



- SD memory card, SDHC memory card, and SDXC memory card are referred to as "SD memory card".

- A memory card with the "microP2" logo such as AJ-P2M032AG memory card (optional) is referred to as a "microP2 memory card".
- P2 memory card and microP2 memory card are referred to only as "P2 card" unless distinguished otherwise.
- Media such as external hard disk drives (HDD) connected to USB are referred to as "storage devices".
- Video that is created during a single recording operation is referred to as a "clip".

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Chapter 1 Overview

Before using the camera, read this chapter.

For accessories, refer to the leaflet supplied with the product.

Before using the camera

■ Before using the camera, always check if the built-in battery is not consumed, and then set the date/time.

The internal clock of the camera is reset when the built-in battery has been consumed. This may result in the metadata of the clip not recorded correctly, and it may not display correctly in the thumbnail screen.

Check if the built-in battery is not consumed before using. (page 35)

Also, set the correct date/time. (page 36)

When using this product during rain or snow or when at the beach, be careful that water does not get inside the camera recorder.

Water causes damage to the camera recorder and memory card. (Repair may be impossible)

■ Keep the camera recorder away from devices (TVs, TV games, etc.) that produce magnetism.

- If you use the camera recorder on or near TVs, video and sound data may be distorted by electromagnetic waves.
- Strong magnetic fields produced by speakers and large motors may cause damage to recorded contents and may distort images.
- · Electromagnetic waves emitted by microcomputers may have a harmful effect on the camera recorder and may corrupt video and sound data.
- The camera recorder may not operate properly if it receives harmful effects from devices that produce magnetism. If this happens, turn off the camera
 recorder and either remove the battery or unplug the AC adaptor from the power outlet. Then, replace the battery or reconnect the AC adaptor. After
 that, turn on the camera recorder.

Do not use the camera recorder near radio transmitters or high-voltage devices.

If you use the camera recorder near radio transmitters or high-voltage devices, the recorded video and sound data may suffer harmful effects.

When using the camera recorder at the beach, etc., be careful that sand and dust do not get inside the camera recorder.

Sand and dust may damage the camera recorder and memory card. (Be careful when inserting and removing the memory card)

Battery charger and battery

- If the <CHARGE> lamp continues blinking even when the battery is at its optimal temperature, the battery or battery charger may be damaged. Contact a dealer.
- If the battery is warm, it will take longer than usual to charge.
- If you use the battery charger near a radio, the radio sound may be distorted. Keep the battery and battery charger at least 1 m away from radios when in use
- Noise may be emitted when using the battery charger, but this is not a malfunction.

■ When carrying the camera recorder, be careful not to drop it.

- Strong shocks will damage the camera recorder body and it may not operate properly.
- If you carry the camera recorder, use a grip belt or shoulder strap and handle it carefully.

Do not apply insecticide or volatile materials to the camera recorder.

- If insecticide or volatile materials come into contact with the camera recorder, the camera recorder body may warp and the paint may come off.
- Do not allow the camera recorder to remain in contact with rubber or vinyl objects for a long period of time.
- After using the camera recorder, either remove the battery or disconnect the AC cable from the power outlet.

Battery characteristics

The battery is a rechargeable lithium-ion battery. It produces electrical energy via an internal chemical reaction. This chemical reaction is easily influenced by the surrounding temperature and humidity, so the effective usage time of the battery is reduced when the surrounding temperature is hot or cold. When used in extremely low temperature environments, the effective usage time is approximately five minutes.

When the battery is in an extremely hot environment, its protective function will operate and the camera recorder cannot be used temporarily.

After using the camera recorder, be sure to remove the battery.

Be sure to remove the battery from the camera recorder. (If the battery is left in the camera recorder, it will continue to consume a small amount of electric current even when the power is turned off)

If the battery is left inside the camera recorder for a long time, it will over discharge and may become unusable even if it is recharged.

Do not remove the battery when the power is turned on.

Turn off the power and remove the battery after the operation lamp goes completely out.

■ Take proper care of the battery terminal.

Do not allow dust or foreign objects on the battery terminal.

Also, if you drop the battery by mistake, make sure that the battery body and the terminal are not warped.

Inserting a deformed battery into the camera recorder or attaching it to the battery charger may cause damages on the camera recorder or battery charger.

■ Cautions when throwing memory cards away or transferring them to others

Formatting memory cards or deleting data using the functions of the camera or a computer will merely change the file management information: it will not completely erase the data on the cards. When throwing these cards away or transferring them to others, either physically destroy them or use a data deletion program for computers (commercially available) to completely erase the data. Users are responsible for managing the data stored in their memory cards.


■ LCD monitor and viewfinder

• If the same image or letters are allowed to be displayed on the LCD monitor for a long time, the image may be burned into the screen. It will return to normal after leaving the camera recorder turned off for several hours.

- Condensation sometimes forms on the LCD panel of the LCD monitor in locations subject to extreme temperature differences. If this happens, wipe with a soft, dry cloth.
- If the camera recorder is very cold, the LCD monitor will be slightly darker than normal immediately after the power is turned on. The screen will return to its regular brightness when the temperature inside increases.
- Since the viewfinder of the camera uses organic EL, if the same image or letters are allowed to be displayed for a long time, the image may be burned into the screen. There is no problem with the recorded images.
 - Switch the screen by turning off the screen or by using the eye sensor, etc.
- The LCD monitor and viewfinder (organic EL) are highly-precisely managed so that at least 99.99% of the dots are effective pixels and 0.01% or less are invalid pixels and always lit. This is not a malfunction and it has no effect whatsoever on the recorded images.

■ Do not point the eye piece of the lens and viewfinder at the sun.

Doing so might damage the components inside.



Protective cap for the terminal

Place a protective cap on connection terminals not being used.

GPS

GPS (Global Position System) satellite is managed by the United States Department of State and its precision is sometimes intentionally changed.

Position it in a location where there is a good view of the sky and there is no influence of obstacles such as roofs and trees, etc. Depending upon the surrounding environment and the time, it may take a long time to position and errors may be larger.

■ Caution regarding laser beams

The MOS sensor may be damaged if the MOS sensor is subjected to light from a laser beam.

Take sufficient care to prevent laser beams from striking the lens when shooting in an environment where laser devices are used.

Note the following points.

- If you prepare to record important images, always shoot some advance test footage to verify that both pictures and sound are being recorded normally.
- Should video or audio recording fail due to a malfunction of the camera or the P2 cards used, we will not assume liability for such failure.
- Set up or check the calendar and time zone before recording (Setting the date/time of the internal clock). These settings have an effect on the management and playback order for recorded contents.

What you can do with this camera

This camera is a P2 hand-held camera recorder with the following features.

- The camera has an optical 22x cam-type zoom and a newly-developed 1/3-type 2.2 million pixel 3MOS sensor with high sensitivity F11 (59.94 Hz)/F12 (50 Hz) and low noise.
- In addition to AVC-Intra 200/AVC-Intra 100/AVC-Intra 50, as a recording codec, the camera also has a low-rate and full HD (1920×1080, 4:2:2, 10-bit) image quality AVC-LongG 50/AVC-LongG 25, and is also capable of long time recording with AVC-LongG 12 (4:2:0, 8-bit).
- It is compatible with both microP2 memory cards and P2 memory cards.
- It supports progressive full frame rate shooting in 1080/60P, 1080/50P, 720/60P, and 720/50P, output of 3G SDI/HDMI, and operations using AVC proxy video.
- In addition to metadata input and playlist editing by using both wired and wireless LAN connections, you can send proxy files to the network server by connecting 4G/LTE USB modem (optional).

Also, high speed network connection is possible by connecting an external bonding device.



Settings for user files and scene files, etc. can be stored in and loaded from the SD memory card. In addition, proxy video can be recorded.

Linking to external devices

USB device mode

Data (files) for performing nonlinear editing on a computer are transferred.

- *2 The USB 2.0 cable is not supplied with the camera. Prepare a commercial USB 2.0 cable (double-shielded for noise suppression).


The camera directly controls the hard disk drive to transfer data.


Connecting to the remote operation panel (AK-HRP200G)

You can remote control some functions by connecting the remote operation panel AK-HRP200G (optional) using a LAN cable.



Connecting to monitor

A monitor can be connected to output images.

- *2 Use an HDMI cable (optional) with double shielding. For the HDMI cable, using Panasonic HDMI cable is recommended.

Connection using wireless LAN and 4G/LTE

Attaching the wireless module AJ-WM30 (optional) to the <USB2.0 HOST> terminal (sub-host) of the camera allows you to connect the camera via wireless LAN (IEEE 802.11).



Chapter 2 Description of Parts

This chapter describes the names, functions, and operations of parts on the camera.

Left side



1 Focus ring (page 52)

Focus manually when the <FOCUS> switch is set to <M>.

2 Zoom ring (page 59)

Adjust the zoom manually when the <ZOOM> switch is set to <MANUAL>.

3 Lens cover switching lever (page 32)

Open/close the lens cover.

4 Iris ring (page 52)

Adjust the lens iris manually when the manual iris is set with the <IRIS> button.

5 <ZOOM> switch (page 59)

Select the operation of the zoom.

<SERVO>: You can use the motor-driven zoom using the zoom lever.

<MANUAL>: You can operate the zoom ring manually to adjust the angle of view.

6 <DISP/MODE CHK> switch (page 78)

This is the spring switch to check the status of the shooting, etc.

- Push this switch towards the <OFF> side to clear all displays except the display of the operation status, frame display such as an area, counter, marker, and safety zone.
- Push this switch towards the <CHK> side to display all information such as setting status of the functions for the shooting, the list of functions assigned to the USER buttons on the LCD monitor during shooting stand-by or shooting. Each time the switch is pushed towards the <CHK> side, the display of the status switches in turn.

7 <GAIN> switch (page 52)

Switch the brightness of the screen according to the lighting conditions under which you are shooting.

8 <F.AUDIO LEVEL> dial (page 69)

In the following conditions, the recording levels for the audio channels 1 to 4 can be adjusted.

- When the <CH1>/<CH2> switch is set to <MANU>




Power supply

A battery or AC adaptor can be used as the power supply.

Charging the battery

The battery is not charged at the time of purchase. Fully charge the battery in the battery charger before using the battery. It is recommended that you have one extra battery.



1 Place the battery horizontally along the =| mark in the battery charger and slide it in. (Fig. 1)
Press it in firmly.

2 Connect an AC cable. (Fig. 2)

Connect in the order shown in the figure.

- <POWER> lamp
- Once the AC cable is connected, the lamp will light up.
- <CHARGE> lamp
 - Lit: Charging.
 - Not lit: Charging is complete.
 - Flashing: Reinsert the battery.

3 Slide the battery out to remove it. (Fig. 3)

- The time when the ambient operating temperature is 20 °C (68 °F) and the relative operating humidity is 60%. At other temperature and humidity the charging time may take longer.
- AG-VBR59 (supplied) is a battery pack compatible with quick charging. Quick charging is possible by charging with the AG-BRD50 battery charger (optional).

NOTE

- · Continuous recordable time is applied under the following conditions. If you use the camera in other conditions, continuous shootable time will shorten.
- With the LCD monitor open
- When the main menu \rightarrow [OUTPUT SEL] \rightarrow [SDI OUT] is set to [OFF]
- When the main menu \rightarrow [OUTPUT SEL] \rightarrow [VIDEO OUT] is set to [OFF]
- With the cable not inserted into the <HDMI OUT> terminal
- · The battery and camera recorder will become warm during use or while charging.
- · Make sure that batteries are discharged before storing them.
- When stored for long periods of time, it is recommended that you charge batteries once per year and then use up the battery capacity by using the battery in the camera recorder before storing it again.
- · When the battery becomes extremely hot or cold, the <CHARGE> lamp will flash several times and charging will automatically begin.
- · When the battery is left unused and discharged for a long time, the <CHARGE> lamp will flash several times and charging will automatically begin.
- If the <CHARGE> lamp continues blinking even when the battery is at its optimal temperature, the battery or battery charger may be damaged. Contact a dealer.
- If the battery is warm, it will take longer than usual to charge.
- If you use the battery charger near a radio, the radio sound may be distorted. Keep the battery and battery charger at least 1 m away from radios when in use
- · Noise may be emitted from the battery charger when using the battery charger, but this does not indicate a malfunction.

Remaining battery level display function

The approximate remaining battery level can be checked by looking at the LED display of the battery.

The displayed battery level may be different when the battery is attached to the camera and you are shooting and when the battery is not attached. LED of the battery flashes when the battery is being charged and the position it flashes indicates the charge progress.



Charging the built-in battery

The date/time set in the camera is maintained by the built-in battery.

The built-in battery has been consumed when [BACKUP BATT EMPTY] is displayed in the viewfinder or LCD monitor for approximately five seconds when the power switch is set to <ON>.

Charge the built-in battery with the following procedure.

- 1 Make sure that the power switch is <OFF>.
- **2** Connect the AC adaptor to the camera.

For details on the connection of AC adaptor, refer to "Using the AC adaptor" (page 30).

3 Leave the camera for approx. four hours.

The built-in battery will be charged.

After charging completes, set the date and time and check the time code. If [SET DATE AND TIME] is displayed on the viewfinder or LCD monitor, set the date/time of the internal clock. (page 36)

4 Set the power switch to <ON>, and check that [BACKUP BATT EMPTY] is not displayed in the viewfinder screen.

If [BACKUP BATT EMPTY] is still displayed after charging, the built-in battery needs to be replaced. Consult your dealer.

Setting the date/time of the internal clock

The date/time and time zone are recorded as metadata in the content (clip) while shooting. The date/time metadata will affect the playback order by the thumbnail

Always check and set the date/time and time zone before using the camera for the first time.

Do not change the setting of the date/time and time zone while shooting.

- 1 Press the <MENU> button for 3 seconds or more.
 - The main menu screen is displayed in the viewfinder and on the LCD monitor.
- 2 Select the main menu \rightarrow [OTHER FUNCTIONS] \rightarrow [TIME ZONE] to set the time difference from Greenwich Mean Time.
- 3 Select the main menu \rightarrow [OTHER FUNCTIONS] \rightarrow [CLOCK SETTING] to set the year, month, day, and time.

For details on the settings menu, refer to "Setting menu basic operations" (page 131).



- · You can correct the date and time of the internal clock from GPS by enabling the GPS function.
- The time of the internal clock (local date and time) is maintained accurately based on the time received (Greenwich mean time) and the time zone when the time is received using the built-in GPS. Confirm the setting of the time zone again when the setting of the time zone is incorrect such as the time displayed for the internal clock is not the same as the local time (it is not necessary to reset the internal clock).
- The accuracy of the clock is approximately ±30 seconds per month. Check and reset the time when accurate time is required.

Inspections before shooting

Perform the following inspection before recording to ensure that the system operates properly.

- 1 Confirm that there is no loosening or rattling in the accessories or handle sections.
- 2 Insert a microP2 memory card or a P2 memory card into the card slot and close the card slot cover.
- 3 Turn <ON> the power switch and confirm the following items.
 - [BACKUP BATT EMPTY] is not displayed in the viewfinder or LCD monitor.
 - There is sufficient battery charge level.
 - There is sufficient remaining media space.
- 4 Press the REC button and confirm the following items.
 - The P2 card access LED is flashing in orange.
 - The tally lamp is illuminated in red.
 - A system warning is not displayed in the viewfinder or LCD monitor.
- 5 Press the REC button again.

Confirm that the P2 card access LED is now illuminating in orange and the red illumination of the tally lamp is turned off.


- **6** Press the <THUMBNAIL> button to switch to the thumbnail screen.
- 7 Press the <>/II> button to playback the clip that was just recorded.

Confirm that the playback operates correctly in the viewfinder or LCD monitor.

P2 card

Inserting a P2 card

When using the camera for the first time, be sure to set the time data beforehand. (page 36) Select and use either of the microP2 or P2 memory card slot on the camera.



1 Set whether to use the microP2 memory card slot or the P2 memory card slot.

- 1) Select [REC MEDIA] in the main menu \rightarrow [RECORDING SETUP].
- 2) When using microP2 memory cards, select [microP2], and when using P2 memory cards, select [P2].

2 Open the card slot cover. (Fig. 1)

3 Insert a card into the card slot. (Fig. 2)

- microP2 memory cards
- Insert with the label side facing left.
- There are two microP2 memory card slots.
- P2 memory cards
 - Insert the card with the logo facing left until the eject button pops out.
- Press the eject button that popped out to the upward.

4 Make sure that the P2 card access LED is lit orange or green. (Fig. 3) (page 39)

When two microP2 memory cards are inserted in the card slots, recording will be performed in order from the microP2 memory card with the smaller slot number. However, regardless of the slot number, if a microP2 memory card is inserted later, that microP2 memory card will be accessed later than the previously inserted microP2 memory cards.

• Example: When microP2 memory cards are inserted in two slots

If microP2 memory cards are inserted into two slots, the cards are used as P2 card in the order of the slot number $1 \rightarrow 2$. However, if you remove the microP2 memory card from slot 1 and then insert it again, recording of the microP2 memory card will take place in order from slot $2 \rightarrow 1$.

The microP2 memory card number to be recorded to is maintained even if the camera is turned off. When the camera is next turned on, recording can be continued to the same microP2 memory card as before the camera was turned off.

5 Close the card slot cover.



- · You can also switch the memory card to be recorded by pressing the USER button on which [REC MEDIA] is assigned.
- Be sure to close the card slot cover in order to prevent dropping, dust, and static electricity.
- Be sure to format P2 cards only on a P2 device.
- A microP2 memory card with the microP2 card adaptor (AJ-P2AD1G) attached cannot be inserted into the P2 memory card slot on the camera.
- If SDHC/SDXC memory cards other than microP2 memory cards are used on the microP2 memory card slot, operation is not guaranteed.
- If a microP2 memory card is inserted slowly or there is dirt on the terminal of the card, [FORMAT ERROR!], [NOT SUPPORTED!], or [CHECK SLOT] (slot number) may be displayed. In such a case, insert the microP2 memory card again.

Removing a P2 card

1 Open the card slot cover.

2 Remove the card.


- microP2 memory cards
- Press in the microP2 card further into the camera and let go.
- The microP2 memory card is released from the card slot, and the microP2 memory card can be removed.
- P2 memory cards
 - Lift the eject button (Fig. 1), and press in. (Fig. 2)



- After insertion, do not remove the P2 card while it is being accessed or recognized (the P2 card access LED is flashing orange). Doing so may result in a malfunction
- If the P2 card is removed while being accessed, [TURN POWER OFF] is displayed on the LCD monitor screen or the viewfinder screen, and the tally lamp or other warning is displayed. Also, all P2 card access LEDs flash rapidly in orange. Turn off the power. (page 205)
- If the P2 card is removed while being accessed, clips on it may become irregular. Check the clips and restore them, if required. (page 120)
- If the P2 card being formatted is removed, formatting of the P2 card is not guaranteed. In this case, [TURN POWER OFF] is displayed on the LCD monitor screen or the viewfinder screen. Turn off the power and then back on again, and reformat the P2 card.
- If a P2 card is inserted into another slot during playback, the inserted card is not recognized and the P2 card access LED does not light. The P2 card starts to be recognized when playback ends.
- · Even if a P2 card is inserted in a vacant card slot during recording, the P2 card may not be recognized immediately in the following instance:
- Immediately after a pre-recording
- Immediately after a recording slot is switched
- The P2 card access LED can be set to continuously off in the main menu → [OTHER FUNCTIONS] → [ACCESS LED]. In this case, turn off the power
 before removing the card, or after the card is inserted or after operation (recording, playback, etc.) has stopped, and wait for the charging to complete
 before removing the card.

Preventing accidental erasure

In order to prevent erasing the recorded contents of the P2 card by mistake, turn the write protect switch on the P2 card to the Protect side (or the LOCK side).





 Write-protect switch can be switched while the card is being accessed (during recording or playback), but does not take effect until accessing of the card stops.

- The above table shows values for regular recording. With native recording, even longer recording times are available depending on the system mode.
- In the case of 32 GB P2 cards, the recording time becomes 1/2 of the above recording times, in the case of 16 GB P2 cards, the recording time becomes 1/4, and in the case of 8 GB P2 cards, the recording time becomes 1/8.
- · Indicated capacities include management and other area, so the space available for recording is less than the values in the table above.

Dividing clips recorded on P2 cards

If P2 cards with a capacity of 8 GB or more are used on the camera, recording is automatically continued as another clip when a single continuous recording time exceeds the following times. When thumbnails for clips are handled (displayed, deleted, restored, etc.) on P2 devices, they can be handled as a single clip. Clips may be displayed as separate clips in nonlinear editing software and on a computer. When recording on microP2 memory cards that exceed 32 GB in AVC-LongG codec, recording can be continued as the same clip by selecting [ONE FILE] from the main menu \rightarrow [RECORDING SETUP] \rightarrow [FILE SPLIT]. It will also be divided to recording files of approximately 128 seconds each when [SHORT SPLIT] is selected in the main menu \rightarrow [RECORDING SETUP] \rightarrow [FILE SPLIT]. However, they can be operated as a single clip when the thumbnail of the clips are operated on the P2 device. When using the rec during upload function, you can speed up timing when the partition unit of the recording file becomes small and clip transfer is started by selecting [SHORT SPLIT]. [SHORT SPLIT] is disabled in interval, one-shot, loop, and background recording modes.

CPS (Content Protection System)

The microP2 memory card supports the security function "Content Protection System" that allows encryption formatting to prevent data leak to third parties.

To use the CPS function, set a CPS password to the camera, and enable the microP2 memory card authentication and encryption formatting functions. An encrypted microP2 memory card will be automatically recognized between devices where the same CPS password is set, and recording and playback of the microP2 memory card are enabled. For details, refer to "Setting CPS password" (page 127).




- Setting or deleting of CPS can be performed in the main menu → [CLIP] → [PROPERTY] → [CPS PASSWORD].
- Up to 16 characters can be input.
- The encrypted microP2 memory card is not recognized on the SD card slot in a computer.
- If the card is unable to be recognized, authenticate with the correct password or format and use the card as recording media. Recording data on the card failed to be recognized cannot be checked. Do not perform any operation other than manual authentication and formatting with the failed card inserted.
- · To access the encrypted card from a computer in the USB device mode, authenticate the encrypted card with P2 Viewer Plus.

How to handle data recorded on P2 cards

P2 cards are semiconductor memory cards that are used as the recording medium in the professional video production and broadcasting devices that make up the DVCPRO P2 series.

• Since data recorded in the P2 format is in a file format, they have excellent compatibility with computers. The file structure is a unique format, which in addition to video and audio data in MXF files contains various other important information items. The folder structure links data recorded in the P2 format as shown below.



All these folders are required.

If even part of this information is modified or deleted, the data may no longer be recognized as P2 data, or the card may no longer be able to be used with P2 devices.

*This is the file to which the information of the final clip that was recorded with the P2 device is written.



P2 cards formatted on devices other than microP2 memory card compatible devices do not have the AVCLIP folder. For P2 cards without the AVCLIP folder, the folder will automatically be created when recording is performed on microP2 memory card compatible devices.

- When transferring data from a P2 card to a computer, or when rewriting data saved on a computer back to a P2 card, to prevent data loss be sure to download the special "P2 Viewer Plus" software. For details on downloading P2 Viewer Plus and the operating environment, visit the support desk at the following website:

- Follow the steps below to use general IT tools such as Microsoft Windows Explorer or Apple Finder to transfer the data to a computer. Be sure to use P2 Viewer Plus to write data back to a P2 card.
- Transfer the corresponding CONTENTS folder and LASTCLIP.TXT file together as a set.
- Do not transfer individual files from the CONTENTS folder.
- When copying, copy the LASTCLIP.TXT file at the same time as the CONTENTS folder.
- When transferring the data in multiple P2 cards to a computer, create a folder for each P2 card to prevent clips with the same name from being overwritten
- Do not delete data from the P2 card.
- Be sure to format P2 cards on a P2 device or P2 Viewer Plus.





Adjusting and setting the LCD monitor

Using the LCD monitor

The LCD monitor of this camera is a 3.5 type. Use either the viewfinder or the LCD monitor depending on your purpose and the shooting conditions.



1 Open the LCD monitor. (Fig. 1)

The light goes on when the LCD monitor is opened. The light goes off when it is closed.

2 Set the LCD monitor screen to the easiest-to-view position. (Fig. 2)

Rotates 90° toward the lens and 180° toward you.



- When closing the LCD monitor, be sure to close it firmly.
- · Take care not to apply excessive force on the LCD monitor when it is opened. Doing so may result in a malfunction.
- Condensation sometimes forms on the LCD panel of the LCD monitor in locations subject to extreme temperature differences. If this happens, wipe with a soft, dry cloth.
- If the camera recorder is very cold, the LCD monitor will be slightly darker than normal immediately after the power is turned on. The screen will return to its regular brightness when the temperature inside increases.
- The brightness or hue of the image on the viewfinder and LCD monitor may be different from those of the image on a TV monitor. The final check should be done on a TV monitor.

Adjusting the LCD monitor

Adjusting the brightness, contrast, and color level

Adjust [LCD BRIGHTNESS] (brightness), [LCD CONTRAST] (contrast), and [LCD COLOR LEVEL] (color level) in the main menu \rightarrow [DISPLAY SETUP] \rightarrow [LCD SETTING].

These adjustments will not affect the images to be recorded.

Adjusting the backlight luminance

Switches the brightness of the LCD monitor backlight. There are two ways to do this:

- ullet Set from the main menu ullet [DISPLAY SETUP] ullet [LCD SETTING] ullet [LCD BACKLIGHT].
- Press the <LCD BACKLIGHT> button. Each press of the button switches in the order [0] → [1] → [-3] → [-2] → [-1].

Mirror shooting

When recording with the LCD monitor rotated towards the lens side, if the camera is set [MIRROR] in the main menu \rightarrow [DISPLAY SETUP] \rightarrow [SELF SHOOT], the image is displayed in reverse in left and right on the LCD monitor. This allows shooting as if looking at a mirror image. Note that only the display of the LCD monitor is horizontally reversed. Recording is performed normally.

