\*1</sup>, it will be displayed enlarged maintaining the aspect ratio.
- When the recorded number of pixels is larger than the maximum number of display dot<sup>-1</sup>, it will be displayed reduced maintaining the aspect ratio.
- Order of the playback follows the display order set in the [NETWORK/USB] menu  $\rightarrow$  [MEMORY VIEWER]  $\rightarrow$  [SORT] ( $\blacklozenge$  page 147).
- Also in the cases where still image and movie files both exist in the same folder, they are played back according to the [SORT] setting. • The operating guide at the bottom of the playback screen can be erased by setting the [NETWORK/USB] menu  $\rightarrow$  [MEMORY VIEWER]  $\rightarrow$  [GUIDE] ( $\Rightarrow$  page 147) to [OFF].
- Playback ends and the Memory Viewer screen returns when the contents list is distributed using the "Multi Monitoring & Control Software" during playback. To resume the playback of still images, perform the playback operation after the distribution of contents list is completed.
- \*1 The maximum number of display dot for each product is as follows. PT-MZ670, PT-MZ570: 1 920 x 1 080
- PT-MW630, PT-MW530: 1 280 x 800

### Playing back movies

This section describes the procedure using an operation example on the Memory Viewer screen in thumbnail view.

Playback on the Memory Viewer screen in list view can be performed with the same procedure except for the file selection.



Example of display during fast-forward playback (x10 speed)

#### When automatic playback is enabled

This section describes the operation method when the [NETWORK/USB] menu  $\rightarrow$  [MEMORY VIEWER]  $\rightarrow$  [AUTOPLAY] ( $\Rightarrow$  page 147) is set to [ON].

In this case, all movie files in the same folder are played back automatically.

#### 1) Press ▲▼◀▶ to select the file to project first from the thumbnail, and press the <ENTER> button.

- Playback starts in the full-screen display.
- Press the <ENTER> button during playback to pause playback. Press it again to resume playback from the position where the playback has been stopped.
- After playback ends, playback of the next file starts.
- Press ▶ during playback to perform the fast-forward playback. The speed is increased every time ▶ is pressed. (3 levels)
- Press < during playback to perform the rewind playback. The speed is increased every time < is pressed. (3 levels)
- Press ▲ during playback to play back the file being played back from the start. (cue)
- Press > while paused to play back the next file skipping the file being played back.
- Press **4** while paused to go back and play back the previous file.

# 2) Press the <AUTO SETUP/CANCEL> button.

• Automatic playback ends and the Memory Viewer screen (thumbnail view) returns.

#### When automatic playback is disabled

This section describes the operation method when the [NETWORK/USB] menu  $\rightarrow$  [MEMORY VIEWER]  $\rightarrow$ [AUTOPLAY] (➡ page 147) is set to [OFF].

In this case, files to be projected are selected and played back one by one.

- Press ▲▼◀▶ to select a file from the thumbnail, and press the <ENTER> button.
  - Playback starts in the full-screen display.
  - Press the <ENTER> button during playback to pause playback. Press it again to resume playback from the position where the playback has been stopped.
  - After playback ends, playback goes into pause state at the beginning of the file.
  - Press b during playback to perform the fast-forward playback. The speed is increased every time b is pressed. (3 levels)
  - (3 levels)

  - Press be while paused to play back the next file skipping the file being played back.
  - Press < while paused to go back and play back the previous file.

#### 2) Press the <AUTO SETUP/CANCEL> button.

• Full-screen display ends and the Memory Viewer screen in thumbnail view returns.