Highlighting the outlines of images

It is easier to focus if the outlines of images on the LCD monitor are highlighted.

Even when the outlines are highlighted on the LCD monitor, images output from the camera recorder and recorded images are not affected.

To highlight outlines, set [ON] in the main menu \rightarrow [DISPLAY SETUP] \rightarrow [EVF DETAIL], and adjust [EVF PEAK LEVEL] and [EVF PEAK FREQ] in the main menu \rightarrow [DISPLAY SETUP].

Adjusting and setting the viewfinder


The viewfinder of this camera is a 0.5 type organic EL. Use either the viewfinder or the LCD monitor depending on your purpose and the shooting conditions.

Using the viewfinder

When it is difficult to use the LCD monitor because the surroundings are bright, you can check the image using the viewfinder.

Positioning your eye near the viewfinder will trigger the eye sensor to automatically display the image.

- The eye sensor sensitivity can be set to [HIGH] or [LOW] in the main menu → [DISPLAY SETUP] → [EYE SENSOR].
- The eye sensor may not work properly depending on the shape of the eyeglasses you may be wearing, how you hold the camera, or by strong light present in the vicinity of the eye piece. If this happens, switch the image display by assigning [EVF ON/OFF] to the USER button.



1 Set the viewfinder screen to the easiest-to-view position.

The viewfinder can be lifted vertically to approximately 90 degrees.

2 Adjust the characters inside the viewfinder screen so that they are clearly visible using the diopter adjustment lever.



• The image brightness and color hue seen on the viewfinder and LCD monitor may be different from that seen on a TV monitor. The final check of the color hue should be done on a TV monitor.

Adjusting the viewfinder

Adjusting the brightness, contrast, and color level

Adjust [EVF BRIGHTNESS] (brightness), [EVF CONTRAST] (contrast), and [EVF COLOR LEVEL] (color level) in the main menu \rightarrow [DISPLAY SETUP] \rightarrow [EVF SETTING].

These adjustments will not affect recorded images.

Switching between color and monochrome

The viewfinder screen can be switched between color display and monochrome display. Set from the main menu \rightarrow [DISPLAY SETUP] \rightarrow [EVF SETTING] \rightarrow [EVF COLOR].

Highlighting the outlines of images

It is easier to focus if the outlines of images in the viewfinder are highlighted.

Even when the outlines are highlighted on the LCD monitor, images output from the camera recorder and recorded images are not affected.


To highlight outlines, set [ON] in the main menu \rightarrow [DISPLAY SETUP] \rightarrow [EVF DETAIL], and adjust [EVF PEAK LEVEL] and [EVF PEAK FREQ] in the main menu \rightarrow [DISPLAY SETUP].

Tally lamp

If set to anything other than [OFF] in the main menu \rightarrow [OTHER FUNCTIONS] \rightarrow [TALLY LAMP], you can make up the tally lamp light while photographing.

Also, the tally lamp will flash when the following situations occur:

- The P2 card has less free space to record and the battery level is low (one time per second)
- The P2 card has been removed while being accessed (four times per second)
- The P2 card has no more space to record (four times per second)
- When the warnings such as the fluctuation of the reference signal for the <GENLOCK IN/VIDEO OUT> terminal and a system error or recording abnormality warning are displayed (four times per second)





This chapter describes the basic procedure for recording. It also describes special shooting methods such as pre-recording and loop recording.

Basic procedures

This section describes the basic procedures for shooting. When you actually start shooting, pre-inspect your system to ensure that it works properly after making preparations.

Preparation


- 1 Attach the fully charged battery, or connect the AC adaptor. (page 28)
- 2 Set the power switch to <ON>. (page 34)
- 3 Insert the P2 card. (page 38)
- 4 Adjust the angle of the LCD monitor and viewfinder or other conditions. (pages 45, 46)
- 5 Set the lens cover lever to <OPEN>. (page 32)



• Even if the battery is fully charged, the remaining capacity of the battery may not be correctly displayed.

Shooting

For shooting, use the following steps:



- a: <AUTO/MANUAL> switch
- b: Recording button (grip side, handle side, front side)
- c: <REC CHECK> button

1 Set the video settings and the audio input.

Before shooting, the followings must be set or adjusted.

- Image settings for the brightness function (iris, gain, shutter) and the white balance adjustment function, etc.
- Audio input settings for audio recording.
- Adjusting audio recording level

2 Select shooting mode with the <AUTO/MANUAL> switch.

<AUTO>: auto mode

- [A] is displayed at the upper part of the viewfinder and LCD monitor.
- Focus, iris, gain, shutter, and white balance are automatically adjusted.
- ullet You can set the operation specifics for auto mode in the main menu ullet [AUTO SW].

<MANUAL>: manual mode

- To adjust focus, iris, gain, shutter speed, and white balance manually, set the camera to manual mode.
- Adjust the brightness by adjusting the iris and ND filter. (page 52)
- To focus manually, use the focus operation. (page 52)
- \bullet To adjust the white balance, adjust the white balance and black balance. (page 56)
- To set the audio input and adjust the recording level, switch audio input. (page 68)

3 Press the REC button to start recording.

- The REC button is on three locations: the grip side, the handle side, and the front side.
- During recording, the tally lamp lights red.

4 To stop recording, press the REC button again.

5 Check videos recorded.

After recording ends, pressing the <REC CHECK> button automatically plays back approximately the last three seconds of the latest clip. Holding down the <REC CHECK> button for one second plays back from the last ten seconds of the latest clip. In this way, you can check whether video has been recorded properly.

- Returns to recording standby after checking.
- For clips within ten seconds, previous clips are not played back even if the <REC CHECK> button is held down after returning to the start of the current clip.



- During recording standby and recording, operation buttons (<◄◄>, <▶▶>, <▶/▮▶, <■>) do not function.
- When highly bright subjects (e.g. sun or lighting) are shot, the periphery of the subject might be colored.
- When shooting at low angles, using the REC button on the handle side is helpful.
- The REC button on the handle side includes a hold mechanism to prevent accidental operation.
- The REC button on the front side can be disabled by settings. (page 141)
- In the following cases, it may take time to complete writing to the P2 card even when you have pressed the REC button to stop recording. For this reason, if you press the REC button soon to start recording, the camera is unable to operate. [REC PAUSE INVALID] is displayed in the center of the screen. After the record ending process has completed and [REC PAUSE INVALID] has disappeared, next recording can be started.
- Stopping of short-term recording
- Stopping immediately after recording to two microP2 memory cards

Selecting the resolution, codec, and video format for recording

You can select the recording resolution (1080P, 1080i, 720P, 480i, 576i), recording codec (AVC-Intra, AVC-LongG, DVCPRO HD, etc.), and the recording frame rate.

Set in the main menu \rightarrow [SYSTEM MODE] \rightarrow [LINE&FREQ] and [REC FORMAT].

Adjustable settings when shooting

Adjust the iris and gain when shooting.

Iris

- 1 Switch to manual mode with the <AUTO/MANUAL> switch. (page 49)
- **2** Press the <IRIS> button to switch the adjustment method for the lens aperture.

[AUTO IRIS]: Adjusts iris setting automatically. (Auto iris)

[MANUAL IRIS]: Adjust the lens iris manually. (Manual iris)

3 When on manual iris, rotate the iris ring to adjust the lens iris.

When the auto iris level function for auto iris is enabled, the value of the auto iris level can be adjusted by turning the iris ring. The value is not applied to the setting in the main menu \rightarrow [SCENE FILE] \rightarrow [A.IRIS LEVEL EFFECT].



· Auto iris does not function when the frame rate is set to [9fps] or lower in variable frame rate, and when the shutter speed is set to less than 1/12.

Gain

If the camera recorder screen is dark, increase the gain to brighten the screen.

- 1 Switch to manual mode with the <AUTO/MANUAL> switch. (page 49)
- 2 Switch gain with the <GAIN> switch.
 - <L>: Normally set to this position. (Factory setting is 0 dB)
 - <M>: Increases the gain of the camera image amp. (Factory setting is 6 dB)
 - <H>: Increases the gain of the camera image amp. (Factory setting is 12 dB)

The gain values for <L>, <M>, and <H> can be changed in the main menu \rightarrow [SW MODE] \rightarrow [LOW GAIN], [MID GAIN], and [HIGH GAIN]. (page 140)

When in auto mode, selecting [ON] in the main menu \rightarrow [AUTO SW] \rightarrow [AGC] will set the camera to auto gain regardless of the position of the <GAIN> switch. (page 142)



When [NORMAL] is selected from the main menu → [SYSTEM MODE] → [SHOOTING MODE], the setting of –3 dB does not function.

Super gain

When shooting in dark locations, you can set super gain regardless of whether the camera is in auto mode or manual mode.

Select [24dB], [30dB], [36dB], or [ALL] in the main menu → [SW MODE] → [SUPER GAIN].

You can switch to the selected gain by pressing a USER button assigned [SUPER GAIN]. (page 43)

When [ALL] is selected, each time the USER button is pressed, the camera toggles $[24dB] \rightarrow [30dB] \rightarrow [36dB] \rightarrow$ normal gain settings in order.



• Super gain does not function when the frame rate is set to lower than [12fps] in variable frame rate, or when the shutter speed is set to lower than 1/12.

Brightness adjustment

When the external light is strong, you can switch the ND filter (brightness adjustment filter) to use with the <ND FILTER> switch.

- 1 Change the setting of the <ND FILTER> switch.
 - <1/64>: Reduce the amount of light entering the MOS sensor to 1/64.
 - <1/16>: Reduce the amount of light entering the MOS sensor to 1/16.
 - <1/4>: Reduce the amount of light entering the MOS sensor to 1/4.
 - <OFF>: Does not use the ND filter.

Macro

Macro function can be switched [ON]/[OFF].

- 1 Press the USER button to which [FOCUS MACRO] has been assigned.
 - When [ON] is set, 🕷 is displayed at the top of the focus display on the viewfinder or LCD monitor.
 - The operation mode when [ON] is set can be made in the main menu → [SW MODE] → [MACRO MODE].
 - Only the wide macro area is enabled when [MACRO MODE] is set to [WIDE]. The minimum object distance (M.O.D) is maintained to be 1.1 m when the zoom position is within the tele macro area.
 - Tele macro area and wide macro area are enabled when [MACRO MODE] is set to [ALL].

Focusing (manual focus)

- 1 Switch the method of controlling the focus with the <FOCUS> switch.
 - <a>A>: Changes to the auto focus mode. Adjusts the focus automatically.
 - <M>: Changes to the manual focus mode. Control the focus ring manually to adjust the focus.

Chapter 4 Shooting — Adjustable settings when shooting

<>>: Changes to the manual focus mode after the focus distance is set to infinity.

This switch is the spring switch. Even when the <FOCUS> switch is pushed towards the <∞> side, the switch returns to the <M> position.



- · Since the auto focus control may not operate properly if there is a flicker, select a shutter speed that is appropriate to the light.
- If you set the camera to auto focus mode at times other than 60i (50i) and 60P (50P), the time required for the focus control will be slightly longer than when in normal focus mode.
- When [ON] is selected in the main menu → [AUTO SW] → [AF] and the camera is in auto mode, auto focusing is performed regardless of the position
 of the <FOCUS> switch.
- · Auto focus does not function when the frame rate is set to [9fps] or lower in variable frame rate, and when the shutter speed is set to less than 1/12.

Auto high-speed focusing

Pressing the <PUSH AUTO> button performs the operation set in the main menu \rightarrow [SW MODE] \rightarrow [PUSH AF MODE].

[TURBO]: Performs high-speed focusing until the image is focused, once the button is pressed.

[NORMAL]: Performs automatic focusing while pressing the button.

Manual focus assist mode

By setting [ON] in the main menu \rightarrow [SW MODE] \rightarrow [MF ASSIST], you can switch from manual focus mode to manual focus assist mode.

- Compared to manual focus mode, you can adjust the focus (course adjustment) by rotating the focus ring approximately a half-turn.
- After adjusting with the focus ring, the focus is automatically adjusted (fine adjustment).
- When the focus deviation is great, it may not be in focus.
- After executing auto adjustment, it will not adjust automatically until you move the focus ring again.

Focus assist function


The focus assist function enables you to focus the target easily.

Expanded display in the viewfinder and LCD monitor, focus in red display (display with the contours of the image in red), and focus bar display are available.

Expanded display [EXPAND]

Set to [EXPAND] in the main menu \rightarrow [SW MODE] \rightarrow [FOCUS ASSIST MODE] beforehand.

When the <FOCUS ASSIST> button is pressed, the center of the screen is expanded approx. three times so that you can focus the image easily.



• In the expanded display, the status display and zebra pattern disappear, and [EXPANDED] is displayed at the top of the screen.



- · Viewfinder screen and LCD monitor screen are expanded.
- Expanded display is unavailable in the video output, SDI output, and HDMI output.
- The screen returns to the normal screen in approximately 10 seconds.

Focus in red display [IN RED]

Set [IN RED] in the main menu \rightarrow [SW MODE] \rightarrow [FOCUS ASSIST MODE] beforehand.

Press the <FOCUS ASSIST> button to put red borders around the contours of the image. When this happens the screen frame will turn red.

Adjust the focus so that the contours of the subject you want to focus on turn red.



• It is displayed only on the viewfinder screen and LCD monitor screen.

When various status information is displayed, they will disappear.

Focus bar display [FOCUS BAR]

The focus bar can be displayed when [ON] is set in the main menu \rightarrow [DISPLAY SETUP] \rightarrow [FOCUS BAR].

The degree of focus is indicated by the length of the bar.

- White bar: Focus bar display
- Green line: Peak display



in-focus.

Area mode function

You can perform the following operations by displaying the area frame with the control stick.

- Area auto focus function
- Auto focus operation is performed within the area selected with the area frame.
- Area auto iris function

The iris value is adjusted automatically within the area selected with the area frame.

· Area brightness display

The luminance level of the center of the selected area frame is displayed.

Operation function settings

Set the operations to be assigned to the area mode function from the main menu.

1 Select the desired function in the main menu \rightarrow [SW MODE] \rightarrow [AREA MODE].

- [INHIBIT]: Does not assign a function.
- [FOCUS]: Area focus function and area focus bar function (When [FOCUS BAR] is set)
- [IRIS]: Area iris function
- [Y GET]: Area brightness display
- [FOCUS/IRIS]: Simultaneous operation of area focus function/area iris function, and area focus bar function (When [FOCUS BAR] is set)
- [FOCUS/Y GET]: Simultaneous operation of area focus function/area brightness display, and area focus bar function (When [FOCUS BAR] is set)

Operation of area mode function

The function set in the main menu \rightarrow [SW MODE] \rightarrow [AREA MODE] can be used by performing the following operation when shooting or while in shooting standby.

1 Press the control stick.

• An area frame (white) is displayed.

2 Press the control stick upward/downward/to the left/to the right to move the area frame to a desired position.

3 Press the control stick.

- The area frame color changes from white to yellow.
- When the yellow frame is displayed, the function set for [AREA MODE] can be operated in the area frame.
- While the function is activated, [AREA] is displayed on the right of the display.
- When the area brightness display is activated, the brightness display in the center does not operate.

4 Press the control stick for two seconds or longer.


• The area frame disappears and the camera exits the area mode function.




[•] The area mode function is released when the power is turned off or when a video is played back.

Level gauge function

A level gauge that indicates the horizontal and vertical inclinations of the camera recorder can be displayed on the LCD monitor.





Orange lines will be displayed when inclined. Orange lines will be changed to green lines when there is almost no inclination. Inclinations will be displayed up to approximately $\pm 45^{\circ}$ in the horizontal direction, and up to $\pm 30^{\circ}$ in the vertical direction.

$\textbf{1} \ \, \text{Select [ON] in the main menu} \to \text{[DISPLAY SETUP]} \to \text{[LEVEL GAUGE]}.$



- The level gauge display is not recorded.
- The level gauge is not displayed in the viewfinder.
- The level gauge is not displayed when selecting [MIRROR] in the main menu → [DISPLAY SETUP] → [SELF SHOOT].
 The level gauge is not displayed when selecting [ON] in the main menu → [SYSTEM MODE] → [SCAN REVERSE].
- While moving the camera, the level gauge may not be displayed properly.
- When shooting while tilting the camera upward or downward greatly, the level gauge may not be displayed properly.
- When pressing the USER button where [LEVEL GAUGE] is assigned in the main menu \rightarrow [USER SW], [ON] and [OFF] can be switched.
- When holding down the USER button where [LEVEL GAUGE RESET] is assigned in the main menu → [USER SW], the setting will be reset to the
 factory setting.
- When pressing the USER button where [LEVEL GAUGE RESET] is assigned in the main menu → [USER SW].

Adjusting the white and black balance

To obtain high-quality video at all times using the camera, the white and black balance must be adjusted according to conditions.

To obtain higher image quality, adjust in the order of AWB (white balance adjustment) \rightarrow ABB (black balance adjustment) \rightarrow AWB (white balance adjustment).



 When white or black balance is adjusted while video is disrupted by the generator lock, adjustment may not be performed correctly. Adjust white or black balance again after video has returned to normal.

Adjusting the white balance

The white balance must be adjusted again when the lighting conditions change. Follow the steps below to adjust the white balance automatically.

- When storing in <A> of the <WHITE BAL> switch
- 1 Switch to manual mode with the <AUTO/MANUAL> switch. (page 49)
- 2 Set the <GAIN> switch.

Normally, set this to 0 dB. If it is too dark, set the gain to an appropriate value.

- 3 Set the <WHITE BAL> switch to <A>.
- 4 Change the <ND FILTER> switch settings according to the light conditions.

For setting examples for the <ND FILTER> switch, refer to "Brightness adjustment" (page 52).


- 5 Place the white pattern at a point where the light conditions match those for the light source for the subject, and zoom in on the white pattern so that the white color appears in the screen.
- 6 Adjust the lens aperture.

Adjust the iris so that the brightness of Y GET is approx. 70%.

7 Press the <AWB> button.

White balance is automatically adjusted.

- White pattern
- A white object (cloth or wall) near the subject may also be used for the white pattern.
- Required size of white pattern is as follows.



- Keep bright spotlights out of the screen.
- The white pattern must be placed at the center of the screen.
- Messages displayed in the viewfinder and LCD monitor
- When the auto tracking white balance (ATW) function is operating, white balance cannot be adjusted.

Status	Message	Remark
During adjustment	[AWB Ach ACTIVE]	
Adjustment completed	[AWB A OK 3200K]	The adjusted value is automatically stored in the specified memory (A or B).
When the color temperature of the subject is lower than 2000 K or higher than 15000 K	[AWB NG COLOR TEMP LOW] [AWB NG COLOR TEMP HIGH]	[AWB NG COLOR TEMP LOW] indicates that the temperature is lower than the displayed temperature. [AWB NG COLOR TEMP HIGH] indicates that the temperature is higher than the displayed temperature.

■ [COLOR TEMP Ach SETTING]/[COLOR TEMP Bch SETTING] setting

- The color hue can be changed after the white balance has been adjusted automatically, after setting each item in the main menu → [SCENE FILE] → [COLOR TEMP Ach SETTING]/[COLOR TEMP Bch SETTING].
- Adjusting either one of [COLOR TEMP], [R Gain], [B Gain], and [G AXIS] changes the other three values.
- Applying white balance automatic adjustment again resets [COLOR TEMP], [R Gain], [B Gain], and [G AXIS].

When you have no time to adjust the white balance

Set the <WHITE BAL> switch to <PRST>.

- Each time the <AWB> button is pressed, the values set in [3200K], [5600K], and main menu \rightarrow [SW MODE] \rightarrow [W.BAL VAR] are toggled in order. When [VAR] is selected, turning the <SEL/PUSH SET> dial button can set any white balance value between [2000K] and [15000K].
- The value displayed as [VAR] is not always assured. Use it as a reference value.
- The value for [VAR] can be viewed by pressing the <AWB> button.

When the white balance has not been automatically adjusted

When the white balance has not been successfully adjusted, an error message is displayed on the viewfinder screen and LCD monitor displays.

Error message	Meaning	Remedy
[AWB Ach NG] or [AWB Bch NG]	The color temperature is too high, or too low.	Select the appropriate filter.
[LOW LIGHT]	There is insufficient light.	Increase the amount of light or increase gain.
[LEVEL OVER]	There is too much light.	Decrease the amount of light or decrease gain.
[COLOR TEMP LOW] or [COLOR TEMP HIGH]	The color temperature is too high, or too low.	Select the appropriate filter or light source.

Manual setting of color temperature

The color temperature of white balance can be adjusted by the setting menu.

- 1 Press the <AWB> button to select [W.BAL VAR] mode.
- **2** Set the color temperature in the main menu \rightarrow [SW MODE] \rightarrow [W.BAL VAR]. This can be set from [2000K] to [15000K].



· It can also be operated by the <SEL/PUSH SET> dial button. For details, refer to "Direct menu operation" (page 79).

Viewfinder and LCD monitor screen displays relating to white balance

For details, refer to "Screen status display" (page 158).

Setting the auto tracking white balance (ATW) function

The camera is equipped with the Auto Tracking White Balance (ATW) function that automatically tracks the white balance of images according to the lighting conditions.

The auto tracking white balance function can be assigned to each of A>, B>, and PRST> of the BAL> switch. Configure the settings in the main menu DE [SW MODE] DE [ATW].

Note that if the auto tracking white balance function is assigned to the USER button, the function follows the operation of the USER button. For details, refer to "Assigning functions to the USER buttons" (page 43).

Canceling the auto tracking white balance

Press the USER button to which auto tracking white balance function is assigned again or change the position of the <WHITE BAL> switch. Note that if the auto tracking white balance function is set to the <WHITE BAL> switch, the function cannot be canceled with the USER button.



- This function does not guarantee 100% accuracy for the white balance. Note that the tracking performance relative to changes in ambient lighting and white balance performance has been given a certain degree of latitude.
- Auto tracking white balance does not function when the frame rate is set to [9fps] or lower in variable frame rate, and when the shutter speed is set to less than 1/12.

Adjusting the black balance

Black balance must be adjusted in the following instances:

- When the camera is used for the first time
- When the camera has not been used for a long time
- When the ambient temperature has changed considerably
- When super gain is set with the USER button
- When changing the gain switch values
- ullet When switching the items in the main menu o [SYSTEM MODE] o [REC FORMAT]

To shoot optimum video, we recommend adjusting the black balance immediately before shooting.

Before adjusting the black balance, prepare the conditions for adjusting the white balance.

- 1 Switch to manual mode with the <AUTO/MANUAL> switch. (page 49)
- 2 Set the <WHITE BAL> switch to <A> or .
- $oldsymbol{3}$ Press and hold the <AWB> button for approx. two seconds.

Black balance is adjusted after the white balance.

■ Messages displayed in the viewfinder and LCD monitor

- During black balance adjustment, the aperture is set to automatically shut out light.
- During recording, black balance cannot be adjusted.
- During the automatic black balance execution, recording to the P2 card is not performed by pressing the REC button.
- The gain switching circuit is automatically switched during black balance adjustment. Flicker or noise sometimes appears on the viewfinder screen and LCD monitor. This is not a malfunction.

Black balance memory

Values stored to memory are saved even if the camera is turned off.

Using the zoom function

Adjust the angle of view you want to shoot.

The camera has a 22x optical zoom.

The zoom can be operated at the following three locations:

- Zoom lever (on the grip)
- Zoom lever (on the handle)
- Zoom ring on the lens

Select the zoom operation with the <ZOOM> switch and the HANDLE ZOOM switch.

Setting the <ZOOM> switch

Switch the <ZOOM> switch to set the zoom operation.

<MANUAL>: You can operate the zoom ring manually to adjust the angle of view.

<SERVO>: You can use the motor-driven zoom using the zoom lever.

Adjusting the zoom position

Adjust the zoom with the zoom lever.

<T>: Zoom in the image.

<W>: Zoom out the image.

Lightly pressing the zoom lever on the grip will operate the zoom at low speed. Pressing strongly will operate the zoom at high speed.



- To operate the zoom with higher speed, press the USER button where [FAST ZOOM] is assigned in the main menu → [USER SW] to enable/disable [FAST ZOOM].
- When [FAST ZOOM] is enabled, the motorized zoom can operated with higher speed when the zoom lever is pushed to the end. However, the zoom sound becomes louder than usual. If the sound of the motorized zoom is obtrusive, disable [FAST ZOOM].

Using the zoom lever on the handle

You can select three shooting modes with the HANDLE ZOOM switch.

<FIX>: Zoom with the speed set in the main menu \rightarrow [SW MODE] \rightarrow [H.ZOOM SPEED].

<VAR>: Zoom speed changes depending on how strong the lever is pushed. (When pushed gently, the speed becomes slower, and when pushed strongly, it becomes faster.)

<OFF>: The zoom lever does not work.

Zoom ring

Setting the <ZOOM> switch to the <MANUAL> position will allow manual zoom operation with the zoom ring.

• When the <ZOOM> switch is at the <SERVO> position, do not operate the zoom manually. Doing so may result in a malfunction.

Adjusting image quality

The image quality of the video to be recorded can be set in the main menu \rightarrow [SCENE FILE]. To change "Advanced settings", measuring equipment such as vector scope is necessary.

Detail function

This function thickens or weakens the outlines of images. It effectively softens or sharpens images, but in some cases, the whole image may become rough due to emphasized noise and edges. To avoid such problems, it is necessary not to add this effect on parts where emphasizing is not needed and keep the details of the parts.

General settings

[MASTER DTL]: Sets the level of the detail effect of the whole part.

[DTL CORING]: Sets the level of signal (including noise) not to activate the detail effect.

Advanced settings

Set in the main menu \rightarrow [SCENE FILE] \rightarrow [DETAIL SETTING].

[DETAIL]: Sets [ON]/[OFF] of the detail function.

[V.DTL LEVEL]: Sets the intensity of the detail level in the vertical direction.

[H.DTL FREQ.]: Sets the thickness of the detail level in the horizontal direction.

[V. DTL FREQ.]: Sets the thickness of the detail level in the vertical direction.

[LEVEL DEPEND.]: When the detail of luminosity signal is emphasized, details in the darker parts are compressed. Details of bright areas are also compressed more when the value set for [LEVEL DEPEND.] is larger.


[KNEE APE LVL]: Sets the detail level of high luminosity areas (high-brightness areas).

[DTL GAIN(+)]: Sets the detail level of + direction (to make brighter).

[DTL GAIN(-)]: Sets the detail level of - direction (to make darker).

Skin tone function

This function makes human skin look smoother in images.



■ General settings

[SKIN TONE DTL A]/[SKIN TONE DTL B]/[SKIN TONE DTL C]: Selects what kind of skin color where the skin tone detail function should work from the three data [SKIN TONE DTL A]/[SKIN TONE DTL B]/[SKIN TONE DTL C] can be set alone or in combination.

[SKIN TONE ZEBRA]: When [SKIN TONE DTL A]/[SKIN TONE DTL B]/[SKIN TONE DTL C] are enabled, displays the zebra pattern in the selected skin color field. The zebra pattern displays the area selected in [SKIN TONE DTL SETTING].

Advanced settings

Configure the settings in the main menu \rightarrow [SCENE FILE] \rightarrow [SKIN TONE DTL SETTING].

[DETECT TABLE]: Selects the skin color table of the object on which the skin tone table is applied.

[SKIN TONE GET]: Acquires the color information of [A], [B], or [C] selected in [DETECT TABLE] from the area around the center marker. By executing this menu, [I CENTER] to [Q PHASE] data are acquired automatically.

[SKIN DTL EFFECT]: Sets the effect level of the skin tone detail.




Fig. 1 Fig. 2

• The color composition of video signal (R/G/B) can be converted to color difference signal (R-Y/B-Y) as in (Fig. 1). Within those ranges, set the area on which the following skin tone is applied, using the axis across red and cyan (I axis) and the axis across green and magenta (Q axis).

[I CENTER]: Sets the center position on the I axis (the area where the skin tone applied).

[I WIDTH]: Sets the area width where the skin tone is applied, along the I axis with [I CENTER] in the center.

[Q WIDTH]: Sets the area width where the skin tone is applied, along the Q axis with [I CENTER] in the center.

[Q PHASE]: Sets the phase where the skin tone is applied, with the Q axis being the reference.

RB gain control function

This function makes settings to add or reduce intensity of red and blue colors according to the position of the <WHITE BAL> switch.

The function works when the switch is at the <PRST> position or when automatic white balance is active. It does not work when auto tracking white balance is activated.

■ General settings

Use the camera with the factory settings.

Advanced settings

Configure the settings in the main menu → [SCENE FILE] → [RB GAIN CONTROL SETTING].

• When the <WHITE BAL> switch is at <PRST> position

[R GAIN AWB PRE]: Makes settings to add or reduce intensity of red color.

[B GAIN AWB PRE]: Makes settings to add or reduce intensity of blue color.

• When the <WHITE BAL> switch is at <A> position

[R GAIN AWB A]: Makes settings to add or reduce intensity of red color.

[B GAIN AWB A]: Makes settings to add or reduce intensity of blue color.

 \bullet When the <WHITE BAL> switch is at position

[R GAIN AWB B]: Makes settings to add or reduce intensity of red color.

[B GAIN AWB B]: Makes settings to add or reduce intensity of blue color.

• When setting the <WHITE BAL> switch to the <A> position and automatic white balance is performed

[AWB A GAIN OFFSET]: Sets whether to keep the values set for [R GAIN AWB A] and [B GAIN AWB A] or reset them.

• When setting the <WHITE BAL> switch to the position and automatic white balance is performed

[AWB B GAIN OFFSET]: Sets whether to keep the values set for [R GAIN AWB B] and [B GAIN AWB B] or reset them.

Chroma setting function

This function sets color saturation and phase. It applies effects on whole images. It cannot be set to individual color hue.

General settings

[CHROMA LEVEL]: Sets the chroma level of the P_R signal and P_B signal. When the vector scope is used, the distance from the center (no color) increases in the whole image.


[CHROMA PHASE]: Finely adjusts the chroma phase of the P_R signal and P_B signal. When the vector scope is used, the whole image rotates clockwise or counter-clockwise.

Advanced settings

No setting items are provided.

Matrix function

This function sets the image color representation by selecting the matrix table. If the settings are changed, the representation of all the colors in the image will also be changed.

General settings

[MATRIX]: Selects the matrix table to represent the color for shooting.

Advanced settings

Configure the settings in the main menu \rightarrow [SCENE FILE] \rightarrow [MATRIX SETTING].


It performs fine adjustment relatively on the matrix table selected in [MATRIX].

Since the fine adjustment is performed relatively, if the matrix table selected in [MATRIX] differs, the color representation may differ even when the same value is set. (Fig. 1)

Example) When adjusting [MATRIX R-G] to the + side, and [MATRIX B-G] to the - side (Fig. 2)

Color correction function

This function sets color saturation and phase. It applies individual effect on 15 phases in a image. It can be set to individual color hue.



■ General settings

Use the camera with the factory settings.

Advanced settings

[R (PHASE)]/[R-R-Mg (PHASE)]/[R-Mg (PHASE)]/[Mg (PHASE)]/[Mg-B (PHASE)]/[B (PHASE)]/[B-Cy (PHASE)]/[Cy (PHASE)]/[Cy-G (PHASE)]/[G (PHASE)]/[G-YI (PHASE)]/[YI-YI-R (PHASE)]/[YI-R-R (PHASE)]: Changes the phases. + makes it rotate clockwise, and - makes it rotate counter-clockwise.

[R (SAT)]/[R-R-Mg (SAT)]/[Mg (SAT)]/[Mg-B (SAT)]/[B (SAT)]/[B-Cy (SAT)]/[Cy-G (SAT)]/[G (SAT)]/[G-YI (SAT)]/[YI-R-R (SAT)]/[YI-R (SAT)]/[YI-R-R (SAT)]/[YI-R (SAT)

Black control function

This function sets the black level that is to be the reference of luminance.

General settings

[MASTER PED]: Sets the reference black level. RGB also changes by changing this setting. – makes the black color darker, and + makes it less dark.

Advanced settings

Configure the settings in the main menu \rightarrow [SCENE FILE] \rightarrow [RGB BLACK CONTROL SETTING].

[R PED]: Sets the pedestal level of Rch.

[G PED]: Sets the pedestal level of Gch.

[B PED]: Sets the pedestal level of Bch.

[PEDESTAL OFFSET]: Sets whether to keep the values set for each item of [R PED], [G PED], and [B PED] or reset them when automatic black balance adjustment is performed.

Gamma function

This function optimizes the tone of images.

■ General settings

[GAMMA MODE SEL]: Selects a gamma mode from seven types.

■ Advanced settings

Configure the settings in the main menu \rightarrow [SCENE FILE] \rightarrow [GAMMA SETTING].

[MASTER GAMMA]: Sets the master gamma in 0.01 steps.

• When [FILM-REC] is selected in [GAMMA MODE SEL]

[F-REC DYNAMIC LVL]: Sets dynamic range.

[F-REC BLACK STR LVL]: Sets black stretch.

• When [VIDEO-REC] is selected in [GAMMA MODE SEL]

[V-REC KNEE SLOPE]: Sets knee slope.

[V-REC KNEE POINT]: Sets knee point.

[BLACK GAMMA]: Sets the gamma curve compression and expansion of dark areas.

[B. GAMMA RANGE]: Sets the maximum level to perform compression/expansion.

Knee function

This function sets the compression of video signals to prevent halation in images.

■ General settings

Use the camera with the factory settings.

Advanced settings

Configure the settings in the main menu \rightarrow [SCENE FILE] \rightarrow [KNEE SETTING].

[KNEE MODE]: Sets the operation mode of knee function ([AUTO]/[MANUAL]/[OFF]).

• When [AUTO] is selected in [KNEE SETTING]

[A.KNEE RESPONSE]: Sets the speed of response. Smaller values make the response faster.

• When [MANUAL] is selected in [KNEE SETTING]

[KNEE MASTER POINT]: Sets the knee point position in 0.5% steps.

[KNEE MASTER SLOPE]: Sets the knee inclination.

[KNEE MASTER SLOPE Rch]: Sets the knee inclination of Rch. [KNEE MASTER SLOPE Bch]: Sets the knee inclination of Bch.

High color function

This function sets the color dynamic range.

■ General settings

[HI-COLOR SW]: Turns the mode that expands the color dynamic range [ON]/[OFF]. **[HI-COLOR LVL]:** Selects the level of mode that expands the color dynamic range.

■ Advanced settings

Use the camera in a general settings.

White clip function

This function sets the brightest part of video signals to be not brighter than a certain level.

■ General settings

Use the camera with the factory settings.

Advanced settings

Configure the settings in the main menu \rightarrow [SCENE FILE] \rightarrow [WHITE CLIP SETTING].

[WHITE CLIP]: Turns the white clip function [ON]/[OFF]. When the function is [ON], the setting value of [WHITE CLIP LVL] is enabled.

[WHITE CLIP LVL]: Sets the white clip level.

[Rch CLIP LVL]: Sets the clip level of Rch for white clips.

[Bch CLIP LVL]: Sets the clip level of Bch for white clips.

Setting the electronic shutter

Shutter mode

The shutter modes available on the electronic shutter of the camera and selectable shutter speeds are as follows.

Using a fixed shutter speed

- To remove flicker caused by lighting
- To shoot fast-moving subjects clearly

Using the synchro scan mode

- To shoot so that stripe patterns in the horizontal direction are reduced when shooting on the monitor screen
- To shoot moving subjects with special effects

Adjusting with the <SEL/PUSH SET> dial button and <MODE/MENU CANCEL> button

The shutter mode can be switched and adjusted using the <SEL/PUSH SET> dial button and <MODE/MENU CANCEL> button.

Enabling shutter mode

1 Press the <SEL/PUSH SET> dial button.

[SHUTTER ON] indication appears in the center of the screen. The shutter speed value is indicated and the shutter is enabled. If you press the dial button again, [SHUTTER OFF] indication appears in the center of the screen and the shutter mode is disabled. Every press of the dial button switches [SHUTTER ON]/[SHUTTER OFF].

Changing the shutter mode setting

1 Press the <SEL/PUSH SET> dial button and enable the shutter mode.

[SHUTTER ON] indication appears in the center of the screen.

2 Press the <MODE/MENU CANCEL> button and select a shutter mode.

Every press of the button switches the modes as follows, and the selected mode is highlighted in orange.

Shutter mode \rightarrow variable frame rate mode \rightarrow white balance variable mode

- Variable frame rate mode can be selected only when [ON] is set in the main menu → [SCENE FILE] → [VFR].
- White balance variable mode can be selected only when [VAR] is set in the main menu → [SW MODE] → [W.BAL PRESET], and the <WHITE BAL> switch is set to the <PRST> position.

3 Press the <SEL/PUSH SET> dial button and select shutter mode or synchro shutter mode.

Each time the button is pressed, the normal shutter mode and synchro shutter mode will be toggled.

4 Turn the <SEL/PUSH SET> dial button upward/downward and change the settings.

In synchro shutter mode, you can change the mode quickly by turning the button while it is pressed.

5 Press the <MODE/MENU CANCEL> button several times until the highlight of the mode disappears.




- The synchro scan display can be switched to [sec] (second) or [deg] (degree) in the main menu → [SCENE FILE] → [SYNC SCAN TYPE].
- Also, synchro scan setting can be made in the main menu \rightarrow [SCENE FILE] \rightarrow [SYNCHRO SCAN].
- · Once selected, the shutter speed value and synchro scan speed value are saved even after the camera is turned off.
- Whichever mode the electronic shutter is used in, the higher the shutter speed, the lower the sensitivity of the camera becomes.
- When the aperture is in the automatic mode, it will increasingly open and the depth of focus will become shallower as the shutter speed is increased.
- Under lighting conditions using fluorescent lighting or other discharge tube, horizontal stripes might appear on screen. If this happens, this can be improved by adjusting the shutter speed.
- A subject that quickly crosses the camera may appear distorted when shot. This is due to the method applied for reading the signals from the pickup device (MOS sensor), and is not a malfunction.

Viewfinder screen display for shutter

For details, refer to "Screen status display" (page 158).

Flash band compensation (FBC) function

The camera is equipped with a function for compensating and reducing band-like interference (called "flash band") that occurs due to the MOS pickup device when shooting in environments where flash strobe light such as that from still cameras is present.



Setting the flash band compensation function

Use after assigning the flash band compensation function to the USER button.

By pressing the USER button that is assigned with the flash band compensation function, the function turns on, and flash strobe from a still camera, etc. can be detected and compensated.

For details, refer to "Assigning functions to the USER buttons" (page 43).

When the flash band compensation function is enabled, [FBC] is displayed on the status screen.





- · When the flash strobe lights, the following phenomena may occur. These are due to the flash band compensation function and are not malfunctions.
- Moving subjects look as if they have been stopped for a moment.
- The resolution drops when the flash strobe lights.
- Horizontal lines appear in the video when the flash strobe lights.

Using the flash band compensation function

The flash band compensation function is activated when there are large changes in brightness at the bottom of the screen regardless of whether there is flash strobe light. The flash band compensation function may be activated depending on the shooting environment such as where a bright window has zoomed in and then out. So, we recommend use of this function in shooting environments where flash strobe lighting is anticipated.

Even if flash strobe lighting occurs, sufficient flash band compensation function effect may not be obtained in some shooting environments.

Flash band compensation function operation conditions

- The conditions the flash band compensation function can be used in are 59.94i, 59.94P, 50i, or 50P mode and when the electronic shutter, digital zoom, and variable frame rate functions are not in operation.
- Even if the flash band compensation function is enabled, the flash band compensation function is forcibly disabled if the camera is changed to a mode where the flash band compensation function cannot be used.

To use the function again, return to a mode where the function can be used, and press the USER button to turn on the flash band compensation function.

The flash band compensation function is disabled once the power is turned off.

Variable frame rate (VFR) recording function

This camera can shoot quick motion (undercrank) or slow motion (overcrank) video in 1080P and in the AVC-I100 mode.

You can select native (PN) recording mode and standard (OVER) recording.

In native recording, quick motion and slow motion effects can be obtained without processing recorded images in nonlinear recording system. In standard recording, quick motion and slow motion effects can be obtained by processing recorded images in nonlinear recording system.

Native variable frame rate recording

- 1 Set [1080-59.94P] ([1080-50P]) in the main menu \rightarrow [SYSTEM MODE] \rightarrow [LINE&FREQ].
- 2 Set either one of [AVC-I100/30PN] and [AVC-I100/24PN] ([AVC-I100/25PN]) in the main menu \rightarrow [SYSTEM MODE] \rightarrow [REC FORMAT].
- 3 Set [ON] in the main menu \rightarrow [SCENE FILE] \rightarrow [VFR].
- **4** Set the frame rate according to the shooting conditions in the main menu → [SCENE FILE] → [FRAME RATE]. [FRAME RATE] can be changed using the <SEL/PUSH SET> dial button. For details, refer to "Direct menu operation" (page 79).
- **5** Press the recording button.

Recording starts in native variable frame rate mode.

- During native variable frame rate recording, pre-recording, loop recording, interval recording, one-shot recording, dual codec recording, and one-clip recording can not be performed.
- Audio cannot be recorded. At this time, no audio is output and A.REC is displayed over the audio level meter. When the recording starts, [VFR ON, NO AUDIO RECORDING] is displayed.
- · Time code is fixed to recording run.
- The screen may be distorted when changing the frame rate setting.
- Auto iris and auto focus do not function when the frame rate is set to [9fps] or lower, and when the shutter speed is set to less than 1/12. They must be operated manually.
- · When the frame rate is set to [9fps] or lower, the shutter setting is forcibly disabled and shutter speed settings cannot be changed.

Chapter 4 Shooting — Variable frame rate (VFR) recording function



- During standard variable frame rate recording, pre-recording, loop recording, interval recording, one-shot recording, dual codec recording, and one-clip recording can not be performed.
- · Audio can be recorded.
- Auto iris, auto focus, and auto tracking white balance do not function when the frame rate is set to [9fps] or lower, or when the shutter speed is set to lower than 1/12. They must be operated manually.

Selecting audio input and adjusting recording levels

The camera supports independent 4-channel sound recording in all recording formats (HD, SD).

You can switch audio input recorded on the various channels between the built-in microphone, an external microphone, or a connected audio device.

Selecting audio input signals

Select the audio signal to be recorded to audio channel 1/2.

Audio channel 3/4 is automatically determined by the <CH1 SELECT> and <CH2 SELECT> settings.

Adjusting the recording level

The adjustment dial on the camera has manual adjustment and auto adjustment.

Automatic adjustment

■ Setting audio channels 1/2

1 Set the <CH1>/<CH2> switch to <AUTO>.

When set, the camera moves to auto adjustment mode and the audio recording level is automatically set in accordance with the input level.

- You can set audio channels 1/2 separately using the switch.
- When set to <AUTO>, the following operations are disabled.
 - Changing the recording level with the <AUDIO LEVEL CH1>/<AUDIO LEVEL CH2> dial.
 - Setting in the main menu → [AUDIO SETUP] → [RECORDING CH SETTING] → [LIMITER CH1]/[LIMITER CH2].

■ Setting audio channels 3/4

1 Set [ON] in the main menu \rightarrow [AUDIO SETUP] \rightarrow [RECORDING CH SETTING] \rightarrow [AUTO LEVEL CH3]/[AUTO LEVEL CH4].

The camera moves to auto adjustment mode and the audio recording level is automatically set in accordance with the input level.

- You can set audio channels 3/4 separately with the switch.
- When set to <AUTO>, the following operations are disabled.
 - Recording level settings in the main menu → [AUDIO SETUP] → [RECORDING CH SETTING] → [LEVEL CONTROL CH3]/[LEVEL CONTROL CH4]
- Setting in the main menu → [AUDIO SETUP] → [RECORDING CH SETTING] → [LIMITER CH3]/[LIMITER CH4].
- Recording level of audio signal is adjusted automatically. Therefore, depending on the ambient sound, the zoom sound may be recorded during high-speed zoom operation. In this case, adjust the recording level manually.

Manual adjustment

■ Setting audio channels 1/2

1 Set the <CH1>/<CH2> switch to <MANU>.

2 Adjust with the <AUDIO LEVEL CH1>/<AUDIO LEVEL CH2> dial.

If the audio meter indication exceeds 0 dB, the vertical red line of 0 dB thickens to indicate that the input audio volume is excessive. Adjust to keep lower than 0 dB.

- Setting audio channels 3/4
- 1 Set [OFF] in the main menu \rightarrow [AUDIO SETUP] \rightarrow [RECORDING CH SETTING] \rightarrow [AUTO LEVEL CH3]/[AUTO LEVEL CH4].
- 2 Set and adjust in the main menu \rightarrow [AUDIO SETUP] \rightarrow [RECORDING CH SETTING] \rightarrow [LEVEL CONTROL CH3]/[LEVEL CONTROL CH4].

The higher the value, the higher the level.

The factory setting is [70].

Recording standard level

You can select [12dB]/[18dB]/[20dB] in the main menu → [AUDIO SETUP] → [RECORDING CH SETTING] → [HEADROOM].

Common settings for channels 1 through 4.

[20dB]: Select to match to the Panasonic AJ series camera recorder for broadcasting.

[12dB]: Select to match to the Panasonic AG-HPX170 series camera recorder for business use.

Adjustment with the <F.AUDIO LEVEL> dial

Adjust not to reach the excessive input while watching the level meter on the LCD monitor or viewfinder screen.

- Select the audio channel you want to adjust beforehand in the main menu → [AUDIO SETUP] → [RECORDING CH SETTING] → [FRONT VR SELECTI.
- Adjust with the <F.AUDIO LEVEL> dial.

Displaying the audio level detailed

Press the <DISP/MODE CHK> switch towards the <CHK> side to check the display on the audio screen of the mode check screen. For details, refer to "Mode check display" (page 164).

Getting position information using the GPS

Acquiring position information using the GPS in the camera

The GPS is built-in the camera. You can record the position information using GPS to clips as clip metadata.

Information from GPS (latitude, longitude, altitude, date and time) can be viewed on the screen. For details, refer to "Mode check display" (page 164). Set the main menu \rightarrow [OTHER FUNCTIONS] \rightarrow [GPS] to [INTERNAL].

- [GPS] illuminates on the LCD monitor and viewfinder screen, and GPS signal reception is indicated by bars in four levels.
- If [HOLD] is set in the main menu → [OTHER FUNCTIONS] → [P.OFF GPS DATA], the GPS position information can be retained.

NOTE

- If it cannot position even after waiting several minutes, it means that the GPS signals are weak and difficult to receive.
- · Position in the open space with a clear view of the sky.
- · Detecting altitude may take more time than detecting latitude and longitude.
- When the main menu → [SYSTEM MODE] → [REC FORMAT] is set to DVCPROHD, DVCPRO50, DVCPRO, or DV mode, GPS information is not recorded to clips.
- The followings are locations where the signals from the GPS satellite cannot be properly received. Thus, you may not be able to position or you have large margin of errors.
- Indoors
- Near buildings or a canyon of buildings
- In underground shopping areas
- In forests
- While moving in trains or automobiles
- Inside tunnels

Acquiring position information from external device

This camera can acquire the position information (latitude, longitude, and altitude) from the bonding device connected via network.

Set the main menu \rightarrow [OTHER FUNCTIONS] \rightarrow [GPS] to [EXTERNAL].

The acquired position information is recorded in the clip as clip metadata.

The position information can be confirmed in the main menu \rightarrow [NETWORK SETUP] \rightarrow [NETWORK TOOLS] \rightarrow [STATUS DISPLAY].




- · The position information may not be acquired depending on the connected bonding device.

Special recording functions

You can use special recording functions such as pre-recording and loop recording by setting the menu.

Pre-recording

This function enables recording of video and audio from a fixed amount of time (approx. 3 seconds during HD recording, and approx. 7 seconds during SD recording) before recording is actually started.

2 Set [ON] in the main menu \rightarrow [RECORDING SETUP] \rightarrow [PRE REC].

3 Press the REC button.

• [P-REC] is displayed while recording, and [P-] is displayed while paused. (page 162)




• [P-REC] indication when [PRE REC] is set to [OFF]

When [PRE REC] is set to [OFF], [REC] is displayed until recording of video or audio to the P2 card is completely finished after recording is stopped. Refer to "One clip recording mode status display" (page 161) for information about the [P-REC] indicator.

- Press the USER button to which [PRE REC] is assigned to simply toggle between [ON]/[OFF] of [PRE REC]. For details, refer to "Assigning functions
 to the USER buttons" (page 43).
- · Video and audio according to the preset time sometimes cannot be recorded in the following cases:
- Immediately after the power is turned on
- After recording-related settings have been altered in the setting menu
- Immediately after the P2 card is inserted
- After playback or recording check is performed
- · The pre-recording function does not function in the following cases:
- When an item other than [NORMAL] is selected in the main menu → [RECORDING SETUP] → [RECORDING]

Interval recording

The camera will record one frame at each set time interval.



- 1 Set all items in the main menu \rightarrow [SYSTEM MODE].
- $oldsymbol{2}$ Set [INTERVAL] in the main menu ightarrow [RECORDING SETUP] ightarrow [RECORDING].
- 3 Set the time in the main menu \rightarrow [RECORDING SETUP] \rightarrow [RECORDING SETTING] \rightarrow [INTERVAL TIME].

4 Press the REC button.

- The camera will repeat the operation of one frame recording at each set time interval.
- To stop recording, press the <
 ■> button.
- $\bullet \text{ To clear settings, set [NORMAL] in the main menu} \rightarrow [\text{RECORDING SETUP}] \rightarrow [\text{RECORDING}].$
- When [OFF] is set in the main menu → [RECORDING SETUP] → [RECORDING SETTING] → [RECORDING HOLD], interval recording settings are cleared by turning off the camera.
- [I-REC] is displayed while recording, and [I-] is displayed while paused. However, if the setting in step 3 is less than two seconds, [I-REC] flashes according to the set interval time.
- When recording is stopped, [I-] flashes.



- · Pre-recording and one-clip recording will not operate.
- · Audio is not recorded.
- · Recorded data (data recorded until the camera was stopped) is included in one file.

One-shot recording

Recording takes place once for the set amount of time.

- f 1 Set all items in the main menu ightarrow [SYSTEM MODE].
- $oldsymbol{2}$ Select [ONE SHOT] in the main menu ightarrow [RECORDING SETUP] ightarrow [RECORDING].
- f 3 Set the time with [ONE SHOT TIME] in the main menu o [RECORDING SETUP] o [RECORDING SETTING].

4 Press the REC button.

- Once recording has taken place for the set amount of time, recording will pause.
- To stop recording, press the < > button.
- To clear settings, set [NORMAL] in the main menu \rightarrow [RECORDING SETUP] \rightarrow [RECORDING].
- When [OFF] is set in the main menu \rightarrow [RECORDING SETUP] \rightarrow [RECORDING SETTING] \rightarrow [RECORDING HOLD], one-shot recording settings are cleared by turning off the camera.
- [I-REC] is displayed while recording, and [I-] is displayed while paused.
- When recording is stopped, [I-] flashes.


NOTE

- · While in operation, other operations are unavailable.
- · Pre-recording and one-clip recording will not operate.
- · Audio is not recorded.
- · Recorded data (data recorded until the camera was stopped) is included in one file.
- · When one-shot recording is continuously performed, the recording operation may be slower.

Loop recording

- This function successively records to two microP2 memory cards inserted in the microP2 card slots. You cannot combine microP2 cards and P2 cards.
- When there is no more free space on the card, recording returns to the first card, and recording is continued while erasing existing data already saved on that card.

For details, refer to "Dividing clips recorded on P2 cards" (page 41).