#### Note

- When the recorded number of pixels is smaller than the maximum number of display dot<sup>1</sup>, it will be displayed enlarged maintaining the aspect ratio.
- When the recorded number of pixels is larger than the maximum number of display dot<sup>-1</sup>, it will be displayed reduced maintaining the aspect ratio.
- Order of the playback follows the display order set in the [NETWORK/USB] menu → [MEMORY VIEWER] → [SORT] (
   → page 147).
- Also in the cases where still image and movie files both exist in the same folder, they are played back according to the [SORT] setting. The time bar in the operating guide at the bottom of the playback screen can be erased by setting the [NETWORK/USB] menu →
- [MEMORY VIEWER]  $\rightarrow$  [GUIDE] ( $\Rightarrow$  page 147) to [OFF]. Playback ends and the Memory Viewer screen returns when the contents list is distributed using the "Multi Monitoring & Control Software"
- during playback. To resume the playback of movies, perform the playback operation after the distribution of contents list is completed. The maximum number of display dot for each product is as follows.
- PT-MZ670, PT-MZ570: 1 920 x 1 080 PT-MW630, PT-MW530: 1 280 x 800

#### **Resume playback**

When the automatic playback is disabled (the [NETWORK/USB] menu  $\rightarrow$  [MEMORY VIEWER]  $\rightarrow$  [AUTOPLAY] ( page 147) is set to [OFF]), resume playback can be performed.

Resume playback is a function that stops movie playback in the middle and restarts playback from the position where the movie has been stopped the last time when the same file is to be played back next time.

The following operations resume playback from the position where the last playback has been stopped.

- Stopping movie playback in the middle, going back to the Memory Viewer screen, and then selecting the same movie file again and playing it back
- After playing back other movie or still image files, selecting the previous movie file and playing it back

#### Note

- Resume information (information on the position when movie playback is stopped in the middle) is automatically saved at the time when playback is paused by pressing the <ENTER> button during playback or when full-screen display is ended by pressing the <AUTO SETUP/ CANCEL > button during playback
- Resume information (information on the position when movie playback is stopped in the middle) of 50 movie files can be saved. After the 51st movie file is played back, resume information will be deleted in order from the oldest.
- When resume playback is performed, some files may not be played back from the correct position where the last playback has been stopped.
- All resume information is discarded when following operation is performed.
  - Removing the USB memory
  - Disconnecting the power cord

# Description of the Memory Viewer screen

The icons on the Memory Viewer screen indicate the following.

# Playing back using the contents list

When the [NETWORK/USB] menu  $\rightarrow$  [MEMORY VIEWER]  $\rightarrow$  [AUTOPLAY] is set to [SCENARIO], playback of still image or movie and transmission of the Light ID signal are performed automatically following the setting of the contents list saved in the USB memory. To transmit the Light ID signal, it is necessary to set the [PROJECTOR SETUP] menu  $\rightarrow$  [LightID] to [EXTERNAL CONTROL].

The contents list is generated with the "Multi Monitoring & Control Software", and it can be saved in the USB memory, etc. For details, refer to the Operating Instructions of "Multi Monitoring & Control Software".

- 1) Insert the USB memory with the contents list saved into the <VIEWER/PAIRING> terminal.
  - For the handling of the USB memory, refer to "Using the USB memory" (> page 70).
- 2) Press the <NETWORK/USB> button to switch the input to MEMORY VIEWER.
  - Every time the <NETWORK/USB> button is pressed, the input will switch in the order of MEMORY VIEWER, Panasonic APPLICATION, and MIRRORING. Press the <NETWORK/USB> button until the input switches to MEMORY VIEWER.
  - Once the input is switched to MEMORY VIEWER, playback is repeated automatically following the setting of the contents list.
- Press the <NETWORK/USB> button to switch the input to anything other than MEMORY VIEWER to end.
  - Once the input is switched to anything other than MEMORY VIEWER, playback using the contents list ends.