1 Check the settings of each item in the main menu \rightarrow [SYSTEM MODE].

2 Set [LOOP] in the main menu \rightarrow [RECORDING SETUP] \rightarrow [RECORDING].

3 Press the REC button.


- Recording is started.
- To stop recording, press the REC button again.
- ullet To clear settings, set [NORMAL] in the main menu \to [RECORDING SETUP] \to [RECORDING].
- When [OFF] is set in the main menu → [RECORDING SETUP] → [RECORDING SETTING] → [RECORDING HOLD], loop recording settings are cleared by turning off the camera.
- [L-REC] is displayed while recording, and [L-] is displayed while paused. When loop recording cannot be performed due to memory shortage, etc., [LOOP] flashes.

NOTE

- When this function is used, use two microP2 memory cards with at least one minute of free space each.
- The remaining time of the microP2 memory card displayed in the mode check screen displays the standard recording time in accordance with the recording format. When loop recording is stopped immediately after an old recording is erased, the time recorded on the card is sometimes less than the indicated time.
- · Pre-recording and one-clip recording will not operate.
- It may take time for recording to stop. The subsequent operation is not accepted until LED of microP2 memory card access stops blinking and stays lighted on.
- During loop recording, all LEDs of microP2 memory card access on the microP2 memory cards used for recording are lighted or blink orange. Loop recording stops when these microP2 memory cards are removed. Be careful.
- Loop recording may stop when the input reference signal of the generator lock is disrupted during loop recording.

One-clip recording

You can record a single recording (from start to stop of recording) not as one clip but as a clip integrating several recordings.



- * A maximum of 99 recordings can be linked. When the 99th recording is finished, linking of clips ends automatically and the next reading will be a new clip.
- 1 Set [ON] in the main menu \rightarrow [RECORDING SETUP] \rightarrow [ONE CLIP REC].

When one-clip recording mode is selected, [1-CLIP] is displayed.

2 Press the REC button.

The first recording starts and [START 1*CLIP] is displayed.

Thereafter, each time recording takes place the clips are automatically linked, making a single group up to a maximum of 99 recordings.

Recording as a new clip

When you want to split the clip as a new clip, finish linking clips using one of the following operations.

- Press and hold the < >> button for approximately two seconds while recording is paused. (When operating while recording is paused)
- Press and hold the REC button for approximately two seconds during recording, to end recording. (When operating while recording.)

By these operations, clip linking ends and [END 1-CLIP] is displayed. A new separate clip will start at the next recording.



- In the following cases, the camera finishes clip linking and records as a new clip.
- When the power is turned off
- When a P2 card recorded immediately before is removed
- When the P2 card is formatted or the clips are deleted (when the original linked clip no longer exists)
- When the menu and thumbnails are displayed, clip linking cannot be ended even if you press and hold the <
 button for approximately two seconds or longer.

Ending one-clip recording mode

Set [OFF] in the main menu \rightarrow [RECORDING SETUP] \rightarrow [ONE CLIP REC].

Cueing up linked parts of clips

Each time recording starts, a text memo is automatically added to the recording start position so that you can cue up when playing back. You can also check the thumbnail of its position.

To automatically add a text memo to the recording start point, set [ON] in the main menu \rightarrow [RECORDING SETUP] \rightarrow [START TEXT MEMO].

To view or play back the point of the added text memo, select [TEXT MEMO CLIPS] in the main menu \rightarrow [CLIP] \rightarrow [REPOSITION] and place the cursor on the target clip.

For details, refer to "Playing back from the text memo position" (page 119).

To cue up the text memo position when playing back, set [CLIP&TEXT MEMO] in the main menu \rightarrow [OTHER FUNCTIONS] \rightarrow [SEEK POS SEL] and press < 44/> > > while playback is paused.

Proxy recording in one-clip recording mode

You can carry out proxy recording in one-clip recording mode.

The group proxy data also can be combined as the same type of linked clip so that you can handle it as a single clip with the P2 Viewer Plus, etc. However, when recording proxy data on an SD memory card, be careful of the following points.

- When you remove the SD memory card and replace it while continuously making clip links, proxy recording will not take place on the SD memory card until the subsequent clips are linked. Use after making sure that there is sufficient available space and number of files (maximum of 1000 clips can be recorded).
- When continuing proxy recording after replacing the SD memory card part-way through, carry out the following operation.
- Press the <■> button for approximately two seconds to finish linking, and start recording as a new clip.
- The proxy data on the SD memory card that was discontinued during recording is not recognized as proxy data for the clip recorded on the P2 card and will remain incomplete.

When using one-clip recording mode

- When interval recording, one-shot recording, loop recording, and variable frame rate recording functions are selected, it will not operate.
- While continuing clip linking, menu and thumbnail operations are subject to the following restrictions. They can be operated after pressing the <
 >>
 button continuously for approximately two seconds and ending clip linking.
- You cannot change the following menu items.
 [LINE&FREQ], [REC FORMAT], [CAMERA MODE], [AUDIO SMPL RES], [ASPECT CONV], [SCAN REVERSE]
- You can change the variable frame rate recording function to [ON] in the main menu → [SCENE FILE] → [VFR], even while continuously linking clips. In this case, clip linking ends and subsequent recordings become separate clips each time.

- When reading/exporting to the SD memory card and reading setting files, the following menu items cannot be executed.

Main menu \rightarrow [SCENE FILE] \rightarrow [LOAD/SAVE/INITIALIZE]

All items in the main menu → [CARD FUNCTIONS]

Main menu → [OTHER FUNCTIONS] → [USER FILE]



- The following thumbnail items cannot be selected and operated. Main menu \rightarrow [CLIP] \rightarrow [COPY]
- In order to make it possible to link clips in the next recording, the processing time required to end recording may take slightly longer than standard recording.
- When playing back, fade processing of unlinked audio will not be done at the time recordings are linked within clips.
- When editing a clip with a large number of links using nonlinear editing software, etc., the software may not operate properly depending on the type of

Simultaneous recording

This function records the same image onto two microP2 memory cards when the two microP2 memory cards are inserted into two slots.



Selecting [ON] in the main menu \rightarrow [RECORDING SETUP] \rightarrow [SIMUL REC] will set the camera to simultaneous recording mode.

The remaining time that can be simultaneously recorded (the remaining time of the memory card that has less available recording space) is displayed in the media remaining space indicator on the screen, and [SIMUL] is displayed.

When the microP2 memory card in the slot with less remaining recording space becomes full, simultaneous recording will stop.

When starting simultaneous recording again, replace the microP2 memory card in a slot with full capacity with a new microP2 memory card, and press the REC button. When the simultaneous recording cannot be performed, [SIMUL] indication is displayed with a diagonal line.

If you press the REC button without replacing the microP2 memory card, normal recording will be performed on the microP2 memory card in slot 2 (the slot with remaining memory space).

For details on system modes in which simultaneous recording can be used, refer to the table in "System modes and recording functions" (page 80).



- Start recording when two microP2 memory cards are recognized. When recording is started before both microP2 memory cards are recognized, normal recording is performed using either microP2 memory card. The card status is checked after recording ends. At that time, if both cards are recognized, simultaneous recording is performed.
- Simultaneous recording cannot be used together with loop recording, interval recording, one-shot recording, or dual codec recording.
- If recording stops because a recording malfunction occurs in one of the microP2 memory cards during simultaneous recording, the camera will continue recording onto the other microP2 memory card. However, if the card is removed while accessing, recording will stop.
- · If there is space in one of the microP2 memory cards after simultaneous recording has ended, the microP2 memory card with space will automatically be the recording target.

Press the REC button again to record normally.

- · If only one microP2 memory card is inserted when simultaneous recording mode is set, the camera will record normally.
- · The final clip delete function after simultaneous recording is disabled.


Background recording

If microP2 cards are inserted in two slots, set the background recording mode and then press the recording button to start recording simultaneously on slot 1 and 2. On slot 1, recording can be repeatedly started and stopped as necessary by operating the recording button. On slot 2, the recording operation continues as background recording.

By performing background recording on slot 2, you will not miss important scenes while recording is stopped.

For details on system modes in which background recording can be used, refer to the table in "System modes and recording functions" (page 80).

Memory card recording time



*USER button to which [BACKGR REC PAUSE] has been assigned

To start background recording

1 Select [ON] in the main menu \rightarrow [RECORDING SETUP] \rightarrow [BACKGROUND REC].

The camera goes into the background recording mode.

2 Press the recording button.

Recording starts on slot 1 and 2 simultaneously, and [BACKGR] is displayed on the screen.

Recording on slot 1 can be started or stopped by recording button operations.

On slot 2, the recording operation continues as background recording.



- Recording on both slot 1 and 2 are performed in the format set in the main menu → [SYSTEM MODE].
- · Background recording cannot be performed in the following cases.
- When other than [NORMAL] is set in the main menu → [RECORDING SETUP] → [RECORDING]
- When [P2] is set in the main menu \rightarrow [RECORDING SETUP] \rightarrow [REC MEDIA]
- When other than [OFF] is set in the main menu \rightarrow [RECORDING SETUP] \rightarrow [DUAL CODEC SETTING]
- When [4G/LTE] is set in the main menu → [NETWORK SETUP] → [NETWORK SEL], normal recording can be performed on slot 1.
- The lighting status of tally lamp changes according to starting or stopping of recording on slot 1.
- Time code is fixed to free run.
- The settings in the main menu → [OUTPUT SEL] → [HD SDI REMOTE] is disabled. Controlling of recording operation of external devices (such as a recorder) cannot be performed.
- In background recording mode, deleting last clip function is disabled.
- Even while background recording is performed on slot 2, if recording on slot 1 is being stopped, microP2 memory card in slot 1 can be replaced.
- If a recordable microP2 memory card is not inserted in slot 2 or the free space of the microP2 memory card in slot 2 has run out, normal recording can be performed on slot 1.

To end background recording

1 Hold down the USER button to which [BACKGR REC PAUSE] has been assigned for approx. five seconds.

The background recording on slot 2 will be stopped. The [BACKGR] indication is displayed with a diagonal line.



- While recording is performed on slot 1, the background recording on slot 2 cannot be ended. End the background recording while recording is stopped on slot 1.
- The background recording on slot 2 ends in the following cases.
- When the power is turned off
- When the free space of the microP2 memory card has run out
- When an error has occurred on writing to the microP2 memory card
- When the USER button to which [BACKGR REC PAUSE] has been assigned is held down for approx. five seconds

Hot swap recording

When microP2 memory cards are inserted into two microP2 memory card slots, recording can be performed continuously across two cards. Also, the card other than the one currently being recorded to can be swapped and recording can be continued on three or more cards (hot swap recording).

Note, however, microP2 memory card recognition might slow down depending on the timing (immediately after pre-recording or before and after continuous recording across two card slots) when the microP2 memory card is inserted into the vacant card slot. When inserting microP2 memory card, make sure that there is at least one minute of free space on the card to be recorded to.

Pressing the <SLOT SEL> button allows you to change the slot to be recorded to with one touch.



- · You can perform hot swap recording only in the microP2 memory card slot.
- · Change slots while recording is on stand-by. You cannot change slots during recording.
- · Hot swap playback is not supported.

Recording check function

- After recording ends, press the <REC CHECK> button automatically to play back approximately three seconds of the latest video and audio.
 In this way, you can check whether video has been recorded properly. After playback, the camera is again ready to start recording.
- Hold down the <REC CHECK> button for one second to play back from the last ten seconds of the latest clip. During playback at recording check, press the <REC CHECK> button again to stop the playback.

Shot mark recording function

Shot mark is the mark added to the thumbnail of each clip to distinguish that clip from others.

Only clips with shot marks attached can be displayed or played back.

Adding shot marks

- **1** Assign [SHOT MARK] to one of [USER1] to [USER8] in the main menu \rightarrow [USER SW].
- 2 During recording or a pause after recording, press the button to which the shot mark is assigned.
 - [MARK ON] is displayed, and the shot mark is added to the most recently recorded clip.
 - Another press of the button displays [MARK OFF] and the shot mark disappears.



- · When the shot mark is added during a recording pause, it is added to the clip recorded immediately before.
- Shot marks can also be added while the thumbnail is being displayed. (page 119)
- Shot marks cannot be added during loop recording, interval recording, or one-shot recording. If an operation is invalid, [SHOT MARK INVALID] is
 displayed when the button is pressed.
- · During playback, setting or canceling the shot mark is not available. While pausing the playback, setting or canceling the shot mark is available.
- The following restrictions apply when adding shot marks to combined clips, such as those recorded over multiple microP2 memory cards, or when
 deleting them.
- All microP2 memory cards composed of clips must be inserted into the slots.
- A shot mark is added only to the top clip among combined clips.

Text memo recording function

Text memos can be added to any video point while a clip is being recorded or played back.

Only clips with a text memo added can be selected and displayed as thumbnails. Also, thumbnails at text memo positions can be displayed in order and played back from text memo points, and only required portions can be selected and copied. (page 119)

Adding text memos

- **1** Assign [TEXT MEMO] to one of [USER1] to [USER8] in the main menu \rightarrow [USER SW].
- 2 During recording or a playback, press the button to which the text memo is assigned.

[TEXT MEMO] is displayed, and the text memo is added to the video clip that was displayed when the button was pressed.



- · Up to 100 text memos can be recorded to a single clip.
- Text memos cannot be added during loop recording, interval recording, or one-shot recording. If an operation is invalid, [TEXT MEMO INVALID] is displayed when the button is pressed.

Convenient shooting functions

Low angle shooting

When shooting at low angles, releasing the hold cover on the REC button on the handle from the <HOLD> position will allow shooting with the REC button on the handle.

• To prevent accidental operation of the REC button on the handle when it is not in use, keep the hold cover to the <HOLD> position.

Scan reverse shooting

Set [ON] in the main menu → [SYSTEM MODE] → [SCAN REVERSE] to display and record the image in vertically or horizontally reverse.

Zebra patterns display

The camera can display two types of zebra patterns.


Press the <ZEBRA> button displays the zebra pattern that is set in the menu.

Zebra patterns can also be displayed in the video from the <GENLOCK IN/VIDEO OUT> terminal according to the menu setting.

The level for zebra pattern display can be set in the main menu \rightarrow [DISPLAY SETUP].

[SPOT]: The image level from the setting value of [ZEBRA1 DETECT] to the setting value of [ZEBRA2 DETECT] is displayed in the zebra pattern.



To display the zebra patterns in the video of the monitor output terminal (<GENLOCK IN/VIDEO OUT>), set in the main menu \rightarrow [OUTPUT SEL] \rightarrow [VIDEO OUT ZEBRA].

Displaying the center marker

Displays when setting an item other than [OFF] in the main menu \rightarrow [DISPLAY SETUP] \rightarrow [CENTER MARK].





• The center marker display is not displayed in the images of terminals <SDI OUT>, <GENLOCK IN/VIDEO OUT>, and <HDMI OUT>.

Displaying the safety zone marker

The items you select the main menu \rightarrow [DISPLAY SETUP] \rightarrow [SAFETY MARK] are displayed.

The size of the safety zone marker can be changed in the main menu \rightarrow [DISPLAY SETUP] \rightarrow [SAFETY AREA].



• The safety zone marker display is not displayed in the images of terminals <SDI OUT>, <GENLOCK IN/VIDEO OUT>, and <HDMI OUT>.

Displaying frame marker

Displays when [ON] is set in the main menu \rightarrow [DISPLAY SETUP] \rightarrow [FRAME MARK].

Set the angle of view in the main menu \rightarrow [DISPLAY SETUP] \rightarrow [FRAME SIG].

Set the outside level in the main menu \rightarrow [DISPLAY SETUP] \rightarrow [FRAME LVL].

Checking and displaying the shooting status

- <DISP/MODE CHK> switch is the spring switch to check the shooting status of the camera during recording standby or recording.
- Pushing this to the <OFF> side will hide all displays other than operation status displays on the viewfinder and LCD monitor screens, frame display of the area, counter, marker, and safety zone displays.
- Pushing this towards the <CHK> side will display information on the screen such as setting status of all shooting functions, the list of functions assigned to the USER buttons, etc. Each press of the button switches the information page.

Changing image size

When recording in 480i/576i mode, you can change the size (aspect ratio) of the recorded image. Select the main menu \rightarrow [SYSTEM MODE] \rightarrow [ASPECT CONV].

[SIDE CROP]: Record using standard 4:3 mode. Cut both the left and right edges.

[LETTER BOX]: Record 16:9 the angle of view. A black band is recorded at the top and bottom of the screen. When set to [LETTER BOX], black bands at the top and bottom are not displayed because the screen size of the viewfinder and LCD monitor is 16:9. [LT.BOX] is displayed on the screen.

[SQUEEZE]: Camera images are compressed in the horizontal direction when recording. Replaying recorded images on a TV monitor that supports a wide screen will convert the images to an aspect ratio of 16:9.

Image stabilization function

The image stabilizer function will reduce the amount of hand shake on the image when you shoot while holding the camera recorder in your hand.

The image stabilizer can be switched from enabled/disabled with the <OIS> button.

When the image stabilizer is enabled, (is displayed in the viewfinder and LCD monitor.

When using a tripod, disabling the image stabilizer function will allow you to obtain natural images.



· When there is a lot of shaking while shooting and when following a moving subject, the function may not be able to stabilize the image.

Dynamic range stretcher function

You can increase the dynamic range by compressing the image signal for the extremely bright areas that are overexposed during normal shooting while maintaining contrast.

The knee function, black gamma function, and gamma mode function do not work when the dynamic range stretcher function is activated.

Select [ON] in the main menu \rightarrow [SCENE FILE] \rightarrow [DRS] to operate.

You can change the level of compression in the main menu \rightarrow [SCENE FILE] \rightarrow [DRS EFFECT DEPTH].

[ON]/[OFF] of [DRS] can be assigned to the USER button.

Backlight compensation

When shooting a subject in backlight, press the USER button to which the [BACKLIGHT] function is assigned.

The [BACK] is displayed on the screen.

The auto iris control for the backlight compensation prevents darkening of the image of the subject.

Press the USER button again to cancel backlight compensation.

Color bars

Pressing the <BARS> button allows you to display the color bars, which are a convenient tool for adjusting image quality on a TV or external monitor. Pressing this button again returns the view to the original image.

Four types of color bar ([SMPTE]/[FULL BARS]/[SPLIT]/[ARIB]) can be selected in the main menu \rightarrow [SW MODE] \rightarrow [BARS TYPE].

Time stamp function

You can record the date and time of shooting on the images.

Select [ON] in the main menu \rightarrow [RECORDING SETUP] \rightarrow [TIME STAMP].

When the time stamp function is [ON], [R] is displayed at the top of the date and time display on the viewfinder and LCD monitor.

- [R] is not recorded on the actual image.
- Depending upon the shooting format, the size and location of the lettering of the date and time recorded on the image will be different.
- The recorded details will change depending on the settings in the main menu → [DISPLAY SETUP] → [DATE/TIME]. It will not be recorded when the
 camera is set to [OFF].



• Image on the viewfinder and LCD monitor, and the actual time stamp recorded in the video on <SDI OUT>, <GENLOCK IN/VIDEO OUT>, and <HDMI OUT> terminals are not displayed. Video recorded in media includes time stamp.

Date and time is recorded at the lower right of the video. It is different from the position of the date and time displayed in the viewfinder and LCD monitor.

Deleting last clip function

You can delete the last clip you shot.

Press the USER button to which [DEL LAST CLIP] is assigned, [YES]/[NO] appears on the screen.

Select [YES] to delete the last shot clip, [DELETION IS COMPLETED!] appears on the screen.

Not to delete the clip, select [NO].

- The clip will not be able to delete when the following are performed after recording.
- When the power is turned off once and then turned on again
- When the camera restarts such as switching to the USB mode
- When all the P2 cards constructing the video data created by a single recording like with the hot swap recording are not inserted in the slots
- When set to one-clip recording
- When it is in the thumbnail mode or the playback mode (including recording check)

Waveform monitor function

Press the <WFM> button to display the image waveform. Press the button again to return to the normal display.

- The waveform and vector displays can be switched using [WFM MODE] in the main menu → [SW MODE]. The waveform display will only be
 displayed on the LCD monitor. The viewfinder does not show the waveform.
- The waveform is not displayed while the focus assist function [EXPAND] is active.
- The waveform display cannot be recorded.

Direct menu operation

This function changes the settings of values for shutter speed, synchro scan shutter speed, white balance, and frame rate that are displayed on the screen using the <MODE/MENU CANCEL> button.

- Variable frame rate mode can be selected only when [ON] is selected in the main menu → [SCENE FILE] → [VFR].
- White balance variable mode can be selected only when [VAR] is set in the main menu → [SW MODE] → [W.BAL PRESET], and the <WHITE BAL> switch is set to the <PRST> position.
- 1 Press the <MODE/MENU CANCEL> button and select an item to be changed.

Every press of the button shows orange highlight on the selected mode.

- f 2 Turn the <SEL/PUSH SET> dial button upward/downward and change the settings.
- 3 Press the <MODE/MENU CANCEL> button several times until the highlight of the mode disappears.

Multi formats

Selecting recording signals

This camera can record HD (1080P, 1080i, 720P) signals in a combined format of AVC-Intra, AVC-LongG, and DVCPRO HD codecs, and can record SD (480i/576i) signals in a combined format of DVCPRO50, DVCPRO, and DV codecs.

Recording and shooting signals can be selected in the main menu \rightarrow [SYSTEM MODE].

Recording the proxy data

Use P2 Viewer Plus to check the proxy data. Some versions of P2 Viewer Plus may not be able to check the data.

- Clips with proxy data recorded with the camera are handled as unknown clips by some P2 devices. NG (unknown clip indicator) is displayed on the thumbnail, and the following operations become unavailable.

- [EXCH. THUMBNAIL]
- Adding and deleting [TEXT MEMO] and [SHOT MARK]

Playback is possible.

On these devices, clips with proxy data made of linked multiple clips are displayed as individual incomplete clips 1

Checking detailed information of the proxy data

Operation methods and panels may differ by version.

1 Press the <THUMBNAIL> button.

The thumbnail screen appears on the viewfinder screen and LCD monitor.

2 Select [CLIP PROPERTY] in the main menu \rightarrow [CLIP] \rightarrow [PROPERTY].

The clip property screen is displayed.

3 Select [PROXY] using the control stick.

4 Press the control stick.

Copying proxy data to the SD memory card

- If [SD END] is displayed and the proxy data being recorded to the SD memory card is deleted, perform this procedure to copy the proxy data from the P2 card, and enable the deleted proxy data to be restored.
- Source data is not copied.

Streaming function

You can perform live streaming of audio and video from the camera over the network (wired LAN, wireless LAN, 4G/LTE).

Streaming video from the camera or an application software (e.g. P2 Browser, P2 Streaming Receiver) of a device connected to the camera through a network is transmitted to a server capable of receiving such signal.

There are two ways to start streaming: streaming from an application software and streaming from the camera.



• To display the streaming video in the P2 Browser, start the streaming distribution by operation from the application software. The streaming video cannot be displayed when operated from the camera.

Setting the network connection

The network settings of the camera are configured according to the settings of application software.

For details on the network connection when starting streaming from the camera or an application software such as P2 Streaming Receiver, refer to "Connection settings for the streaming function" (page 191).

Using the streaming function

After you finish configuring the network connection, you can configure the streaming function.

- 1 Select [STREAMING] in the main menu → [RECORDING SETUP] → [DUAL CODEC SETTING] → [CODEC USAGE]. Streaming function is enabled.
- 2 Set the streaming mode in the main menu → [RECORDING SETUP] → [DUAL CODEC SETTING] → [STREAMING MODE].
 - Select either [LOW], [HQ], [AVC-G6], [SHQ (QoS)], or [AVC-G (QoS)].
 - For details on combinations of system modes and streaming modes, refer to the table in "List of system modes and supported streaming output" (page 94).
- 3 Set the method for starting streaming.
 - . When starting streaming through operation from an application software
 - Select [RECEIVER] in the main menu → [NETWORK SETUP] → [STREAMING SETTING] → [START TRIGGER].
 - When starting streaming through operation from the camera
 - Select [CAMERA] in the main menu → [NETWORK SETUP] → [STREAMING SETTING] → [START TRIGGER].
 - Perform following settings when the streaming mode is set to [SHQ (QoS)] or [AVC-G (QoS)] in Step 2.
 - Set the main menu \rightarrow [RECORDING SETUP] \rightarrow [DUAL CODEC SETTING] \rightarrow [QoS MAX RATE] and [QoS MIN RATE].
 - Set the delay mode during live streaming in the main menu → [RECORDING SETUP] → [DUAL CODEC SETTING] → [STREAMING LATENCY]. Set to [NORMAL] if you want to emphasize the stability of streaming. Set to [SHORT] if you want to emphasize the reduction of streaming delay.

4 Start streaming.

• When starting streaming through operation from an application software

If you started streaming using an application software, the camera starts the transmission of streaming video.

When starting streaming through operation from the camera

 $\mathsf{Select}\: [\mathsf{ON}]\: \mathsf{in}\: \mathsf{the}\: \mathsf{main}\: \mathsf{menu} \to [\mathsf{NETWORK}\: \mathsf{SETUP}] \to [\mathsf{STREAMING}\: \mathsf{SETTING}] \to [\mathsf{START}].$

If the camera is connected to the transmission destination through a network, the camera starts the transmission of streaming video.

To stop the transmission of streaming video, select [OFF] in the main menu \rightarrow [NETWORK SETUP] \rightarrow [STREAMING SETTING] \rightarrow [START]. Also, the start and stop of the streaming image distribution can be controlled by the USER button when [STREAMING START] is assigned to the USER button with the main menu \rightarrow [USER SW].



- To display streaming video using the P2 Browser, VLC Media Player is required for Windows OS and QuickTime Player is required for Mac OS. However, the P2 Browser does not support the QoS function.

- The streaming function cannot be used together with the dual codec recording, simultaneous recording, and background recording.
- The streaming function cannot be used together with the rec during upload function.
- If available bandwidth of the network is low and streaming playback is interrupted, this can be improved by selecting a lower bitrate mode in [STREAMING MODE], or selecting either [SHQ (QoS)] or [AVC-G (QoS)]. In addition, if [SHQ (QoS)] or [AVC-G (QoS)] is selected, the terminal that receives streaming data needs to support the QoS function.
- · The streaming video from the camera will be a black screen in the thumbnail mode and playback mode (including the recording check).

Handling setting data

Setting data file configuration

Scene files with [F1:] to [F6:] can be saved on the camera according to the settings in the main menu → [SCENE FILE].


Scene file data ([F1:] to [F6:]) can be saved as a file, and up to eight files can be saved on the SD memory card at a time, which can be loaded and used.

Setting menu values can be saved as one user file on the camera, and up to eight files can be saved on the SD memory card.

[USER MENU] settings registered with [USER MENU SEL] can also be saved on or loaded from the camera and the SD memory card at the same time as a user file.





Handling SD memory cards

The SD memory card can be removed and inserted, either before or after the power is turned on.

Inserting SD memory cards





- 1 Open the slot cover. (Fig. 1)
- 2 Insert the SD memory card into the SD memory card slot with the label side of the card upward, and close the slot cover. (Fig. 2)



- The SD memory card must be inserted with the correct side facing the SD card slot. If the SD memory card is hard to insert, it may be reversed or upside-down. Do not force it into the slot. Check the orientation of the card before reinserting it.
- On the camera, use SD memory cards that are compliant with the SD, the SDHC, or the SDXC standards.
- For details on handling SD memory cards, refer to "Cautions when using SD memory cards" (page 21).

Removing SD memory cards

After opening the slot cover and making sure that the busy lamp is not illuminated, push the SD memory card further into the camera and then release. This releases the SD memory card from the card slot. Remove the SD memory card and close the slot cover.

Note the following points when using or storing memory cards.

- Avoid high temperature and humidity.
- Avoid water droplets.
- Avoid charging with electricity.

Store the SD memory card with the card still inserted into the camera and with the slot cover closed.

Performing operations on SD memory cards

To perform operations such as formatting an SD memory card, writing setting data to an SD memory card, or reading the written data, use [FORMAT SD CARD] and [SCENE FILE]/[USER FILE] in the main menu \rightarrow [CARD FUNCTIONS].

If the SD memory card that was formatted in a standard other than the SD/SDHC/SDXC standards on a device other than the camera is inserted, [LOAD] or [SAVE] operation of the file cannot be performed. Format the SD memory card again.

Formatting SD memory cards



1 Select [SAVE] in the main menu → [OTHER FUNCTIONS] → [USER FILE] and press the control stick (or <SEL/PUSH SET> dial button).

The confirmation screen is displayed.

- f 2 Select [YES] and press the control stick (or <SEL/PUSH SET> dial button).
- f 3 When the completion message is displayed, press the control stick (or the <SEL/PUSH SET> dial button).

Loading written user data

1 Select [LOAD] in the main menu → [OTHER FUNCTIONS] → [USER FILE] and press the control stick (or <SEL/PUSH SET> dial button).

The confirmation screen is displayed.

If [SYSTEM RESTART] is displayed on the confirmation screen, the camera will restart after reading out is complete.

f 2 Select [YES] and press the control stick (or <SEL/PUSH SET> dial button).

Loading of the file begins.

How to use scene file data

The content of setting data can be written to and read written data from scene file area on the internal memory of the camera. Six types of scene files can be registered. Use of this data allows you to quickly reproduce optimum setup states.

■ Factory settings

[F1:]: File that is suitable for standard shooting.

[F2:FLUO.]: The file suitable for shooting when the characteristics of fluorescent light should be considered (such as shooting indoors).

[F3:SPARK]: The file that sharpens the color hue and contrast and that has suitable resolution for SD shooting.

[F4:B-STR]: The file suitable for shooting when the tone level of darker areas are to be stretched (such as shooting at sunset).

[F5:CINE V]: The file suitable for shooting cinematic video that has shaper contrast.

[F6:CINE D]: The file suitable for shooting cinematic video that has wider dynamic range.



 $\cdot \text{ [SYSTEM MODE] does not change even if the scene file is changed. Set all items in the main menu} \rightarrow \text{[SYSTEM MODE]}.$



- 2 Select [INITIALIZE] in the main menu → [SCENE FILE] → [LOAD/SAVE/INITIALIZE] and press the control stick (or <SEL/PUSH SET> dial button).

The confirmation screen is displayed.

The selected scene file is restored to the factory settings.

Changing the scene file title

The file name is updated.

How to restore the scene file or menu setting status to the factory settings

All the scene files and menu settings of the camera can be collectively restored to the factory settings.



Saving to an SD memory card and loading saved data

Scene files and other setting values that you have set can be saved as a file, and up to 8 files can be saved on the SD memory card, and saved data can be loaded

- For scene files, the current setting values are saved in the camera automatically, and you can write the saved data to an SD memory card. When they are loaded from the SD memory card, the current setting values are overwritten as well as the data saved in the camera.
- All scene files [F1:] to [F6:] are overwritten.



Selection of external reference signal and generator lock setting

Locking the video signal to the external reference signal

The video signal output from the camera can be locked to the reference signal supplied from an external source.

The camera can receive external reference signals from the <GENLOCK IN/VIDEO OUT> terminal.

Generator-locking to the reference signal supplied from the <GENLOCK IN/VIDEO OUT> terminal

The HD-Y signal or a composite signal matching the system frame frequency is supplied to the <GENLOCK IN/VIDEO OUT> terminal. To enable the reference signal input to the <GENLOCK IN/VIDEO OUT> terminal, the <IN/OUT> switch needs to be set to <IN>. Select the output signal to lock to the input reference signal from the main menu \rightarrow [OTHER FUNCTIONS] \rightarrow [GL PHASE] (in 1080i, 1080P, and 720P only).

Adjust the horizontal phase of the reference signal and output signal in the main menu → [OTHER FUNCTIONS] → [H PHASE].



• The subcarrier of the composite signal of the camera is not locked to the subcarrier of the reference signal.

The camera provides time codes, user bits, and date and time (real time) data as time data, and they are recorded in the frame in sync with video. They are also recorded as data for clip metadata files.

Definition of time data

■ Time code

It can be switched between [REC RUN] and [FREE RUN] in the main menu → [RECORDING SETUP] → [TCG].

- [FREE RUN]: The time code always advances even when the power is turned off, and it can be handled in the same way as time. It can also be slaved to the time code input to the <TC IN/OUT> terminal.
- [REC RUN]: Can be regenerated and recorded into the time code of clips recorded to P2 cards as a continuous value.



- · In the following case, the values are not continuous.
- When deleting recorded clips
- When switching to 24PN and 30PN (25PN)
- When recording is interrupted due to a malfunction of [REC WARNING], etc. during recording.

User bits

Two types of user bits are built in.

- LTC UB: Recorded as LTC and output from the <TC IN/OUT> terminal. It is also output as LTC of the HD SDI signal.
- VITC UB: Recorded as VITC (recorded to VIDEO AUX area by DVCPRO). It is also output as VITC of the HD SDI signal.

LTC UB can select and record user set values, time, year/month/day, the same value as time codes, camera frame rate information, and input value of external signals from the <TC IN/OUT> terminal, etc.

VITC UB records the camera frame rate information.

The LTC UB value of the recording start time can be recorded on the user bits of the clip metadata.

■ Date/time (real time)

- By means of the internal clock, year, month, day, and time can be displayed on the viewfinder/LCD monitor and on the output image of the <GENLOCK IN/VIDEO OUT> terminal, etc.
- The internal clock is used for measuring the free run time code while the power is off and as time and year/month/day data of the user bits. It is also used as the reference for file generation times during clip recording, which determine the sorting order of thumbnails and the order of playback.
- It is also used to generate clip metadata and UMID (Unique Material Identifier).
 For details, refer to "Setting the date/time of the internal clock" (page 36).

 - Push it upward to increase the value of the digit to be set by one.
 - Push it downward to decrease the value of the digit to be set by one.
- 4 Press the control stick, enter the values of user bits, and exit the user bits settings screen.
- **5** Use the <COUNTER> button to display [UBG] and confirm that the set value is displayed.



• If you exit the user bits setting screen without pressing the control stick, the set values are disabled.

Retention of user bits in memory

User bit settings are automatically recorded and are retained even if the power is turned off.

Frame rate information recorded on user bits


Saving the frame rate values for the image information shot/saved according to the frame rate set in the main menu \rightarrow [SYSTEM MODE] to user bits allows you to use the editor (personal computer editing software).

Information is always saved in VITC UB.

In addition, selecting [FRAME RATE] in the main menu \rightarrow [RECORDING SETUP] \rightarrow [UBG MODE] saves the information in user bits (LTC UB) as well. The same value as in the frame rate information obtained from VITC UB playback is also output as LTC UB during playback of clips recorded in native format

Sets [DF] (Drop frame mode)/[NDF] (non-drop frame mode).

In 24PN, the camera always operates in [NDF].

• ITCG1

Sets [FREE RUN] (free run)/[REC RUN] (recording run).

- **2** Set to [TC PRESET] in the main menu \rightarrow [RECORDING SETUP].
- 3 Set the time code using the control stick.
 - Screen display
 - When pushed down to the right, the digit that has been to set (flashing) moves to the right.
 - When pushed down to the left, the digit that has been to set (flashing) moves to the left.
 - When pushed down toward the top, the value of the digit that has been to set (flashing) is raised by one.
 - When pushed down toward the bottom, the value of the digit that has been to set (flashing) is lowered by one.
- 4 Press the control stick, enter the values of the time code, and exit the time code settings screen.
- 5 Use the <COUNTER> button to display [TC] and confirm that the set value is displayed.

NOTE

- When using with 24P, the time code setting is adjusted in 5-frame units. When 24PN, adjusted in multiples of 4, and when 720/30PN and 720/25PN, adjusted to even numbers. Also, the time code cannot be set during recording.
- · If you exit the time code setting screen without pressing the control stick, the set values are disabled.
- When the <RESET> button is pressed while in the time code setting screen, the value is reset to 0.

Time code function during battery replacement

Even during battery replacement, the backup mechanism functions, allowing the time code generator to continue operating.

When each item of the system mode has been changed, the time code of free run may shift. Turn on the power again, check the time code, and reset it, if necessary.



When the power switch has been switched to <ON> → <OFF> → <ON>, the backup accuracy of the time code in the free run mode is approximately +2 frames

Time codes in variable frame rate

- In 24PN, recording is 24 frames, output is 30 frames, which matches 2:3 pull-down images.
- The advance rate of the recording and output time code matches real time only when the image frame rate is 24P. When 60P, recording advance rate is 60/24 times. In this case, the camera switches to [REC RUN] fixed operation and the time code value that is output when recording starts matches the recording time code.
- It is the same when shooting in modes other than 30P when in 30PN and shooting in modes other than 25P when in 25PN.

Externally locking the time code


The internal time code generator of the camera can be locked to an external generator. In addition, the time code generator of an external device can be locked to the internal time code generator of the camera.

Example of connections for external locking

As shown in the figure, connect both the reference video signal and the reference time code.

For details on reference signal and generator lock, refer to "Selection of external reference signal and generator lock setting" (page 100).


When locking onto an external signal





- To input or genlock input external time code, set the <IN/OUT> switch to <IN> and select [FREE RUN] in the main menu → [RECORDING SETUP] →
- You can input Y reference signals of HD and composite video signals as reference videos signals.
- When the system mode is 480i (576i) (SD), 1080P, and 720P, input the composite video signal.
- · When the system mode is 1080/23.98PsF, input the HD-Y signal.
- · When the system mode is 1080P and 720P, if you input the HD-Y signal, genlock will be applied to the image signal, but the time code may be shifted by one field.
- If the genlock input reference signal becomes disrupted, a normal recording cannot be performed and [TEMPORARY PAUSE IRREGULAR FRM SIG] flashes on the viewfinder and LCD monitor, then clips are divided. The synchronization with the time code is not also guaranteed. Recording will be resumed when the signal returns to normal. However, interval recording, one-shot recording, and loop recording are not resumed.

■ When two cameras are connected and one is used as a reference camera



NOTE

- Set the <TC IN/OUT> terminal to output or input with the <IN/OUT> switch.
- On all devices, set the main menu → [OUTPUT SEL] → [TC OUTPUT REF] to [RECORDING], and the main menu → [OTHER FUNCTIONS] → [GL PHASE] to [COMPOSITE].
- If you set [RECORDING] in the main menu → [OUTPUT SEL] → [TC OUTPUT REF], the two cameras will be able to record with the same time code
 in the image.
- · You cannot externally lock the composite signal subcarrier output from the <GENLOCK IN/VIDEO OUT> terminal of the camera.
- When the system mode is 1080/23.98PsF, the following usage is unavailable: connecting two cameras and use one as a reference camera, using the composite signal output from the <GENLOCK IN/VIDEO OUT> terminal.

External lock operation procedure

To externally lock the time code, follow the steps below.

- 1 Set [FREE RUN] in the main menu \rightarrow [RECORDING SETUP] \rightarrow [TCG].
- 2 Display TC with the <COUNTER> button.
- 3 Input a reference time code and reference video signal that are in a phase relationship (that conforms to time code specifications) to the <TC IN/OUT> terminal and the <GENLOCK IN/VIDEO OUT> terminal.

The built-in time code generator is locked to the reference time code. When approximately ten seconds has elapsed after locking, the external lock status will be held even if the reference time code from the external device is disconnected.

- When the input reference signal of generator lock is disrupted, recording cannot be performed normally. [TEMPORARY PAUSE IRREGULAR SIG] is displayed in the viewfinder screen, and the clip is divided. The continuity of the time code is not guaranteed. Recording resumes when the signal returns to normal. However, during loop recording, recording does not resume.
- When the time code is externally locked, the time code is instantaneously locked to the external time code, the same value as the value of the external time code is output to the counter display area. Do not set to the recording mode for several seconds until the sync generator has stabilized. Furthermore, lock the time code to the <TC IN/OUT> terminal signal.
- When using the camera with [ON] set in the main menu → [RECORDING SETUP] → [PRE REC], disrupted images or stopped time codes may
 be recorded if the time code is switched from recording run to free run immediately before recording or an external time code is input to be slavelocked to the <TC IN/OUT> terminal.
- If you execute the slave once, even if there is no longer <TC IN/OUT> terminal and <GENLOCK IN/VIDEO OUT> terminal input, the slave status is maintained. However, in the following cases, the slave status will be released.
- When [TC PRESET] is executed
- When the power is turned off
- When switching between [DF]/[NDF] in [DF MODE]
- When [TCG] is set to [REC RUN]
- When switching between [REC FORMAT] and [CAMERA MODE]

Setting of user bits when the time code is externally locked

To lock user bits to the input values from an external source, set [EXT] in the main menu \rightarrow [RECORDING SETUP] \rightarrow [UBG MODE]. Regardless of the setting of [REC RUN]/[FREE RUN], it is slaved to user bits values input to the <TC IN/OUT> terminal.

Canceling the external lock

Set [REC RUN] in the main menu \rightarrow [RECORDING SETUP] \rightarrow [TCG] after stopping supply of the external time code.

Cautions when switching the power supply from the battery to the AC adaptor while an external lock is active

To keep continuously on the power supply of the time code generator, connect the AC adaptor to the <DC IN 12V> terminal and then remove the battery pack. If the battery pack is removed first, there is no guarantee that the time code will stay externally locked.

External synchronization of the camera unit while an external lock is active


While an external lock is active, the genlock is activated on the camera unit by the reference video signal input to the <GENLOCK IN/VIDEO OUT> terminal.



- To externally lock multiple units with the camera as the master device, set to the same setting as on the camera. Note that in a system using a mixture
 of interlaced and progressive scanning, the continuity of the video and time codes is not guaranteed.
- When the external lock is applied to 24PN Native, be sure to input non-drop frame time code. External lock is not available in drop frame. Also, at the moment external lock is applied, the image may look corrupted. This is an operation to match the 5-frame cycle and is not a malfunction.

Supplying the time code externally

You can supply the output time codes to a VTR or other recording device from the camera by matching the camera images or the replayed images.



- **1** Set [VIDEO OUT] in the main menu \rightarrow [OUTPUT SEL] \rightarrow [TC OUTPUT REF].
- 2 Set to [HD SDI] or [COMPOSITE] depending on the video output supplied with the main menu → [OTHER FUNCTIONS] → [GL PHASE].
- $oldsymbol{3}$ Set [TCG/TCR] in the main menu ightarrow [OUTPUT SEL] ightarrow [TC OUT].



· If you set [TC OUTPUT REF] to [VIDEO OUT] in the main menu → [OUTPUT SEL], the input time code will be output to match the video output delay.

Connecting and setting the genlock and time code input/output

The relationship of the connecting and settings between the genlock and time code input/output is shown in the table. When the genlock input and the camera output phase match, \checkmark is displayed, and when they do not match, \times is displayed.

Setting and displaying the counter

If you display the counter using the <COUNTER> button, the counter value is displayed on the time code display of the viewfinder/LCD monitor. Counter value is displayed as "hour:minute:second.frame". The counter value is also displayed during playback.

You can set either of two types in the main menu \rightarrow [DISPLAY SETUP] \rightarrow [REC COUNTER].

[TOTAL]: The camera will continuously count until reset using the <RESET> button. Even if you replace the P2 card or turn off the power, the value will be maintained.

[CLIP]: Each time you start recording the counter value will clear and the count will start from 0. You can shoot always while checking the recording time of the clip you are currently shooting.



- If the <RESET> button is pressed while the counter value is displayed, the counter value is reset. It will start again from 0.
- The counter value is displayed by the frame unit.




Data including additional information such as images, audio, text memo, and metadata that are created from one shooting are saved as a clip. You can play back and edit clips with the camera.

Basic procedures

Preparation

- 1 Connect the battery or AC adaptor. (page 28)
- f 2 Set the power switch to <ON>. (page 34)
- 3 Open the LCD monitor.

Playback



- a: <THUMBNAIL> button
- b: **<▶/|||>** button
- c: Control stick
- 1 Press the <THUMBNAIL> button.

The thumbnail screen appears on the viewfinder screen.

2 Use the control stick to move the cursor over the clip to be played back.

3 Press the <▶/▮▮> button.

- Playback starts from the beginning of the clip indicated by the cursor.
- After playback of the clip indicated by the cursor ends, the clips will be played back in the order displayed on the thumbnail screen. The screen returns to the thumbnail screen when playback of the last clip ends.
- By changing the thumbnail display settings, you can set it to play clips on a specified slot or clips with an inserted text memo only.
- To change the playback order of clips, select clips in the order you want to play back. Select [SELECTED CLIPS] in the main menu → [CLIP] → [REPOSITION], to display the clips in selected order.
- During playback of clips, press the <◄◀> button to start 4x speed reverse playback, and the <▶►> button to start 4x speed fast playback. Press the <▶/▮▮> button to return to normal playback.
- During playback of clips, press the <▶/▮▮> button to pause the playback.

During a pause, press the <◄◄> button to pause the playback at the beginning of the clip. Press the <◄◄> button again to pause the playback at the beginning of the previous clip.

During a pause, press the $\$ button to pause the playback at the beginning of the next clip.

During a pause, press <+> of the <AUDIO MON/ADV> button to advance a frame, and press <-> to return one frame.

Pressing the <■> button during clip playback stops the playback and returns the display to the thumbnail screen.



- When playing clips, it is not necessary to select the clips (blue frames around the thumbnails).
- · Clips with clip numbers displayed in red cannot be played back. These are the clips in different video formats (such as 1080i, 480i).
- · When playback is stopped, the cursor moves to the position of the clip that was being played back, regardless of where the playback started.
- Press the <▶/III> button again to start playback from the beginning of the clip on which the cursor is placed. To play back from the point where the last playback has been stopped, select [RESUME] in the main menu → [CLIP] → [THUMBNAIL SETUP] → [PB POSITION].
- ullet Playing different compressed recording formats may cause audio and video distortions in between clips.
- Continuously playing clips of the same format but of different audio bit rates mutes the audio in between clips.
- You can play back clips from the text memo position by switching the thumbnail screen to the text memo display. (page 119)
- You can select the playback start position for playback from thumbnails in the main menu \rightarrow [CLIP] \rightarrow [THUMBNAIL SETUP] \rightarrow [PB POSITION].

Adjusting the audio

You can adjust the output volume from the built-in speaker and headphone terminal.

1 Press <+>/<-> of the <AUDIO MON/ADV> button.

Thumbnail operations

Thumbnail operation overview

A clip is a group of data created from one shooting session, which includes additional information such as images, audio, text memo, and metadata that are created from one shooting.


The following operations can be performed while viewing the clip thumbnails displayed on the LCD monitor.

- Play back, delete, copy, or restore clips.
- Adding or deleting a shot mark and text memo to the clip
- Copying part of a clip using the text memo
- Changing the thumbnail image using the text memo
- Format P2 cards and SD memory cards.
- Upload and edit clip metadata from the SD memory card.

Thumbnail screen

Press the <THUMBNAIL> button to display the thumbnail screen on the LCD monitor. Press the <THUMBNAIL> button again to return to the regular display. Also, when changing from the regular display to the thumbnail screen display, all clips will be displayed on the thumbnail screen. Press the <MENU> button on the thumbnail screen to enable thumbnail menu operations.









1 Status message

A message showing the process status is displayed. [UPDATING] and the icon 🔊 are displayed while the screen is being refreshed.

2 Status displays for card slot, storage device, and network connection

The status conditions of the P2 card, storage device, and network connection are displayed as follows:

NG (Yellow)	Displayed when there is at least one defective clip that may be restored in the inserted P2 card. (page 116)		
NG (Red)	Displayed when there is at least one defective clip that cannot be restored in the inserted P2 card. (page 116)

4 Simple properties display

Displays the various properties of the clip on which the pointer is positioned. You can select the items to display from the menu. For details, refer to "Properties" (page 124).



• If the maximum number of characters is exceeded, it will only display the maximum number of characters that can be displayed.

5 Thumbnail

Displays the thumbnail recorded in each clip. You can change this thumbnail using the [EXCH. THUMBNAIL] function. For details, refer to "Setting thumbnail screen display" (page 117).

6 Clip information display

By setting this item, displays either one of the time code [TC]/user bits [UB]/time of shooting [TIME]/date of shooting [DATE]/time and date of shooting [DATE TIME]/clip name [CLIP NAME]/user clip name [USER CLIP NAME]/card slot number [SLOT]/time code of thumbnail [THUMBNAIL TC] at the start of clip recording.

7 Recording mode

Displays the recording mode for the clip on which the cursor is positioned.

8 System format

Displays the format for the clip on which the cursor is positioned.

9 Duration

Displays the clip length (duration) at the cursor position and the current rough playback position against the clip length. Playback position display is enabled when [RESUME] is selected in the main menu \rightarrow [CLIP] \rightarrow [THUMBNAIL SETUP] \rightarrow [PB POSITION]. The approximate playback position is displayed when the playback start position is not at the beginning.

10 Number of selected clips and playback time display and bonding device information display

Displays the number of clips selected in the thumbnail screen and playback time of the clip when [THUMBNAIL INFO.] is selected in the main menu \rightarrow [CLIP] \rightarrow [THUMBNAIL SETUP] \rightarrow [INFORMATION SEL.]. For details, refer to "Displaying the number of clips and playback time" (page 118). Displays the signal strength and the remaining battery of the bonding device when [BONDING DEV. INFO.] is selected in the main menu \rightarrow [CLIP] \rightarrow [THUMBNAIL SETUP] \rightarrow [INFORMATION SEL.]. For details, refer to "Setting the bonding device information display" (page 118).

11 Clip number

Displays the number assigned to the clip on the P2 card, normally in the order from the earliest recording date and time. The clip numbers of clips that cannot be played are shown in red, and the unplayable indicator is also displayed. For details, refer to "Setting thumbnail screen display" (page 117).

12 M Shot mark indicator

Displayed for the clip of a thumbnail with a shot mark attached.

For details, refer to "Shot mark recording function" (page 76).

13 Plndicator for clips with proxy

Displayed for clips with proxy attached.

14 Text memo indicator

Displayed for clips with text memo data attached.

15 Edit copied clip indicator

Displayed for the edit copied clip.

16 W Wide clip indicator

Displayed for clips recorded with the 16:9 aspect ratio. However, it does not accompany clips in HD format.

17 Incomplete clip indicator

Displayed when clips are saved across multiple P2 cards and either of the P2 cards is not inserted in a card slot.

18 NG/NG Defective clip indicator, ? Unknown clip indicator

Displayed for defective clips, which may result from various causes such as turning off the power during recording.

Clips with yellow defective clip indicators can sometimes be restored.

For details, refer to "Restoring clips" (page 120).

Clips with red defective clip indicators cannot be restored and must be deleted. If the clip cannot be deleted, format the P2 card.

? is displayed for clips which differ in format from the P2 standard.

19 Rec during upload status indicator

Rec during upload status indicator shows the status of maximum 100 clips registered in the upload list as follows.

(Gray)	Displayed until upload starts.	
(Yellow)	Displayed during upload.	
(Green)	Displayed when upload is completed normally and registered in the upload list.	
(Red)	Displayed when transfer error occurred during upload and registered in the upload list.	

20 [P.only] indicator

This is displayed for a clip with only proxy not including the video data and audio data of main recording in the FTP explorer screen.

21 Thumbnail scroll bar

Indicates which part of the whole thumbnail is currently being viewed.

22 Battery charge level indicator

is indicated when the camera is running on the battery, and to is indicated when the camera is running on AC adaptor charging.

Selecting thumbnails

Multiple thumbnails can be randomly selected on the thumbnail screen.

Selecting clips

You can select multiple clips randomly.

- 1 Use the control stick to move the cursor over the desired clip.
- 2 Press the control stick.

A light blue frame and 🗸 are displayed on the clip where the cursor is put. This indicates that it is selected.

3 To select additional clips, repeat steps 1 to 2.

It is possible to display only the selected clips on the thumbnail screen for playback.

NOTE

- While holding down the <SHIFT> button, press the control stick upward/downward to move the cursor to the first/last clip.
- After selecting a clip, move the cursor to another clip and press the control stick while pressing the <SHIFT> button to select all clips from the
 previously selected clip to the one at cursor position.
- · As clips are selected, the number of selected clips displayed on the lower right corner of the screen changes according to the selection.

Deselecting clips

1 Move the cursor to the selected clip and press the control stick.

This deselects the clip.