#### Note

- The contents list is the following 4 types of file. Generate it in advance using the "Multi Monitoring & Control Software".
  - Scenario file specifying the playback order and time (scenario.dat)
  - File list summarizing the playback file names (filelist.dat)
  - Light ID definition file to specify the Light ID (lightid.dat)
- Contents file to project movies and still images (jpg, mp4 etc.)
- Nothing is played back, when the [NETWORK/USB] menu → [MEMORY VIEWER] → [AUTOPLAY] is set to [SCENARIO] and there is no
  contents list in the USB memory, or there is defect in it.
- Playback can also be stopped by setting the [NETWORK/USB] menu → [MEMORY VIEWER] → [AUTOPLAY] to anything other than [SCENARIO].
- Playback is suspended and the contents list is updated when the contents list is distributed using the "Multi Monitoring & Control Software" during playback using the contents list. Once the update of contents list is completed, playback using the overwritten contents list resumes.

# Using the pairing function

When the following two conditions are met, the guide for wring the pairing data is displayed in the standby screen when the USB memory is connected to the <VIEWER/PAIRING> terminal.

- The [NETWORK/USB] menu  $\rightarrow$  [Panasonic APPLICATION]  $\rightarrow$  [PAIRING GUIDE] is set to [ON]
- Input is Panasonic APPLICATION

By wring the pairing data to the USB memory following the instruction, the pairing of the projector and that USB memory is completed.

Connection to the projector is automatically performed by attaching the USB memory paired with the projector to the USB terminal of the Windows computer or Mac, and starting the image transfer application software "Plug and Share" in the USB memory.

The pairing data is a connection information between the image transfer application software "Plug and Share", and the projector and the USB memory.

#### Attention


- Do not use a USB extension cable or a USB hub, and directly insert the USB memory into the <VIEWER/PAIRING> terminal of the projector.
- Do not insert the USB memory into the <DC OUT> terminal. The USB memory cannot be used on the <DC OUT> terminal.

#### Note

 If the USB memory cannot be directly connected to the <VIEWER/PAIRING> terminal of the projector, such as the projector is installed on the ceiling, it is possible to download the image transfer application software "Plug and Share" to a USB memory from the Panasonic website, and use it. Refer to the following URL. https://panasonic.net/cns/projector/

# Pairing the USB memory

- 1) Set the [NETWORK/USB] menu  $\rightarrow$  [Panasonic APPLICATION]  $\rightarrow$  [PAIRING GUIDE] to [ON].
- 2) Press the <NETWORK/USB> button to switch the input to Panasonic APPLICATION.
  - Every time the <NETWORK/USB> button is pressed, the input will switch in the order of MEMORY VIEWER, Panasonic APPLICATION, and MIRRORING. Press the <NETWORK/USB> button until the input switches to Panasonic APPLICATION.
  - The standby screen is displayed once the input is switched to Panasonic APPLICATION.
- 3) Connect the USB memory for pairing to the <VIEWER/PAIRING> terminal.
  - For the USB memory that can be used for pairing, refer to "USB memory that can be used with the projector" (→ page 70).
  - For the handling of the USB memory, refer to "Using the USB memory" (→ page 70).
- 4) When the confirmation message is displayed on the standby screen, press ◀▶ to select [OK], and press the <ENTER> button.



• The pairing data is written to the USB memory.

5) Once the completion message is displayed in the standby screen, remove the USB memory.



#### Note

- Use the commercially available USB memory formatted in FAT16 or FAT32 as the USB memory to be used for pairing. Approximately 30 MB of available space is required.
- Displaying of the image using the image transfer application software is not possible during pairing. Also, the pairing function cannot be used while displaying the image using the image transfer application software.
- For how to use the image transfer application software "Plug and Share", refer to the Operating Instructions of "Plug and Share". Operating Instructions of "Plug and Share" can be downloaded from the Panasonic website (https://panasonic.net/cns/projector/).

# Chapter 6 Maintenance

This chapter describes methods of inspection when there are problems, maintenance, and replacement of the units.


# Light source/temperature/filter indicators

# When an indicator lights up

If a problem occurs inside the projector, the slight source indicator <LIGHT>/temperature indicator <TEMP>/filter indicator <FILTER> will inform you by illuminating or blinking. Check the status of the indicators and take following measures.

#### Attention

• When switching off the projector to deal with problems, make sure to follow the procedure in "Switching off the projector" (> page 66).