· While holding down the <SHIFT> button, press the <EXIT> button to deselect all the clips at once.

Setting thumbnail screen display

You can customize the thumbnail screen according to usage.

Setting example for thumbnail screen ([INDICATOR])



1 Select [THUMBNAIL SETUP] in the main menu \rightarrow [CLIP].

The thumbnail setting items ([INDICATOR], [DATA DISPLAY], [THUMBNAIL SIZE], [PB POSITION], [PROPERTY DISP.], [THUMBNAIL INFO.], [TEXT MEMO IND]) are displayed. For details, refer to "Setting items that display properties" (page 117).

Setting thumbnails to be displayed

You can customize the types of clips displayed in the thumbnail screen.

- $\mbox{\bf 1} \mbox{ Select [REPOSITION] in the main menu} \rightarrow \mbox{[CLIP]}.$
- $oldsymbol{2}$ Use the control stick to move the cursor to the type of the clip you want to display.
- 3 Press the control stick.

Setting the thumbnail size

You can customize the thumbnail size.

- **1** Select [THUMBNAIL SIZE] in the main menu \rightarrow [CLIP] \rightarrow [THUMBNAIL SETUP].
- f 2 Use the control stick to move the cursor to the size of the thumbnail you want to display.
- 3 Press the control stick.

Setting the clip information display

You can customize the clip information display contents according to your preference.

- **1** Select [DATA DISPLAY] in the main menu \rightarrow [CLIP] \rightarrow [THUMBNAIL SETUP].
- $oldsymbol{2}$ Use the control stick to move the cursor on the item you want to set.
- 3 Press the control stick.

Setting items that display properties

You can set simple properties item displayed on the left of the thumbnail.

- · A maximum of six items can be displayed at the same time.
- · When six items are already selected, all unchecked items cannot be selected. You can change your item selection by unchecking selected items.

Displaying the number of clips and playback time

Sets the display of the number of selected clips, playback time of clip, etc.

- **1** Select [THUMBNAIL INFO.] in the main menu \rightarrow [CLIP] \rightarrow [THUMBNAIL SETUP] \rightarrow [INFORMATION SEL.].
- 2 Press the control stick.
- 3 Select the main menu \rightarrow [CLIP] \rightarrow [THUMBNAIL SETUP] \rightarrow [THUMBNAIL INFO.].
- 4 Use the control stick to move the cursor to the type of the information to display.

[NUM. OF CLIPS]: Displays the number of selected clips.

[DUR. OF SEL CLIPS]: Displays the total playback time of selected clips.

[TOTAL DURATION]: Displays the total playback time of the displayed clip.

5 Press the control stick.

Setting the bonding device information display

- 1 Select [BONDING DEV. INFO.] in the main menu \rightarrow [CLIP] \rightarrow [THUMBNAIL SETUP] \rightarrow [INFORMATION SEL.].
- 2 Press the control stick.



· This is not displayed when the information cannot be acquired from the bonding device.

Changing thumbnails

Replace thumbnails with images that include previously attached text memos while images are recorded or played back.

- ${f 2}$ Select [TEXT MEMO CLIPS] in the main menu ightarrow [CLIP] ightarrow [REPOSITION] and display the thumbnails of clips with text memos.
- 3 Move the cursor over the clip that you want to change the thumbnail and press the control stick, and then move the cursor to the text memo display on the lower row.
- **4** Select thumbnail to be replaced from the text memos, place the cursor on it, and select [EXCH. THUMBNAIL] in the main menu → [CLIP]. (Fig. 1)
- **5** Press the control stick, and on the confirmation screen displayed, select [YES] using the control stick. (Fig. 2) The menu closes and the thumbnail for the clip is replaced.



You can view the thumbnail position (number of frames from the top of the clip) from the [THUMBNAIL] item of the clip information display. Since thumbnails usually come from the top of the clip, 0 is displayed.

• Even if you change the thumbnail, playback from the thumbnail screen will still start from the beginning of the clip.

• The thumbnail image with the [!] mark may be displayed for clips of a format with a different number of lines and frequencies when displaying a text memo clip without displaying the thumbnail of the text memo position displayed at the bottom section.

Shot mark

Shot marks can be added to a clip thumbnail to distinguish the clip from others.

You must assign [SHOT MARK] to the USER button (USER1 to USER8) beforehand. For details, refer to "Assigning functions to the USER buttons" (page 43).

- 1 Use the control stick to move the cursor over the clip to which you want to add a shot mark.
- 2 Press the USER button to which [SHOT MARK] is assigned.
 - A shot mark is added to the thumbnail of the clip at the cursor position.
 - To delete a shot mark, place the cursor on the clip again and press the USER button to which [SHOT MARK] is assigned.



- · You can attach a shot mark during recording.
- Add shot marks after recording stops to attach the shot mark to the most recently recorded clip.
 For details, refer to "Shot mark recording function" (page 76).
- When adding a shot mark to or deleting the shot mark from a clip recorded across multiple P2 cards, do this with all these P2 cards inserted into card slots.

Text memo

You can add text memos during recording or playback. Text memos can be used to play clips at some point or break clips into chunks and copy the necessary portions.

Adding the text memo


You must assign [TEXT MEMO] to the USER button (USER1 to USER8) beforehand. For details, refer to "Assigning functions to the USER buttons" (page 43).


- 1 Press the USER button to which [TEXT MEMO] is assigned while recording, playback, thumbnails.
 - Pressing this button while recording or playing inserts a text memo at the instance when the button was pressed. At that instance, [TEXT MEMO] (when successful) or [TEXT MEMO INVALID] (when unsuccessful) is displayed.
 - Pressing this button while the thumbnail screen is displayed inserts a text memo in the clip thumbnail (normally at the beginning) position.



- Up to 100 text memos can be recorded to a single clip.
- · Playback may stop for a moment when the USER button to which [TEXT MEMO] is assigned is pressed. This is not a malfunction.
- You can hide the text memo indicator of a clip to which a text memo with card serial number is added. Set this in the main menu → [CLIP] → [THUMBNAIL SETUP] → [TEXT MEMO IND]. (page 146)

1 Select [TEXT MEMO CLIPS] in the main menu \rightarrow [CLIP] \rightarrow [REPOSITION].

The thumbnails of the clips with text memos added are displayed in the upper section of the LCD monitor. The lower section of the LCD monitor shows information on the text memo on the clip selected by the cursor. (Fig. 1)

2 Move the cursor over the clip that contains the text memo to be played back and press the control stick.

The cursor moves to the lower section of the LCD monitor. (Fig. 2)

3 With the cursor located in the lower section, press the control stick to the left/right to move the cursor to the text memo number you want to play back and press the <▶/▮ > button.

- Playback starts from the time code position of the text memo where the cursor is located.
- If the < >> button is pressed during playback or the playback has finished at the end of the clip, the thumbnail screen appears again and the cursor returns to the thumbnail of the text memo where the playback started.
- While holding down the <SHIFT> button, press the control stick upward/downward to move the cursor to the first/last text memo.
- Press the <EXIT> button to return the cursor to the upper section of the thumbnail screen.

NOTE NOTE

- · Pressing the REC button while the text memo screen is displayed does not start recording.
- For clips in AVC-Intra and AVC-LongG formats with different settings (different system frequencies) in the main menu → [SYSTEM MODE], the
 thumbnail of the text position may not be displayed and a thumbnail image with the [!] mark may be displayed.

Deleting text memos

- 1 Perform steps 1 to 2 in "Playing back from the text memo position" (page 119) to select the desired text memo in a clip.
- 2 Move the cursor over the text memo to be deleted and press the control stick.
- $oldsymbol{3}$ Select [DELETE] in the main menu ightarrow [CLIP] and press the control stick.
- 4 Select [YES] using the control stick.

This deletes the text memo.

Using a text memo to divide a clip and copy the necessary portion

- 1 Perform steps 1 to 2 in "Playing back from the text memo position" (page 119) to select the desired text memo in a clip.
- 2 Move the cursor over the text memo to be copied and press the control stick.

You can select multiple text memos.

- $\textbf{3} \ \, \textbf{Select [COPY] in the main menu} \rightarrow \textbf{[CLIP]}.$
- 4 Select the copy target slot using the control stick and select [YES].
 - Copying starts.
 - The portion between the selected text memo and the next one is copied. If no text memo is found after the selected one, then the part after the selected text memo to the end of the clip is copied.
 - If multiple text memos are selected, the selected sections are copied.
 - While the clip is being copied, the progress of the copy process and cancelation will be displayed. To discontinue the copy process, press the control stick. When the [YES]/[NO] confirmation screen is displayed, use the control stick to select [YES].



• In clip division and copying using the text memo, the area copied may be automatically modified and copied depending on the recording method of the clip.

Deleting clips

- 1 Use the control stick to move the cursor over the clip to be deleted, and press the control stick to select the clip.
- $\boldsymbol{2}$ Select [DELETE] in the main menu \rightarrow [CLIP] and press the control stick.
- 3 Select [YES] using the control stick.

The clip is deleted. All selected clips (in blue-green frames) are deleted by this operation.



• To interrupt the deletion process, press the <SHIFT> button + <EXIT> button or press the control stick to cancel the operation. Once a clip is deleted halfway, it cannot be restored even if the deletion process is aborted.

Restoring clips

You can restore clips that were made defective as a result of sudden power-down during recording or removal of the P2 card being accessed.

- 1 Use the control stick to move the cursor over the clip to be restored (defective clips are indicated by defective clip marks) and press the control stick to select the clip.
- 2 Select [REPAIR] in the main menu \rightarrow [CLIP] and press the control stick.
- 3 Select [YES] using the control stick.

This restores the clip.



- To find defective clips, set the main menu → [CLIP] → [REPOSITION] to [NG CLIPS]. Only defective clips are displayed. For details, refer to "Setting thumbnails to be displayed" (page 117).
- You can restore clips with yellow defective clip indicators. Delete clips with red defective clip indicators. If the clips cannot be deleted, format the P2 card.

During restoration of the clips, however, the defective clip indicator may change from yellow to red, and result in the inability to restore the clips.

· When defective clips containing proxy data are restored, proxy data will be deleted.

Reconnecting incomplete clips

Incomplete clips may be generated when clips recorded on multiple P2 cards (connected clips) are separately copied from each card. The reconnection function generates one clip (the original, connected clip) from incomplete clips.

1 Use the control stick to select incomplete clips to be linked.

Usually, thumbnails of incomplete clips (clips with I indication) are displayed next to each other.

- f 2 Select [RE-CONNECT] in the main menu ightarrow [CLIP] and press the control stick.
- 3 Select [YES] using the control stick.

This reconnects incomplete clips.



Incomplete clip indicators will remain displayed when only some clips are reconnected, unless all the constituent clips of the original clip are reconnected.

Copying clips

Selected clips can be copied to a P2 card or a connected USB storage device in the desired slot.

- 1 Use the control stick to move the cursor over the clip to be copied, and press the control stick to select the clip.
- ${f 2}$ Move the cursor to the copy target from the [COPY] list in the main menu ightarrow [CLIP] and press the control stick.
 - When multiple clips are selected, the number of selected clips is displayed after pressing the control stick.
 - If the copy destination is a storage device, select the copy destination properties.
- f 3 Move the cursor to [YES] in the confirmation message and press the control stick.

This starts copying of the clip.

4 When the completion message appears, press the control stick.



- Turning off the power or inserting/removing a card during copying may damage the P2 card. If you accidentally make these mistakes, it can result in defective clips. After deleting the defective clips redo copying.
- · Copying is not performed when the following error messages are displayed.
- [LACK OF CAPACITY!]

Copying could not be performed because the recording capacity of the copy destination is insufficient.

- [UNKNOWN CONTENTS FORMAT!]
- Copying could not be performed because a defective clip is selected.
- [NO COPY TO SAME CARD!]
- Copying could not be performed because you are attempting to copy to the same card.
- [TOO MANY CLIPS!]
 - Copying could not be performed because there are too many clips selected.
- If the copying is performed while a text memo is selected in the lower part of the text memo, the section between the selected text memo position and the next text memo will be copied. If no text memo is found after the selected one, then the part after the selected text memo to the end of the clip is copied. For details, refer to "Using a text memo to divide a clip and copy the necessary portion" (page 120).
- To interrupt copying, press the <SHIFT> button + <EXIT> button, or the control stick to cancel the operation. The clip being copied will be deleted from the copy destination.
- When identical clips (same [GLOBAL CLIP ID]) exist on the destination, [OVERWRITE?] is displayed. Select [YES] when overwriting the clip, and select [NO] when not overwriting the clip.

Setting clip metadata

Information such as the name of the person who shot the video, the name of the reporter, the shooting location, or text memos can be loaded from an SD memory card, and can be recorded as clip metadata.

Clip metadata items

Clip metadata includes the following items. Underlined items can be set by loading the metadata upload file on the SD memory card. Other items are set automatically during shooting. Using the latest update version of P2 Viewer Plus, metadata upload files can be written to SD memory cards using a computer. Download and install the latest version of P2 Viewer Plus from the following website.

· Files which were not edited using P2 Viewer Plus are displayed as [UNKNOWN DATA!] and may not be readable.

[GLOBAL CLIP ID]	Displays the global clip ID that shows the shooting status of the clip.
[USER CLIP NAME]	Displays the clip name set by the user.*1
[VIDEO]	Displays [FRAME RATE] (frame rate of the clip), [PULL DOWN] (pull-down format), and [ASPECT RATIO].
[AUDIO]	Displays [SAMPLING RATE] (sampling frequency of recorded audio) and [BITS PER SAMPLE] (quantizing bits for recorded audio).
[ACCESS]	Displays [CREATOR] (person who recorded the clip), [CREATION DATE] (date when the clip was recorded), [LAST UPDATE DATE] (date of the latest update of the clip), and [LAST UPDATE PERSON] (person who made the latest update of the clip).

[DEVICE]	Displays [MANUFACTURER] (name of the device manufacturer), [SERIAL NO.] (serial number of the device), and [MODEL NAME] (model name of the device).
[SHOOT]	Displays [SHOOTER] (name of the person who shot the video), [START DATE] (start date of shooting), [END DATE] (end date of shooting), and [LOCATION]/[ALTITUDE]/[LONGITUDE]/[LATITUDE]/[SOURCE]/[PLACE NAME] (altitude, longitude, latitude, and source of the information and name of the location).
[SCENARIO]	Displays [PROGRAM NAME], [SCENE NO.], and [TAKE NO.].
[NEWS]	Displays [REPORTER] (name of the reporter), [PURPOSE] (purpose of shooting), and [OBJECT] (object of shooting).
[MEMO]*2	Displays [NO.] (the number of the text memo), [OFFSET] (location of the frame where the text memo is added), [PERSON] (person who recorded the text memo added to the clip), and [TEXT] (content of the text memo).
[THUMBNAIL]	Displays the location of the frame (frame offset) and the size (height and width) of the image selected as the thumbnail image.
[PROXY]	Displays information such as proxy format when proxy is added.

- *1 You can select the [USER CLIP NAME] recording method. For details, refer to "Selecting the [USER CLIP NAME] recording method" (page 123).
- *2 When entering [MEMO], make sure to enter [TEXT]. It is not possible to record only [PERSON] (the person inputting the memo), or [OFFSET] (the recording position).

Loading clip metadata (metadata upload)

- 1 Insert the SD memory card that contains the clip metadata (metadata upload file).
- 2 Select [LOAD] in the main menu → [RECORDING SETUP] → [REC META DATA] and press the control stick.

 The metadata name of the metadata upload file on the SD memory card is displayed. (Fig. 1)
- 3 Use the control stick to select the file to be loaded, and select [YES].
 - Upload starts.
 - Uploaded metadata is retained even if the power is turned off.
 - For confirmation of uploaded data, refer to "Checking and modifying uploaded metadata" (page 122).



• While displaying metadata names, press the control stick to the right to switch to file name display. (Fig. 2) Press the control stick to the left to return to metadata name display.

Checking and modifying uploaded metadata

Details of metadata uploaded from an SD memory card can be checked.

- 1 Select [PROPERTY] in the main menu → [RECORDING SETUP] → [REC META DATA]. The metadata list is displayed.
- 2 Use the control stick to move the cursor over the item to be checked, and press the control stick. (Fig. 1)
 Settings of the uploaded metadata can be checked.
- 3 While checking the settings for the metadata, use the control stick to move the cursor over the item that you want to change the setting, and press the control stick.
 - A software keyboard screen is displayed, allowing you to modify the setting. (Fig. 2)

• While holding down the <SHIFT> button, press the control stick upward/downward to move the cursor to the first/last of the setting items.

Setting whether to record the uploaded metadata

Set [ON]/[OFF] in the main menu → [RECORDING SETUP] → [REC META DATA] → [RECORD]. [OFF] is set in the factory settings.

Selecting the [USER CLIP NAME] recording method

Select the [USER CLIP NAME] recording method from the two of [TYPE1] and [TYPE2] in the main menu \rightarrow [RECORDING SETUP] \rightarrow [REC META DATA] \rightarrow [USER CLIP NAME].



^{*} The [COUNT] value is indicated as a four-digit number.

The [COUNT] value is incremented each time a new clip is generated, if the clip metadata has been loaded and [TYPE2] has been selected as the recording method.

The [COUNT] value can be reset using the following method.

When you select [PROPERTY] in the main menu \rightarrow [RECORDING SETUP] \rightarrow [REC META DATA] and then select [USER CLIP NAME], the following screen is displayed. Move the cursor over [COUNT RESET], and press the control stick to reset the [COUNT] value to 1.



Selecting the [CARD SERIAL] recording

When [ON] is selected in main menu \rightarrow [RECORDING SETUP] \rightarrow [REC META DATA] \rightarrow [CARD SERIAL], the function that records the serial number of the P2 card as metadata (text memo without offset) is enabled.

Initializing the metadata setting

Select [INITIALIZE] in the main menu \rightarrow [RECORDING SETUP] \rightarrow [REC META DATA] and press the control stick. Select [YES] when the confirmation screen is displayed.

The settings in the main menu \rightarrow [RECORDING SETUP] \rightarrow [REC META DATA] and later items, including loaded metadata, are initialized.

Setting metadata display language

Set the language when displaying metadata. Select [LANGUAGE] in the main menu \rightarrow [RECORDING SETUP] \rightarrow [REC META DATA], then select the display language, and press the control stick.

When you select [NTSC (J)] as a region of use, you can choose either [ENGLISH] or [JAPANESE].



- · Characters that cannot be displayed in English are not displayed properly but are displayed as "*".
- · Only alphanumeric characters can be entered.

Formatting a P2 card

1 Select [FORMAT] in the main menu \rightarrow [CLIP].

- Select the slot number where the P2 card to be formatted is inserted, and press the control stick.
- Select [EXIT] when you do not wish to format the card.

2 Select [YES] using the control stick.

The selected P2 card is formatted.



- · Data deleted as a result of formatting cannot be restored. Always check the data before formatting.
- If the CPS password has been set, the confirmation message whether to select the encrypted format [CPS(ENCRYPT)] or normal format [NORMAL] is displayed when selecting a slot. When the encrypted format is selected, the microP2 memory card is encrypted.

Formatting SD memory cards

SD memory cards can also be formatted in the thumbnail screen. With an SD memory card inserted into the camera, perform the following operation.

$\textbf{1} \ \, \textbf{Select [FORMAT] in the main menu} \rightarrow \textbf{[CLIP]}.$

- Select [SD CARD] and press the control stick.
- Select [EXIT] when you do not wish to format the card.

2 Select [YES] using the control stick.

The SD memory card is formatted.



- SD memory cards can also be formatted in the main menu → [CARD FUNCTIONS] → [FORMAT SD CARD].
 For details, refer to "Formatting SD memory cards" (page 96).
- · Data deleted as a result of formatting cannot be restored. Always check the data before formatting.

Properties


Clip properties and P2 card status are displayed.

It is possible to edit and rewrite the recorded clip metadata while clip properties are displayed.

Clip properties

Select [CLIP PROPERTY] in the main menu \rightarrow [CLIP] \rightarrow [PROPERTY].





1 Clip information

Displays the indicators added to the clip and the number of added text memos.

The mark will be displayed if the P2 card in which the clip is recorded is write-protected.

2 Clip number



· For clips that cannot be played back, the number is displayed in red.

3 Thumbnail

4 Clip information

Displays detailed information about the clip.

[CLIP NAME]	Displays clip names.	
[START TC]	Displays the time code value at the start of the recording.	
[START UB]	Displays the user bit value at the start of the recording.	
[DATE]	Displays the date of the recording.	
[TIME]	Displays the time at the start of recording.	
[DURATION]	Displays the time length of the clip.	
[V_FORMAT]	Displays the recording format of the clip.	
[FRAME RATE]	Displays the frame rate for playback.	
[REC RATE]	Displays the recording frame rate. For the clips recorded with variable frame rate compatible devices, the frame rate at the time of shooting is displayed.

Modifying recorded clip metadata



- 1 Display the metadata details window for the clip to be modified on the clip properties screen.
- 2 Place the cursor on the item to be modified using the control stick. (Fig. 1)

The items of the metadata with the gray buttons in background can be modified.

3 Press the control stick.

Information about keyboard operation is the same as "Checking and modifying uploaded metadata" (page 122).

- The input window (soft keyboard) for modifying metadata is displayed. (Fig. 2)
- Enter characters with the keyboard to modify the metadata.

4 Press the [OK] button on the keyboard.

The modified metadata is written on the clip and the screen returns to the metadata details window.



- To delete each item in [LOCATION] (shooting location data) of [SHOOT], the item cannot be deleted alone. By setting the [ALTITUDE] item to empty, other [LONGITUDE] and [LATITUDE] items are collectively deleted.
- Metadata of clips with [] (incomplete clip indicator) cannot be repaired. Repair of metadata of clips recorded across multiple P2 cards must be
 performed after inserting all of the P2 cards.
- · Any [MEMO] with 101 characters or more cannot be modified.

Displaying P2 card status

■ P2 card status display settings

You can select the P2 card status display from either remaining capacity or used capacity of the P2 card.

1 Press the <THUMBNAIL> button.

The thumbnail screen appears on the viewfinder screen.

2 Select [REMAIN] (remaining capacity) or [USED] (used capacity) in the main menu → [CLIP] → [PROPERTY] → [REMAIN SETUP]. (Fig. 1)


P2 card status display items

[REMAIN]	Displays remaining capacity on the P2 card as the P2 card status display. (Factory setting)
[USED]	Displays used memory capacity on the P2 card as the P2 card status display.

Contents of P2 card status display settings

Select [CARD STATUS] in the main menu \rightarrow [CLIP] \rightarrow [PROPERTY].



1 Write-protected mark

The mark appears when the P2 card is write-protected.

2 P2 card status (remaining capacity)

The remaining memory capacity of the P2 card is shown as a bar graph and percentage. The bar graph indicator moves to the left as the remaining capacity decreases.

The following displays may also appear, depending on the card status.

[FORMAT ERROR!]	An unformatted P2 card is inserted.	
[NOT SUPPORTED!]	unsupported card is inserted.	
[NO CARD] No P2 card is inserted.		
[AUTH NG CARD] Indicates that the card is a microP2 memory card which cannot authenticate a CPS password.		

Use the control stick to place the cursor on the P2 card where data to be accessed is saved and press the control stick to display detailed information on the P2 card. Specific information such as the serial number can be checked. (Fig. 1)

When the maximum number of clips that can be recorded in the P2 card has been reached, [OVER MAX NUMBER CLIPS] is displayed in the P2 card detailed information showing that the upper limit has been reached.

3 Warning card mark

When P2 cards are the following status, the mark is displayed.

[RUN DOWN CARD]	The maximum number of overwrites on the P2 card has been exceeded.
[DIR ENTRY NG]	The directory structure on the P2 card is not supported.

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The warning can be checked on the P2 card detailed information in "P2 card status (remaining capacity)" (page 126).

4 Total slot memory remaining capacity (or used capacity)

This displays the total remaining memory capacity (or used capacity) of the three slots.

The available space of a write-protected P2 card is not included in the total available space.

5 P2 card remaining capacity (or used capacity) / total capacity

This displays the remaining capacity (or used capacity) / total capacity of the P2 card. Since only the figures in minutes are displayed, the remaining memory capacity (or used capacity) for each P2 card may not match the total capacity.

Setting CPS password

To set a CPS password, either load the password from the SD memory card or use the menu of the camera to enter the password. Only one CPS password can be set on the camera. Loading the CPS password again overwrites the previously saved password.

Loading CPS password from SD memory card

1 Download and install the latest P2 Viewer Plus into a computer.

2 With P2 Viewer Plus, generate a CPS password and write it to the SD memory card.

3 Load the CPS password file.

- 1) Start the camera, and insert the SD memory card into the SD card slot.
- Open the thumbnail screen and select [LOAD] in the main menu → [CLIP] → [PROPERTY] → [CPS PASSWORD].
 The password file list is displayed.
- 3) Select the file to be used and press the control stick.
 - When loading of the CPS password has succeeded, the message [LOADING PASSWORD COMPLETED!] is displayed.
 - When loading of the CPS password has failed, a warning message is displayed. For an explanation of warnings, refer to "Warning system" (page 205).



The CPS password file generated on the SD memory card is encrypted. If it is no longer used, format the SD memory card for security risk management.

Setting CPS password using the menu of the camera

 $\textbf{1} \hspace{0.1cm} \textbf{Open the thumbnail screen and select [SET] in the main menu} \rightarrow \textbf{[CLIP]} \rightarrow \textbf{[PROPERTY]} \rightarrow \textbf{[CPS PASSWORD]}.$

The software keyboard to enter the CPS password is displayed.

2 Enter the CPS password with the keyboard.

Enter [PASSWORD] and [RETRY PASSWORD] for verification, and select [OK] to set the CPS password.

- When entry of the CPS password has succeeded, the message [SETTING PASSWORD COMPLETED!] is displayed.
- When entry of the CPS password has failed, the warning message is displayed. For warnings description, refer to "During thumbnail and menu operation" (page 206).



- · Up to 16 characters can be input.
- · The entered password cannot be displayed on the device. Do not forget the password.