# Light source indicator <LIGHT>

#### Note

 If the light source indicator <LIGHT> continues to light or blink even after the measure is taken, set the <MAIN POWER> switch to <OFF>, and ask your dealer for repair.

#### Note

• If the temperature indicator <TEMP> is still lit or blinking after taking the measures, ask your dealer for repair.

#### Note

• If the filter indicator <FILTER> is still lit or blinking after taking the measures, ask your dealer for repair.

• If the air filter unit is not attached when the projector is turned on, the filter indicator <FILTER> will blink in red.

When clogging of the filter is detected and the brightness of the light source is restricted, the [PROJECTOR SETUP] menu → [LightID]
 (⇒ page 116) will be set [OFF], and the Light ID signal will not be transmitted. Set it again after clearing the clogging.

# Maintenance/replacement

### Before performing maintenance/replacement

- Make sure to turn off the projector and disconnect the power plug from the outlet before maintaining or replacing the unit. (
   pages 58, 66)
- When switching off the projector, make sure to follow the procedures in "Switching off the projector" (
   page 66).

#### Maintenance

#### **Outer case**

Wipe off dirt and dust with a soft, dry cloth.

- If the dirt is persistent, soak the cloth with water and wring it thoroughly before wiping. Dry off the projector with a dry cloth.
- Do not use benzene, thinner, or rubbing alcohol, other solvents, or household cleaners. Doing so may
  deteriorate the outer case.
- When using chemically treated dust cloths, follow the instructions written on its packaging.

#### Lens front surface

Wipe off dirt and dust from the front surface of the lens with a soft clean cloth.

- Do not use a cloth that is fluffy, dusty, or soaked with oil/water.
- Since the lens is fragile, do not use excessive force when wiping the lens.

#### Attention

• The lens is made of glass. Impacts or excessive force when wiping may scratch its surface. Handle with care.

#### Air filter unit

Perform maintenance of the air filter unit in the following case.


 The air filter is clogged with dust, causing the filter replacement message to appear on the screen and the filter indicator <FILTER> to light in red.

#### Attention

 Make sure to secure the stability of the projector, and perform the maintenance in a safe location even if the air filter cover or the air filter unit falls accidentally.

When the air filter unit is replaced, reset the filter counter.
 If the filter counter is not reset after replacing the air filter unit, [FILTER COUNTER has reached the set time.] is displayed.
 For details of resetting the filter counter, refer to "Resetting the filter counter" (+ page 201).

#### Removing the air filter unit



#### 1) Turn off the power of the projector.

• Always follow the procedure of "Switching off the projector" (+ page 66) when turning off the power.

#### 2) Remove the air filter cover. (Fig. 1)


- Turn the air filter cover fixing screw (x 1) counterclockwise with a Phillips screwdriver until it turns freely, and remove the air filter cover by placing a finger in the depressed section and pull it out slowly in the direction of the arrow.
- When pulling out the air filter cover, make sure to place a hand on the air filter cover. Pulling it out too rapidly may cause the air filter cover to fall.

#### 3) Pull out the air filter unit. (Fig. 2)

- Slightly push the grip of the air filter unit inward in the direction of the arrow, remove from the tabs on the projector body, and pull out the air filter unit.
- After pulling out the air filter unit, remove any foreign object and dust from the air filter unit compartment and the projector's air intake port.

#### Performing maintenance of the air filter unit

Remove the air filter unit in advance with the procedure for "Removing the air filter unit" (
page 199) described previously.



#### 1) Wash the air filter unit. (Fig. 1)

- i) Soak the air filter unit in cold or warm water and then lightly rinse it.
  - Do not use cleaning tools such as brushes.
  - When rinsing, hold the frame of the air filter unit without putting strong pressure on the filter unit.
- ii) Rinse the air filter unit two to three times using fresh water each time.
  - Insufficient rinsing may result in odors.

#### 2) Dry the air filter unit. (Fig. 2)

- Let the air filter unit naturally dry off in a well-ventilated place where there is little dust and is not exposed to direct sunlight.
- Do not dry using drying devices such as dryers.
- Once the air filter is dried, proceed to "Attaching the air filter unit" (→ page 200) next.

#### Attaching the air filter unit

#### 1) Attach the air filter unit to the projector.

- Attach the air filter unit in the reverse procedure of Step 3) in "Removing the air filter unit" (> page 199).
- Push in the air filter unit all the way in until it clicks.

#### 2) Attach the air filter cover.

- Close the air filter cover in the reverse procedure of Step 2) in "Removing the air filter unit" (> page 199), and press it in all the way until it clicks.
- Securely tighten the air filter cover fixing screw (x 1) using a Phillips screwdriver.

#### Resetting the filter counter

- 1) Turn on the power of the projector.
- 2) Press the <MENU> button on the remote control or control panel.
  The [MAIN MENU] screen is displayed.
- 3) Press ▲▼ to select [PROJECTOR SETUP].
- 4) Press the <ENTER> button.
   The [PROJECTOR SETUP] screen is displayed.
- 5) Press ▲▼ to select [FILTER COUNTER].
- 6) Press the <ENTER> button.
  - The [FILTER COUNTER] screen is displayed.
- 7) Press ▲▼ to select [FILTER COUNTER RESET], and press the <ENTER> button.
- 8) The confirmation screen is displayed, so press **♦** to select [OK], and press the **<ENTER>** button.
  - Display of [FILTER COUNTER] will change to [0 H].

#### Attention

- After washing the air filter unit, dry it thoroughly before attaching it back to the projector. Attaching a wet unit will cause an electric shock or malfunction.
- Do not disassemble the air filter unit.
- Make sure that the air filter unit is properly attached before using the projector. If it is not attached, the projector will suck in dirt and dust causing a malfunction.
- Do not insert object from the hole of the air intake port. Doing so may cause damage.

#### Note

- When the projector is used without resetting the filter counter, the actual filter runtime (counter numeric value) will not be able to be confirmed.
- When the projector is used without attaching the air filter unit, the filter indicator <FILTER> will blink in red, and a message is displayed on the projected image for approximately 30 seconds.
- When the air filter unit is damaged or dirt does not come off even if it is washed, replace with the new optional Replacement Filter Unit (Model No.: ET-RFM100).
- Replacement to a new air filter unit is recommended after washing it twice.
- The dust-proof properties may be reduced after each cleaning.
- The replacement cycle of the air filter unit varies greatly depending on the usage environment.

# Replacing the unit

#### Air filter unit

Air filter unit should be replaced if the dirt does not come off after cleaning.

The Replacement Filter Unit (Model No.: ET-RFM100) is an optional accessory. To purchase the product, consult your dealer.

#### Air filter unit replacement procedure

#### Attention

- Make sure to turn off the projector before replacing the filter.
- When attaching the air filter unit, make sure to secure the stability of the projector, and execute in a safe location even if the air filter unit falls accidentally.

#### 1) Remove the air filter unit.

• Refer to "Removing the air filter unit" ( page 199).

#### 2) Attach the optional Replacement Filter Unit (Model No.: ET-RFM100) to the projector.

- The air filter unit has no difference between top and bottom, but is two-sided. Match the protrusion position of the air filter unit with the grooves on the projector body.
- Refer to "Attaching the air filter unit" (> page 200).

#### Attention

- When switching on the projector, make sure that the air filter unit is attached. If it is not attached, the projector will suck in dirt and dust causing a malfunction.
- When the projector is used without attaching the air filter unit, the filter indicator <FILTER> will blink in red, and a message is displayed on the projected image for approximately 30 seconds.

#### Note

The replacement cycle of the air filter unit varies greatly depending on the usage environment.

# FAQ

Refer to this section when there is a problem with the wireless LAN connection or connection with the mirroring function (noted as "mirroring connection" hereafter).