Deleting CPS password

When the CPS function is no longer used, delete the CPS password.

1 Open the thumbnail screen and select [DELETE] in the main menu → [CLIP] → [PROPERTY] → [CPS PASSWORD]. [DELETING PASSWORD COMPLETED!] is displayed and the CPS password is deleted.



· When the CPS password is deleted, automatic authentication of the encrypted microP2 memory card and encryption format function are disabled.

Manual CPS authentication

An encrypted microP2 memory card is authenticated on the camera automatically, and can be used only if the authentication has succeeded.

Authentication fails if the CPS password set to device and the CPS password set to microP2 memory card differ. To temporarily use a microP2 memory card whose authentication has failed, manually enter the CPS password authorized for the microP2 memory card in accordance with the following procedures. If the code matches, you can use the card.

1 Confirm that authentication has failed.

1) Open the thumbnail screen and select [CARD STATUS] in the main menu \rightarrow [CLIP] \rightarrow [PROPERTY].

For the card whose authentication has failed, the slot number frame at the top right of the screen turns red, and [AUTH NG CARD] is displayed on the remaining capacity bar. Select the card by pushing the control stick upward/downward.

2 Perform manual authentication.

- On the card status screen, select [AUTHENTICATE] in the main menu → [CLIP].
 The software keyboard to enter the CPS password is displayed.
- 2) Enter the password set on the microP2 memory card and select [OK].
 - When entry of the CPS password has succeeded, the message [AUTHENTICATED SUCCESSFULLY!] is displayed.
 - When entry of the CPS password has failed, the warning message (page 206) is displayed.

NOTE NOTE

- · Manual authentication is valid temporarily. If the target microP2 card is removed or power is turned off, the CPS password set manually is disabled.
- Visit the following website for conditions where manual authentication is valid. https://pro-av.panasonic.net/
- The encrypted microP2 memory card is not recognized on the SD card slot in a computer.
- If the card is unable to be recognized, authenticate with the correct password, or format the card and use it as recording media, or remove it from the camera. Do not perform any operation other than manual authentication and formatting with the failed card inserted.

SD memory card status display

The status display enables confirmation of the SD memory card format condition, available memory space, etc.



Select [SD CARD] in the main menu \rightarrow [CLIP] \rightarrow [PROPERTY]. The same information can be displayed from the main menu \rightarrow [CARD FUNCTIONS] \rightarrow [SD CARD PROPERTY].


You can change camera settings using the setting menu according to the shooting scene and recording details.

The menu is divided into the main menu, submenu, and setting item menu.

Set data are written and saved in the internal memory of the camera.

Menu items can be selected by control stick operation or the <SEL/PUSH SET> dial button operation.

This section describes main menu operations. Main menu operation is the same as the other menus except when opening the menu screen.

- Selecting menu item using control stick
- 1 Press and hold the <MENU> button for three seconds or more when not recording.
 - The main menu screen is displayed in the viewfinder and on the LCD monitor.
- 2 Press the control stick upward/downward to place the cursor on the desired menu item. (Fig. 1)
 - The cursor moves up/down by pushing the control stick upward/downward.
 - If there is a menu in the next level, [▶] is displayed in the menu items.
 Pressing the control stick to the right or pressing the control stick opens the lower-level menus. (Fig. 2)
 - Pressing the control stick to the left or pressing the <EXIT> button returns the upper level of menu.


This chapter describes the screen displayed on the viewfinder or LCD monitor.

Screen status display

In addition to video, the viewfinder and LCD monitor display messages that indicate the camera settings and operation status, a center marker, safety zone marker, zebra patterns, and other information.

Configuration of status display on screen


The screen displayed in normal status is displayed as shown below.




Selecting display items on screen

To select display items on the viewfinder or LCD monitor screen, switch [ON]/[OFF] or switch the type of the respective item in the main menu \rightarrow [DISPLAY SETUP].

1 Time code display

Every press of the <COUNTER> button switches to the next data (or no display).

• Counter: Counter value

• [CLIP]: Clip counter value (recording mode only)

Clip counter value for each recording

Displayed when [CLIP] is set in the main menu \rightarrow [DISPLAY SETUP] \rightarrow [REC COUNTER].

• [TCG]: Time code value

When operating in drop frame mode, the ":" (colon) mark between the second and frame changes to "." (dot).

During playback, [TCR] is displayed.

• [UBG]: User bits value

During playback, [UBR] is displayed.

• [VUBG]: User bits value of VITC

During playback, [VUBR] is displayed.



- For [TCG] and [UBG], if they are locked to the input signal from the <TC IN/OUT> terminal, [TCG] and [UBG] are displayed in white letters with outlines.
- The time code during playback with 24PN is displayed converted into 30 frames.

2 Shooting/recording and playback frame rate display

For variable frame rate recording, the number of frames for shooting and the number of frames for recording/playback are displayed.

Example) 60:24PN (variable frame rate in 60P shooting, 24PN recording)

For playback, 2:3 pull-down is performed to make the video 24P over 60P, and playback in 24/60 times speed is indicated.

For standard recording, only the shooting frame rate is displayed.

3 Proxy information display

Displays the proxy recording information.

- [PROXY P2 (P2&SD)]: Displayed when proxy recording is started.
- [PROXY ERR]: Displayed when there is an error in proxy recording.

4 SD memory card status display

- [WP]: Write protected
- [END]: No remaining free space
- [WR ERR]: Write error

8 Streaming mode setting status display

Displays the setting status of the streaming function.

- [STREAM]: Displayed when the streaming function is set and the camera can be operated normally.
- [STRM EIR R]: Displayed when there is an error and the camera cannot be operated normally. To restore, turn off the power once and turn on the power again.

9 Network mode status display

Displays the status of the network function.

Displayed only when the <DISP/MODE CHK> switch is pushed towards the <CHK> side.

- [WLAN]: When the wireless LAN is connected (link state)
- [WLAN]]: When the wireless LAN is not connected (unlinked state)
- [WLANER R]: When there is a problem with the wireless LAN connection

- [LAN]: When the wired LAN is connected (link state)

- No display: When the network function is disabled

10 Remote control display in an IP connection

13 Time stamp recording display

Displays [R] when time stamp recording is set.

14 Date and time display

The display order is determined by the area setting.

[NTSC]: "mmm dd yyyy hh:mm:ss"

[NTSC (J)]: "yyyy mmm dd hh:mm:ss"

[PAL]: "dd mmm vvvv hh:mm:ss"

- mmm: Month (JAN (January), FEB (February), MAR (March), APR (April), MAY (May), JUN (June), JUL (July), AUG (August), SEP (September),
 OCT (October), NOV (November), DEC (December))
- dd: Date
- yyyy: Year (2000 to 2037)

15 Audio level meter display

Switches between level meter display and audio output channels 1/2 and 3/4 while holding down the USER button where [AUDIO MON SEL] is assigned.

16 Audio recording not possible display

Displayed when audio recording is not possible during variable frame rate mode native recording, interval recording, or one shot recording.

17 Digital zoom display

Displays the digital zoom ratio.

- [D2×]: two times
- [D5×]: five times
- [D10×]: ten times

18 Y GET brightness display

In the Y GET mode, the image level in the frame displayed near the center of the screen is displayed as 0% to 109%.

19 ND filter display

Displays the selected ND filter.

20 Shutter speed display

Displays the shutter speed. When synchro scan is performed, the display shows the content set in the main menu \rightarrow [SCENE FILE] \rightarrow [SYNC SCAN TYPE] (time (minutes) or open angle image).

21 <WHITE BAL> switch position display

Displays the position currently selected. Also, the white balance operation is indicated when the automatic white balance is preset. In auto tracking white balance (white balance with automatic tracking) mode, [ATW] is indicated, and when auto tracking white balance mode is locked, [LOCK] is indicated.

22 Auto iris control display

- [STD]: Standard auto iris control
- [SPOT]: Auto iris control for spotlighting
- [BACK]: Auto iris control for the backlight compensation

23 Gain display

Displays the gain value of the image amplifier configured.

24 Iris display

Displays the F value.

25 Zoom position display

Displays the zoom position with [Z000] (maximum wide angle) to [Z999] (maximum telephoto).

Change the unit to millimeters in the main menu \rightarrow [DISPLAY SETUP] \rightarrow [ZOOM/FOCUS].



· When the USER button where [FAST ZOOM] is assigned is pressed to switch the status, [Z] is displayed in white letter with outline.

26 Focus control information display

Displays the focus control information with [99] to [00]. [AF] is indicated for auto focus, and [MF] is indicated for manual focus. Also, when [MF ASSIST] is set to [ON] in the main menu \rightarrow [SW MODE] while in manual focus mode, [MA] is indicated.

[95] (distance to the subject: infinity) to [00] (distance to the subject: approx. 5 cm)

Depending on the zoom position, the subject may not be within the macro range.

Also, depending on the zoom position, the lowest value of the macro range may vary. The display unit can be changed to feet or meters from the main menu \rightarrow [DISPLAY SETUP] \rightarrow [ZOOM/FOCUS].

While macro shooting is performed, [AF] or [MF] will be displayed in black and white reversal.

27 Macro display

Displayed when you have enabled the macro focus function using the <MACRO> button.

28 Recommended ND filter display

Displays the ND filter recommended for the current shooting conditions.

29 Camera warning, notification display area (pages 205, 162)

30 Area frame display

Displayed when the control stick is pressed when the function is assigned in the main menu \rightarrow [SW MODE] \rightarrow [AREA MODE].

31 Area display

Displayed when in area mode.

32 Flash band compensation function display

Displayed when the flash band compensation function is activated.

33 Dynamic range stretcher function display

Displayed when the dynamic range stretcher function is working.

34 Scene file name display

Indicates the scene file name [F1:] to [F6:].

35 Image stabilization display

Displayed when the <OIS> button is pressed and the image stabilizer mode has been set.

36 Battery charge level indicator

As the battery level decreases, the indication changes $(\begin{tabular}{c} \blacksquare \begin{tabular}{c} \blacksquare \begin{tabular$

The battery charge level may not be indicated correctly in a place where the temperature is extremely low or high, or when the camera has not been used for a long period of time. To display the remaining battery level correctly, fully charge the battery, use the camera until the battery runs out, and then charge again. (Even after performing the procedure, the remaining battery may not be indicated correctly if the battery is used under extremely low or high temperature for a long period of time or if the battery has been repeatedly recharged.)

Note that the time in the battery charge level indicator is an approximate estimate as it changes according to the conditions of use.

37 P2 card remaining free space

- 1: This is the slot No. This is displayed in black and white inversion when the slot No. is recording destination. It flashes while the card is being recognized.
- [***min]: Displays the remaining space on the media in each slot. During a near end, it flashes.
- (No display): Not displayed when a card is not inserted.
- [END]: Displayed when there is no space remaining on each card.

41 One clip recording mode status display

- [1-CLIP]: The status where a new clip is to be recorded in one-clip recording
- [1*CLIP]: The status where recording can be performed by combining to the previous clip in one-clip recording

42 Rec during upload status and streaming distribution status display

Displays the status of rec during upload.

• [3]: Displayed when the rec during upload function is enabled.

The display will blink when recording is started immediately after the power is turned on or the P2 card is inserted, and the upload will not be executed until the recording is stopped.

- [Signature]: Displayed from when transfer error occurred during upload until when the next upload starts.

Displays the streaming status.


Chapter 8 Connecting to External Devices

This chapter describes the external devices that can be connected to the camera.

Connecting with headphones, remote control, or TV/monitor

Headphones

Headphones (optional) can be connected to the headphone terminal (3.5 mm stereo mini jack).






· When headphones are connected, audio is not output from the speaker.

Remote control

Remote control (optional) can be connected to the <CAM REMOTE> terminals (<FOCUS IRIS>, <ZOOM S/S>).

When the remote control is connected to the <FOCUS IRIS> terminal (3.5 mm mini jack), you can remotely control the focus and iris operations. When the remote control is connected to the <ZOOM S/S> terminal (2.5 mm super mini jack), you can remotely control the zoom and recording start/ stop operations.






- Do not connect a device other than a remote control to the <CAM REMOTE> terminals. Connecting a device other than a remote control may change the brightness or cause defocus of images.
- <AUTO>/<MANUAL> can be switched with the remote control, when the iris is adjusted by the remote control with the <AUTO/MANUAL> switch set to <AUTO> and [A.IRIS] is set to [OFF] from the main menu → [AUTO SW].
- When the remote control is connected to the <FOCUS IRIS> terminal, iris can be adjusted only by the remote control and cannot be adjusted by the iris ring on the camera.

TV/monitor

A TV or monitor can be connected as shown in the following figure.



NOTE

- VIERA Link is not supported on the camera. Please be aware that when using an HDMI cable and connecting this camera to a device that supports VIERA Link, the VIERA Link of other devices may not work in some cases.
- * SD signals (480i, 576i) output from the <HDMI OUT> terminal are converted to progressive signals (480P, 576P) then output.
- For the BNC cable (optional) connected to the <SDI OUT> terminal, prepare a double-shielded cable equivalent to 5C-FB.
- Prepare the HDMI cable (optional) with double shielded. For the HDMI cable, using Panasonic HDMI cable is recommended.

Connection function via <USB2.0 DEVICE> or <USB3.0 HOST> terminal

Connecting to a computer in the USB device mode

By connecting the camera to a computer via USB 2.0, the P2 card inserted in the camera can be used as mass storage.

Connecting to a computer



- 1 Connect the USB cable to the <USB2.0 DEVICE> terminal (device). (Fig. 1)






Fig. 2 Fig. 3

- 2 Set to [DEVICE] in the main menu → [NETWORK SETUP] → [USB MODE SELECT]. (Fig. 2) For details, refer to "Setting menu basic operations" (page 131).
- 3 Set [ON] in the main menu \rightarrow [NETWORK SETUP] \rightarrow [USB MODE]. (Fig. 3)

During USB connection, [USB DEVICE CONNECTED] is displayed in the center of the viewfinder or LCD monitor. If the USB connection is being moved or it is not connected properly, [USB DEVICE CONNECTING...] is displayed.

4 Exit the USB device mode.

There are three methods:

- Turn the power switch of the camera to <OFF>.
- Press the <EXIT> button.

While in USB device mode, [Push EXIT to Return to CAMERA MODE] is displayed at the lower of the LCD monitor or viewfinder or screen.

Press the USER button to which [USB MODE] has been assigned.

Returns to camera shooting status in approx. five seconds when the USB device mode ends.

NOTE

- The USB 2.0 cable is not supplied with the camera. Prepare a commercial USB 2.0 cable (double-shielded for noise suppression).
- · A USB connection cable of up to 5 m is supported, however, a cable of 3 m or shorter is recommended as preferable.
- · Before making USB connection for the first time, install P2 Viewer Plus software to your computer.
- Download the USB driver from the website and install it into your computer. For installation procedure of the driver, refer to the installation manual on the website.

For the latest information on the driver, visit the following website.

- The camera supports only USB 2.0. Ensure your computer supports USB 2.0.
- · When connecting the camera to a computer via USB, ensure that no other device is connected to the computer via USB.
- When connecting the camera via USB, do not eject the P2 card.
- · When USB is connected, the P2 card access LED turns off when not accessed.
- $\boldsymbol{\cdot} \text{ When the camera is operating in the USB device mode, no camera shooting, recording/playback operation or clip thumbnail operation is allowed.}$
- When the camera is operating in the USB device mode, the P2 card remaining capacity and status are not displayed. Also, video/audio cannot be output or displayed.

Connecting to external devices in USB host mode

You can save data on cards or other operations by connecting a storage device such as hard disk drive or solid-state drive that can be connected via USB 2.0 or USB 3.0 to the <USB3.0 HOST> terminal.

Switching to the USB host mode



1 Connect the storage device to the <USB3.0 HOST> terminal. (Fig. 1)

- When connecting a storage device which supports USB 3.0, use a cable that conforms to the USB 3.0 standard.
- When a USB 2.0 cable is used, the transfer rates cannot be faster than the ability of USB 2.0.
- If the storage device is recognized and is usable, [USB] (gray) on the top right of the thumbnail screen changes to [USB] (white).

f 2 Set to [STORAGE] in the main menu ightarrow [NETWORK SETUP] ightarrow [USB MODE SELECT]. (Fig. 2)

For details, refer to "Setting menu basic operations" (page 131).

$\textbf{3} \hspace{0.1cm} \textbf{Set [ON] in the main menu} \rightarrow \textbf{[NETWORK SETUP]} \rightarrow \textbf{[USB MODE]}. \hspace{0.1cm} \textbf{(Fig. 3)}$

- The camera is switched to the USB host mode.
- While in USB host mode, [USB STORAGE CONNECTED] is displayed in the center of the viewfinder or LCD monitor. If the USB connection is being moved or the hard disk drive is not connected properly, [USB STORAGE CONNECTING...] is displayed.

4 Press the <THUMBNAIL> button.

- The thumbnail screen is displayed.
- Ensure that [USB] is displayed at the top right of the screen.
- If a storage device is connected, the icon that indicates storage device status at the top right illuminates. However, a red mark indicates that the device cannot be used.

For details on USB host mode, refer to "Connecting to external devices in USB host mode" (page 169).

5 Exit the USB host mode.

There are two methods:

- Turn the power switch of the camera to <OFF>.
- $\bullet \text{ With the thumbnail screen closed, set [OFF] in the main menu} \rightarrow \text{[NETWORK SETUP]} \rightarrow \text{[USB MODE]}.$
- Press the USER button to which [USB MODE] has been assigned. Note that this is disabled when a menu or thumbnail is open.

NOTE

- In USB host mode, a P2 card can be played back. Camera image and external input cannot be recorded.
 Clips written to the hard disk drive cannot be played back on the camera.
- · A storage device cannot be connected to the <USB2.0 HOST> terminal (page 22).
- While connecting a storage device, use the fully charged battery or connect an AC adaptor to the camera to avoid problems in copying or formatting operations.
- The <USB3.0 HOST> terminal also supports USB bus power (5 V, 0.9 A). However, there are certain devices that cannot run depending on the storage device used. In such cases, add a separate power supply to the storage device.
- · Some storage devices may not function properly depending on the storage device and cable used.
- Do not connect multiple storage devices using a hub even if the storage devices are turned off. Do not connect other devices together with your storage device using a hub.
- During a format or copy operation, do not unplug the cable, eject the target P2 card, or turn off the camera or the storage device. Rebooting the camera and the storage device is required.
- · A storage device with the SATA (Serial ATA) or PATA (Parallel ATA) interface connected using a USB conversion cable may not be recognized.
- · Do not connect or disconnect the cable during playback on the camera. Playback may not be performed properly.

Storage device types and available functions

The available functions differ depending on the storage device you will use. The storage device type is displayed after [PARTITION] on the left side of the storage device explorer screen.

For details, refer to "Storage device information display (explorer screen)" (page 173).

- If the contents of the storage device used for copying data from the camera are replaced using another computer, the camera operations and storage device data cannot be guaranteed.
- · For P2 cards containing defective clips, it is recommended that you copy data to a storage device after restoring in advance.

Formatting a storage device

You can initialize the storage device to a usable format using the [TYPE S] or the [FAT] file system.



- **1** Select [STORAGE] in the main menu \rightarrow [CLIP] \rightarrow [EXPLORE] and press the control stick. This opens the explorer screen.
- 2 Select the desired format ([TYPE S], [FAT]) in the main menu → [CLIP] → [FORMAT(STORAGE)] and press the control stick. (Fig. 1)
- 3 Select [YES] in the confirmation message and press the control stick.
- **4** Select [YES] again when the confirmation message appears, and press the control stick. This formats the storage device.



· Formatting the storage devices erases all of its contents. Data cannot be recovered once it is formatted. Always check the data before formatting.

Exporting to a storage device by card

You can export to a storage device (write to a storage device from a P2 card) by P2 card. The copy results and the maximum number of items that can be copied vary depending on format type of the storage device. You cannot perform copying once the capacity of the storage device is exceeded.

■ [TYPE S]

A partition is created for each card, and all data included in the card are copied there. You can check the part numbers and serial numbers of the P2 cards that have been copied on the explorer screen of the camera.

The maximum number of items that can be copied is 23.

■ [FAT]

A folder is created for each card. All data included in the card are copied there. You can check the folder names in the explorer screen of the camera. Folders are created in two levels; the date folders on the first level and the time folders on the second.

Example) August 30, 2013, 12:34:56: /13-08-30/12-34-56

The maximum number of items that can be copied is 100.

1 Select [EXPORT] in the main menu \rightarrow [CLIP] and press the control stick.

f 2 Move the cursor to the card slot number of the copy source and press the control stick.

For [TYPE S], selecting [ALL SLOT] exports all cards currently inserted.

f 3 Select [YES] in the confirmation message and press the control stick.

Exporting begins. A progress bar appears during exporting. (Fig. 1) [COPY COMPLETED!] will be displayed when exporting is completed.



- For export with [TYPE S], P2 card data and copied data can be verified (compared) automatically after exporting. Verification at the time of export is enabled in the factory setting. When you set to disable verification at the time of export, exported data is not verified, and the time until export completes will shorten. To disable verification, set [VERIFY] to [OFF] in the main menu → [CLIP] → [STORAGE COPY SETUP]. For [FAT], verification is not performed regardless of this setting.
- · To discontinue the export process, press the control stick. A [CANCEL] confirmation message will appear. Select [YES] and press the control stick.
- Even if you cancel the process during verification, copying to the P2 card will continue until it is completed.
- · microP2 memory cards that exceed 32 GB cannot be exported and imported. Use copied clips.

Copying to a storage device by clip

You can copy only the selected clips to a storage device.

- 1 Go to the thumbnail screen. Use the control stick to place the cursor on a clip you want to copy and press the control stick. You can also select multiple clips.
- **2** Select [STORAGE] in the main menu → [CLIP] → [COPY] and press the control stick. A list of folders or partitions in the storage device is displayed.
- 3 Select the copy destination and press the control stick.
- 4 Select [YES] in the confirmation message and press the control stick.

This starts the copying process. A progress bar is displayed during copying. [COPY COMPLETED!] will be displayed when copying is completed.



- · When the storage device has a [FAT] file system, the folders displayed are as follows:
- Root
- Folders down to the third level including the CONTENTS folder
- To copy to a [TYPE S] storage device, one or more partitions are required. You can either format the storage device to [FAT] or perform copying after creating a partition through the export process.
- To cancel the copy process, use the control stick to place the cursor on [CANCEL] and press the control stick. A [CANCEL] confirmation message will appear. Select [YES] and press the control stick. Clips copied halfway to the copy destination are deleted.
- If you have copied clips to a [TYPE S] storage device, you will not be able to import to that partition by card. Also, the part number display of the card at that instance will display [UNKNOWN].

Storage device information display (explorer screen)

You can perform the following operations in the explorer screen display.

- · Storage device information display
- Storage device partition or folder thumbnail display and selection
- Target partition or folder selection

To display the explorer screen, select [STORAGE] in the main menu \rightarrow [CLIP] \rightarrow [EXPLORE] and press the control stick.

- · For [TYPE S] storage devices, you can switch the display between the partition name and serial name using the control stick.
- If there is an invalid partition in [P2STORE], the partition information is displayed in gray.
- $\cdot \text{ The remaining free space of the corresponding partition can be checked in the main menu} \rightarrow [\text{CLIP}] \rightarrow [\text{PROPERTY}] \rightarrow [\text{FREE CAP. OF a space of the corresponding partition}]$ PARTITION].

Selecting the target folder/partition in the explorer screen

You can display all clips included in the selected partition/folder as thumbnails by selecting partitions/folders as targets. You can display up to six partitions/folders. When the seventh partition/folder is specified, setting is disabled and a warning is displayed.



- 1 In the explorer screen, place the cursor on the partition/folder.
- f 2 Press and hold the control stick (for one second or more).

The partition/folder is selected and a checkmark is displayed. (Fig. 1)

The selected target partition/folder is valid until the storage device is disconnected or the power is turned off. To release the selected partition/folder, hold down the control stick (for one second or more) again on the selected partition.

Press the <CANCEL> button to deselect all partitions/folders.



- In [TYPE S] storage devices, [MODEL] is [UNKNOWN] and clips recorded across other partitions will not be one normal clip. Copying clips to a [TYPE S] storage device changes the partition of the copy destination [MODEL] to [UNKNOWN].
- The partition name can be set when a [TYPE S] storage device is used. The partition name that has been set is displayed in [PARTITION NAME] on the explorer screen.

Setting a partition name in the explorer screen

When the storage device is [TYPE S], the name (up to 20 characters) can be set to the partition. The preset partition name is displayed in [PARTITION NAME] on the explorer screen.

1 In the explorer screen, place the cursor on the partition you want to set up.

You can display the thumbnail list and set names for partitions by pressing the control stick.

f 2 Select [CHANGE PARTITION NAME] in the main menu ightarrow [CLIP] and press the control stick.

This displays the soft keyboard.

3 Enter the partition name and select [OK].

The partition name is set.

Deleting the last partition in the explorer screen

You can delete the last partition on a [TYPE S] type storage device.

- 1 In the explorer screen, place the cursor on the last partition.
- ${f 2}$ Select [DELETE LAST PARTITION] in the main menu ightarrow [CLIP] and press the control stick.



- You can only delete the last partition when using a [TYPE S] storage device. You can only delete the last partition. You cannot delete other partitions.
- · Since deleted partitions cannot be recovered, perform a check thoroughly before deleting.

Clip thumbnail display of the storage device

Displaying thumbnails

You can display and manage clips saved in a storage device, as well as display the thumbnail screen for clips saved in a P2 card attached to the camera.





1 Open the explorer screen.

Partitions or folders are displayed in a list.

2 Use the control stick to place the cursor on the partition or folder you want to display on the thumbnail screen, and press the control stick.

This displays the thumbnails of clips in the partition or folder. You can go back to the main explorer screen by clicking the <EXIT> button.



 When target partitions are selected, you can display thumbnails in all partitions selected as targets by pressing the control stick while holding down the SHIFT> button.