# Wireless LAN connection

#### ■ Wireless LAN connection cannot be established.

• To use the wireless LAN function with the projector, it is necessary to attach the optional Wireless Module (Model No.: ET-WM300).

For details on how to attach the optional Wireless Module (Model No.: ET-WM300), refer to "Attaching the Wireless Module" (→ page 51).

- Is the [NETWORK/USB] menu → [WIRELESS LAN] set to [DISABLE]?
- Confirm the settings of the device.
- Is there an obstacle between the device and the projector? Or, is the device too far away from the projector?
- Set the [NETWORK/USB] menu → [WIRELESS LAN] to [DISABLE] once, and then perform the wireless LAN connection operation again. Restoration process of the built-in Wireless Module is performed, which may enable the connection.

### ■ Image of the Panasonic APPLICATION input is disrupted.

- Under certain reception conditions, the image may be disrupted. In such a case, try the following.
  - Move the device to perform wireless LAN connection closer to the projector.
  - Install the projector away from other device that emits electromagnetic radiation, such as microwave oven, gaming device, etc. If it does not improve, refrain from using other devices that emit electromagnetic radiation.
  - The bandwidth of the wireless may not be sufficient when multiple wireless LAN devices are connected to a single router. Turn off the devices which are not used or refrain from using other devices.
  - Where possible, try not use the projector in a location where excessive static electricity or noise is generated.

# **Mirroring connection**

#### Mirroring connection is not established.

- Is the input set to MIRRORING?
- Is the [NETWORK/USB] menu → [WIRELESS LAN] set to [DISABLE]?
- Confirm the settings of the device.
- Is there an obstacle between the device and the projector? Or, is the device too far away from the projector?
- Connection may not be established correctly right after the device has restored from the sleep status, or right after switching the logon user. Turn the wireless LAN of the device off once and then on again, or restart the device.

#### The connection is disconnected and the image is not updating.

- Try the following when the mirroring connection is disconnected.
  - With the [PROJECTOR SETUP] menu → [ECO MANAGEMENT] → [STANDBY MODE] set to [ECO], turn the power of the projector off once and then back on.
  - After turning off the projector, reconnect the plug of the power cord to the outlet.
  - Restart the device.

#### ■ Image of the MIRRORING input is disrupted.

- Under certain reception conditions, the image may be disrupted. In such a case, try the following.
  - Move the device to perform wireless LAN connection closer to the projector.
  - Install the projector away from other device that emits electromagnetic radiation, such as microwave oven, gaming device, etc. If it does not improve, refrain from using other devices that emit electromagnetic radiation.
  - The bandwidth of the wireless may not be sufficient when multiple wireless LAN devices are connected to a single router. Turn off the devices which are not used or refrain from using other devices.
  - Where possible, try not use the projector in a location where excessive static electricity or noise is generated.
  - When the [NETWORK/USB] menu → [WIRELESS LAN] is set to [USER], it may improve when setting is changed to [SIMPLE] or [M-DIRECT]. End the mirroring connection once, and re-connect.

- It may improve by ending the mirroring connection once, and then change to a different channel in the [NETWORK/USB] menu → [MIRRORING] → [CHANNEL]. End the mirroring connection once, and reconnect.
- Confirm that there is no problem with the used contents.
- It may be caused by the processing performance or the wireless transfer performance of the device in use. Confirm the specification of the device.
- The connection was disconnected when not doing anything after performing the mirroring connection.
- Depending on the device in use, it may be set to disconnect the connection after specific time has elapsed. Confirm the energy saving setting, etc., of the device.
- It may improve by updating the firmware of the device in use or the driver of the wireless LAN. Consult with the customer support for the device.

# Other

- Depending on the device in use, confirmation screen for reconnection with the connection name of "from UNKNOWN" may display, but reconnection cannot be performed from that screen.
- Depending on the device in use, it may be requested to "delete the device" at the time of connection. In such case, delete the device following the instruction of the device.

Consult your dealer.