[SELECTED PART.]	Displays a checkmark when a target partition is selected
[SELECTED PART. NO.]	List of selected folder numbers (only displayed when multiple folders are selected)
[NO.]	Folder number
[DATE]	Folder creation date
[TIME]	Folder creation time
[FOLDER]	Folder name (creation date and time are not displayed in the root folder)
[SIZE]	Total capacity of the storage device
[FREE CAP.]	Remaining storage device capacity



- · You can change the thumbnail screen display if necessary.
- The 1001st clips onwards are not displayed.

Displaying clip information

You can display metadata of clips saved in a storage device. The procedure to display is the same as that of the P2 card clip properties.

- 1 In the storage device thumbnail screen, move the cursor to the target clip.
- **2** Select [CLIP PROPERTY] in the main menu \rightarrow [CLIP] \rightarrow [PROPERTY] and press the control stick. This cannot be modified.

Deleting clips

You can delete unnecessary clips saved in a storage device.

- 1 In the storage device thumbnail screen, select the clip you want to delete.
- $\boldsymbol{2}$ Select [DELETE] in the main menu \rightarrow [CLIP] and press the control stick.
- 3 Move the cursor to [YES] in the confirmation message and press the control stick.



• You may not be able to delete clips with defective clip or unknown clip indicators.

Writing back to the P2 card from a storage device (import)

Importing from a [TYPE S] storage device or [P2STORE] by partition

You can import (write back to a P2 card from as storage device) to a P2 card with the same part number as the source card by partition (card).

- 1 Insert a P2 card that will serve as the input destination.
 - Make sure to insert a formatted P2 card.
- 2 Connecting a storage device.
- $\textbf{3} \ \, \text{Select [STORAGE] in the main menu} \rightarrow \text{[CLIP]} \rightarrow \text{[EXPLORE] to display the explorer screen}.$
- 4 In the explorer screen, display the partition thumbnails to be imported.
- **5** Select [IMPORT] in the main menu \rightarrow [CLIP].
- 6 Place the cursor on the P2 card slot number of the import destination and press the control stick.

Start importing by selecting [YES] in the confirmation message. [COPY COMPLETED!] will be displayed when importing is completed.

NOTE

- Importing to a P2 card that is different from the source P2 card may result in incomplete clips depending on the clips. In this case, use the reconnection function to reconfigure the clips. For details, refer to "Reconnecting incomplete clips" (page 121).
- You can select whether to perform verification at the time of copying in the main menu → [CLIP] → [STORAGE COPY SETUP] → [VERIFY].
- · You cannot import by partition to a P2 card of a different model. Perform copying by clip instead.

Copying to a P2 card by clip

You can specify a storage device clip and copy it to a P2 card.


- 1 Open the storage device thumbnail screen.
- 2 Select the clip you want to copy.
- 3 In the main menu → [CLIP] → [COPY] → [STORAGE] list, move the cursor over the copy destination and press the control stick.

 Start importing by selecting [YES] in the confirmation message.

 [COPY COMPLETED!] will be displayed when copying is completed.

Connecting to the remote operation panel (AK-HRP200G)

- You can remotely control some functions by connecting the remote operation panel AK-HRP200G (optional) via an IP connection.
- When you connect AK-HRP200G using a LAN cable and perform network settings of the camera and the AK-HRP200G, the camera automatically enters the remote control mode. For the connection settings, refer to "Setting for connection with Remote Operation Panel (AK-HRP200G)" (page 191)
- Turn the <AUTO/MANUAL> switch of the camera to <MANUAL>. Some items may not work in <AUTO> depending on the camera's automatic adjustment settings. In addition, when you perform zoom operations in AK-HRP200G, set the camera's <ZOOM> switch in the <SERVO> position.
- The remote control mode is canceled by pressing the <HEAD POWER> switch of AK-HRP200G to terminate the connection while the camera and AK-HRP200G are connected, or by removing the network cable and changing the power switch of the camera from <OFF> to <ON>.



Switch function in remote control mode

The following switches and buttons on the camera do not function in remote control mode.

- <MENU> button
- <SEL/PUSH SET> dial button
- GAIN> switch
- <WHITE BAL> switch (works when set in the <A> position)
- <BARS> button
- Manual focus operation using the focus ring
- Switching between auto focus mode and manual focus mode using the <FOCUS> switch
- Motorized zoom operation of the zoom lever (grip side/handle side)

Recording and playback operations in remote control mode

Playback operation cannot be performed from the Remote Operation Panel AK-HRP200G. It can only be operated from the camera. Recording operations can be performed using the following procedure.

• For normal recording/loop recording/simultaneous recording

Start and stop recording: Press the <VF POWER> and <STORE> buttons simultaneously.

• For interval recording/one-shot recording

Start recording: Press the <VF POWER> and <STORE> buttons simultaneously.

Stop recording: Press the <VF POWER> and <SCENE4> buttons simultaneously.

For one-clip recording

Start and stop recording: Press the <VF POWER> and <STORE> buttons simultaneously.

 $\hbox{\it Clip linking in one-clip recording cannot end from AK-HRP200G. It can only be operated from the camera.}$

Remote control unit connected to the camera

When AK-HRP200G is connected to the camera, the AK-HRP200G button's operations are as follows:

Skin tone detail button (<SKINDTL>)

Operation varies depending on the lighting status of the button.

- When the button lights up, the operation follows the menu setting value of the camera (setting for skin tone detail).
- When the button lights off, the skin tone detail function is set to [OFF], regardless of the menu setting value of the camera.

After restarting the camera, the menu setting value is reflected in AK-HRP200G.

However, this function does not operate when the camera and AK-HRP200G have a serial connection.

■ Knee OFF button (<KNEE OFF>)

Operation varies depending on the lighting status of the button.

- When the button lights up, the knee function is set to [OFF], regardless of the menu setting value of the camera.
- When the button lights off, the operation follows the menu setting value of the camera (setting for the knee function).

After restarting the camera, the menu setting value is reflected in AK-HRP200G.

■ Matrix button (<MATRIX>)

When the button lights up, the menu setting value of the camera is always applied (setting for matrix). The function cannot be turned [OFF] even if the button is pressed.

After restarting the camera, the menu setting value is reflected in AK-HRP200G.

■ Scene file selection buttons (<SCENE1> - <SCENE4>)

Not supported.

■ User file selection buttons (<USER1> - <USER3>)

You can select the camera's scene file F1 to F3. F4 to F6 cannot be selected.

However, this function does not operate when the camera and AK-HRP200G have a serial connection.

■ R flare/pedestal volume (<FLARE/PED R>), B flare/pedestal volume (<FLARE/PED B>)

Flare adjustment is not supported. Works only with the pedestal.

Adjusted value display area (4 digits)

Display of CC filter, zoom, and focus values are not supported.

■ Character/menu button (<CHARA/MENU>)

The status and menu are displayed in the output image from the <SDI OUT>, <HDMI OUT>, and <GENLOCK IN/VIDEO OUT> terminals regardless of camera's menu setting value.

■ Sense volume (<SENSE>)

Zoom/focus speed can be adjusted.

- Turning it to the right accelerates the zoom/focus speed.
- Turning it to the left decelerates the zoom/focus speed.

■ ND filter/CC filter display selection button <ND/CC>

• Zoom mode and focus mode can be switched.

Press the display selection button, and select either zoom mode or focus mode.

- During zoom mode, the adjusted value display area (4 digits) shows [Zo].
- During focus mode, the adjusted value display area (4 digits) shows [Fo].

While the selection is displayed, you can change the adjusted value using the data set button (up) <UP>/data set button (down) <DOWN>.

• Auto focus and manual focus can be switched.

Press the display selection button, and select the adjusted value display area (4 digits) [AF.**]. While the selection is displayed, select auto focus or manual focus by pressing the data set button (up) <UP> or data set button (down) <DOWN>.

- During manual focus, [AF.of] is displayed.
- During auto focus, [AF.on] is displayed.
- During frame rate mode, the adjusted value display area (4 digits) shows [Frof], but it does not operate on the camera.

■ Data set button (up) <UP>

Zooms in during zoom mode.

You can adjust focus (on the back) during focus mode.

■ Data set button (down) <DOWN>

Zooms out during zoom mode.

You can adjust focus (on the front) during focus mode.

■ Selection dial <SELECT>

You can adjust focus during zoom mode. Turning the dial to the right focuses on the back. Turning the dial to the left focuses on the front. You can adjust zoom during focus mode. Turning the dial to the right performs zoom in, and turning the dial to the left performs zoom out.

NOTE

- To perform the manual iris operation on the camera or remotely control the iris using the <CAM REMOTE> terminal during IP connection, enable the operation by pressing the <IRIS> button on the camera. When the manual iris operation is enabled on the camera, the screen's iris is displayed in black and white inversion. You cannot perform zoom operations using the <CAM REMOTE> terminal.
- · You can use a straight-through or a crossover LAN cable to directly connect AK-HRP200G to the camera.
- When the camera is restarted with the camera and AK-HRP200G connected via IP, the camera power button of AK-HRP200G (<HEAD POWER>) might blink in red then light up in green.
- To use the camera as a standalone device, you need to release the remote control mode by pressing the camera power button <HEAD POWER> of AK-HRP200G
- The operation of connecting via IP and remote controlling the camera from multiple devices such as the AK-HRP200G cannot be guaranteed.
- Use the camera by matching the synchro scan display settings ([sec] or [deg]) of AK-HRP200G and the camera. Even if the camera's synchro scan display settings are changed, it will not sync with the AK-HRP200G display.
- · When the camera is connected to AK-HRP200G via IP, the P2 playlist editing function is not available.

Connecting to P2 ROP application

Using a P2 ROP application that operates on an iPad connected to the camera via wireless LAN, you can remotely control some functions of the camera.

For the settings for network connection, refer to "Setting for connection with P2 ROP application" (page 190).

For details on operation of the P2 ROP application, refer to the P2 ROP application help file.

Switch functionality in remote control mode

The following switches and buttons on the camera do not function in remote control mode.

- <MENU> button
- <SEL/PUSH SET> dial button
- GAIN> switch
- <WHITE BAL> switch
- <BARS> button
- Manual focus operation using the focus ring
- Switching between auto focus mode and manual focus mode using the <FOCUS> switch
- Motorized zoom operation of the zoom lever (grip side/handle side)

Recording and playback operations in remote control mode

When connected to the P2 ROP application, recording and playback can be performed with either the camera or the P2 ROP application.



- · The status adjusted by connecting the P2 ROP application will always be recorded on the camera.
- When the camera is connected to the P2 ROP application, the P2 playlist editing function is not available.
- To enable operations on the camera, disconnect the network on the iPad side, and then turn the power switch of the camera from <OFF> to <ON>.

Chapter 9 Network Connection

This chapter describes how to use the camera by connecting to network.

Network connection

The camera can be connected to the network via wireless LAN, wired LAN, or 4G/LTE.

Also, high speed network connection is possible when connected to the bonding device to wireless LAN or wired LAN.



To use wireless LAN, attach AJ-WM30/AJ-WM50 (optional) to the <USB2.0 HOST> terminal.

To use wired LAN, connect a LAN cable to the <LAN> terminal on the rear side.

To use 4G/LTE, connect a USB modem that is compliant with the <USB2.0 HOST> terminal.



Available functions

When the camera is connected to network, the following functions are available.

- Checking camera status
- · Checking thumbnail images
- Proxy playback
- Downloading proxy file/clip management information
- Displaying/editing metadata
- Adding/deleting metadata (shot mark/text memo)
- Camera remote control (collective operations of recording control and time code/user bits)
- IP remote controlling the camera from the Remote Operation Panel (AK-HRP200G) (wired LAN only)
- Connecting to P2 ROP application
- Clip transfer function with FTP
- Streaming function

Preparing for connection

For the wireless module AJ-WM30/AJ-WM50

Connect the wireless module AJ-WM30/AJ-WM50 (optional) to the camera. The grip belt can be removed.






- 1 Press the <OPEN> button and remove the cover by sliding it in the direction of the arrow. (Fig. 1)
- 2 Connect the wireless module to the <USB2.0 HOST> terminal. (Fig. 2) Insert it all the way.
- 3 Place the (AJ-WM50 only) module holder under the wireless module. (Fig. 3)
 - Mount the cap of the wireless module to the hole of the module holder.
- 4 Slide the removed cover to close it.



- When removing the wireless module, pull it down straight.
- When using a wireless module other than AJ-WM30/AJ-WM50, refer to "For wireless module other than AJ-WM30/AJ-WM50" (page 184).

Storing the wireless module AJ-WM30

The removed wireless module AJ-WM30 can be stored in the grip belt.



Cautions when using wireless module AJ-WM30/AJ-WM50



For wireless module other than AJ-WM30/AJ-WM50

Connect the wireless module other than AJ-WM30/AJ-WM50 (optional) to the camera. The grip belt can be removed.

Turn off the power of the camera before connecting or disconnecting the wireless module.



- 1 Press the <OPEN> button and remove the cover by sliding it in the direction of the arrow. (Fig. 1)
- 2 Connect the USB 2.0 extension cable (optional: type A male/female, 0.2 m) to the <USB2.0 HOST> terminal. (Fig. 2)
- 3 Remove the cord cap inside the removed cover (Fig. 3), pass the USB 2.0 extension cable there, and slide the cover to close. (Fig. 4)

The removed cord cap can be stored in the cord cap compartment inside the cover.

- 4 Pass the USB 2.0 extension cable through the grip belt compartment. (Fig. 5)
- **5** Connect the wireless module. (Fig. 6)


The wireless module can be stored in the grip belt.

For wired LAN

Connect a LAN cable.



1 Connect the LAN cable to the <LAN> terminal on the rear side.

Network settings

To use wireless LAN or wired LAN, configuration of each setting is required. Configure the settings according to the function to use. When the main menu \rightarrow [NETWORK SETUP] \rightarrow [USB MODE SELECT] is set to [STORAGE], the network function cannot be used.

Wireless LAN settings

This section describes the settings to connect the camera to mobile devices (iPad/iPhone), computers, or wireless access point via wireless LAN.

[DIRECT] mode

Use the following procedures when accessing to the network function of the camera directly from a smartphone, tablet, or computer.

- **1** Select [DIRECT] in the main menu \rightarrow [NETWORK SETUP] \rightarrow [WIRELESS PROPERTY] \rightarrow [TYPE].
- ${f 2}$ Set each item in the main menu ightarrow [NETWORK SETUP] ightarrow [WIRELESS PROPERTY] as necessary.

[MAC ADDRESS]: MAC address of wireless LAN (cannot be changed)

[SSID]: Network name of the camera (SSID) (Factory setting: [AJ-PX270])

[BAND]: Setting that switches between 2 transmission methods (2.4 GHz or 5 GHz) (Factory setting: [2.4GHz])(When using AJ-WM30: [2.4GHz]/ When using AJ-WM50: [2.4GHz] or [5GHz])

[CHANNEL (2.4GHz)]: Channel used when set to 2.4 GHz (Factory setting: [AUTO])

[CHANNEL (5GHz)]: Channel used when set to 5 GHz (Factory setting: [AUTO])

[ENCRYPTION]: Encryption format to be used (Factory setting: [WPA2-AES])

[ENCRYPT KEY]: WPA2 encryption key (Factory setting: [01234567890123456789abcdef])

[DHCP]: Setting whether to use automatic acquisition via DHCP ([ENABLE]: Use automatic acquisition/[DISABLE]: Does not use automatic acquisition) (Factory setting: [ENABLE]) (cannot be set)

[IP ADDRESS]: IP address of the camera (Factory setting: [192.168.0.1]).

[SUBNET MASK]: Subnet mask (Factory setting: [255.255.255.0])

[DEFAULT GATEWAY]: Default gateway (Factory setting: [192.168.0.254]) (cannot be set)

[PRIMARY DNS]: Primary DNS server setting (Factory setting: [0.0.0.0]) (cannot be set)

[SECONDARY DNS]: Secondary DNS server setting (Factory setting: [0.0.0.0]) (cannot be set)

[DHCP SERVER]: Setting whether to use DHCP SERVER function ([ENABLE]: Use DHCP SERVER function/[DISABLE]: Does not use DHCP SERVER function) (Factory setting: [ENABLE])

 $\textbf{3} \hspace{0.1cm} \textbf{Select [WLAN] in the main menu} \rightarrow \textbf{[NETWORK SETUP]} \rightarrow \textbf{[NETWORK SEL]}.$

If the setting is changed, the camera will restart as necessary.

4 Select SSID from the list of the access points for mobile devices or computers and enter the password (encryption key).

Display the access point list screen in wireless setting and select [SSID] of the camera.

• Factory setting: [AJ-PX270]

When the password confirmation screen appears, enter the password (encryption key).

• Factory setting: [01234567890123456789abcdef]

5 Check the network connection.

When the setting is completed, confirm that network connection of mobile devices (iPad/iPhone) and computers is made properly. Application (P2 Browser) which requires network can be used when network connect is made properly. However, if connected with [DIRECT], the FTP client function cannot be used.



- The AJ-WM30 can only operate when the communication method is 2.4 GHz. When [BAND] is set to [5GHz], it will automatically change [BAND] to [2.4GHz] and [CHANNEL (2.4GHz)] to [AUTO] before operation.
- The startup time after turning on the power may be longer due to starting of the network.
- When you change the [NETWORK SEL] settings, the changes will not be reflected until the camera is restarted. After the settings have been changed, the setting screen termination may take time due to the restart of the network service.
- The IP address, subnet mask, and default gateway must be correctly set.

If the warning [CANNOT ACCESS GATEWAY!] appears after the setting screen is closed, contact the administrator of the network in use.

- IP addresses from [192.168.255.0] to [192.168.255.255] cannot be used because they are reserved by the system.
- If you do not use the default gateway and DNS, set them to [0.0.0.0].
- · DHCP and DNS may not function properly depending on the network environment.

[INFRA] mode (when SSID is manually entered)

Use the following procedures when manually connecting to a wireless access point.

- **1** Select [INFRA] in the main menu \rightarrow [NETWORK SETUP] \rightarrow [WIRELESS PROPERTY] \rightarrow [TYPE].
- 2 Set each item in the main menu \rightarrow [NETWORK SETUP] \rightarrow [WIRELESS PROPERTY] as necessary.

[MAC ADDRESS]: MAC address of wireless LAN (cannot be changed)

[BAND]: Setting that switches between 2 transmission methods (2.4 GHz or 5 GHz) (Factory setting: [2.4GHz]) (cannot be set)

[CHANNEL (2.4GHz)]: Channel used when set to 2.4 GHz (Factory setting: [AUTO]) (cannot be set)

[CHANNEL (5GHz)]: Channel used when set to 5 GHz (Factory setting: [AUTO]) (cannot be set)

[DHCP]: Setting whether to use automatic acquisition via DHCP ([ENABLE]: Uses the automatic acquisition/[DISABLE]: Does not use the automatic acquisition) (Factory setting: [ENABLE])

[IP ADDRESS]: IP address of the camera (Factory setting: [192.168.0.1]).

[SUBNET MASK]: Subnet mask (Factory setting: [255.255.255.0])

[DEFAULT GATEWAY]: Default gateway (Factory setting: [192.168.0.254])

[PRIMARY DNS]: Primary DNS server setting (Factory setting: [0.0.0.0]) (When [DHCP] is set to [ENABLE] and can be acquired from the DNS server, the DNS server value which is acquired externally is overwritten. When the value is [0.0.0.0], the server is not set.)

[SECONDARY DNS]: Secondary DNS server setting (Factory setting: [0.0.0.0]) (When [DHCP] is set to [ENABLE] and can be acquired from the DNS server, the DNS server value which is acquired externally is overwritten. When the value is [0.0.0.0], the server is not set.)

$\textbf{3} \; \mathsf{Select} \; [\mathsf{WLAN}] \; \mathsf{in} \; \mathsf{the} \; \mathsf{main} \; \mathsf{menu} \to [\mathsf{NETWORK} \; \mathsf{SETUP}] \to [\mathsf{NETWORK} \; \mathsf{SEL}].$

If the setting is changed, the camera will restart as necessary.

4 Enter information on the wireless access point to connect to.

Select [MANUAL] in the main menu → [NETWORK SETUP] → [WIRELESS PROPERTY] → [SSID INPUT MODE].

Enter SSID of the wireless access point for destination in [SSID] of the camera.

Select the encryption method to be used from the camera's [ENCRYPTION].

• Factory setting: [WPA2-AES]

Enter a password of the wireless access point for destination in [ENCRYPT KEY] of the of the camera.

5 Check the network connection.

When the setting is completed, confirm that network connection between the camera and the wireless access point is made properly. When network connection is made properly, the network status icon at the upper right of the thumbnail screen changes in yellow, and applications (P2 Browser, FTP client function) which require network can be used.

NOTE NOTE

- · There are following restrictions while wireless LAN is set.
- Regardless of menu settings, signals are not output from the <GENLOCK IN/VIDEO OUT> terminal.
- The LCD monitor and viewfinder cannot be used together. If you close the LCD monitor, the viewfinder can be used.
- · The startup time after turning on the power may be longer due to starting of the network.
- When you change the settings of [NETWORK SEL], the changes will not be reflected until the camera is restarted. After the settings have been changed, the setting screen termination may take time due to the restart of the network service.
- · All of the IP address, subnet mask, and default gateway must be correctly set.
 - If the warning [CANNOT ACCESS GATEWAY!] appears at the termination of the setting screen, contact the administrator of the network in use.
- If you do not use the default gateway and DNS, set them to [0.0.0.0].
- DHCP and DNS may not function properly depending on the network environment.

[INFRA] mode (when SSID is selected from the list)

Use the following procedures when the wireless access point to connect to is selected from a list.

$oldsymbol{2}$ Set each item in main menu ightarrow [NETWORK SETUP] ightarrow [WIRELESS PROPERTY] as necessary.

[MAC ADDRESS]: MAC address of wireless LAN (cannot be changed)

[BAND]: Setting that switches between 2 transmission methods (2.4 GHz or 5 GHz) (Factory setting: [2.4GHz]) (Cannot be set)

[CHANNEL (2.4GHz)]: Channel used when set to 2.4 GHz (Factory setting: [AUTO]) (Cannot be set)

 $\textbf{[CHANNEL (5GHz)]:} \ Channel \ used \ when \ set \ to \ 5 \ GHz \ (Factory \ setting: \ [AUTO]) \ (Cannot \ be \ set)$

[DHCP]: Setting whether to use automatic acquisition via DHCP ([ENABLE]: Uses the automatic acquisition/[DISABLE]: Does not use the automatic acquisition) (Factory setting: [ENABLE])

[IP ADDRESS]: IP address of the camera (Factory setting: [192.168.0.1]).

[SUBNET MASK]: Subnet mask (Factory setting: [255.255.255.0])

[DEFAULT GATEWAY]: Default gateway (Factory setting: [192.168.0.254])

[PRIMARY DNS]: Primary DNS server setting (Factory setting: [0.0.0.0]) (When [DHCP] is set to [ENABLE] and can be acquired from the DNS server, the DNS server value which is acquired externally is overwritten. When the value is [0.0.0.0], the server is not set.)

[SECONDARY DNS]: Secondary DNS server setting (Factory setting: [0.0.0.0]) (When [DHCP] is set to [ENABLE] and can be acquired from the DNS server, the DNS server value which is acquired externally is overwritten. When the value is [0.0.0.0], the server is not set.)

$\textbf{3} \hspace{0.1cm} \textbf{Select [WLAN] in main menu} \rightarrow \textbf{[NETWORK SETUP]} \rightarrow \textbf{[NETWORK SEL]}.$

If the setting is changed, the camera will restart as necessary.

4 Enter information on the wireless access point to connect to.

1) Select [SELECT] in the main menu → [NETWORK SETUP] → [WIRELESS PROPERTY] → [SSID INPUT MODE].

When [SSID] is selected and the <SET> button is pressed, the SSID connection destination list screen (page 187) is displayed.

- 2) Select the SSID of the connection destination wireless access point using the control stick, and then press the <SET> button.
 - You can delete the selected SSID from the connection history by selecting SSID and pressing the <SET> button while the <SHIFT> is pressed.
 - You can clear all the SSID connection history by pressing the <EXIT> button while pressing the <SHIFT> button.
- 3) Enter the password of the wireless access point to connect to the camera's [ENCRYPT KEY].

5 Check the network connection.


When the setting is completed, confirm that network connection between the camera and the wireless access point is made properly. When network connection is made properly, the network status icon at the upper right of the thumbnail screen changes in yellow, and applications (P2 Browser, FTP client function) which require a network connection can be used.

NOTE NOTE

- There are following restrictions while wireless LAN is set.
- Regardless of menu settings, signals are not output from the <GENLOCK IN/VIDEO OUT> terminal.
- The LCD monitor and viewfinder cannot be used together. If you close the LCD monitor, the viewfinder can be used.

- The startup time after turning on the power may be longer due to starting of the network.
- When you change the settings of [NETWORK SEL], the changes will not be reflected until the camera is restarted. After the settings have been changed, the setting screen termination may take time due to the restart of the network service.
- · All of the IP address, subnet mask, and default gateway must be correctly set.
- If the warning [CANNOT ACCESS GATEWAY!] appears at the termination of the setting screen, contact the administrator of the network in use.
- · If you do not use the default gateway and DNS, set them to [0.0.0.0].
- DHCP and DNS may not function properly depending on the network environment.
- · A maximum of 20 connections are saved in the connection history. When this number is exceeded, the oldest entries are deleted.
- · The status of SSID connection destination list is current at the time the list was displayed and is not automatically refreshed.

■ SSID connection destination list screen



1 Selection status

A checkmark [/] is displayed on the currently selected SSID. (This does not show the connection status).

2 SSID

The list of the detected SSID and SSID registered in the connection history are displayed. SSIDs are displayed in order from the one with the strongest signal.

3 Past connection history

[H] is displayed in the SSID that has a past connection history. SSID with past connection histories are displayed even if the camera is outside the service area.

4 Encryption format

This is the encryption method used by the access point.

5 Radio wave strength

This shows the signal strength of the access point.

[4G/LTE] mode

Use the following procedure when you connect the camera with the 4G/LTE USB modem.

1 Select [4G/LTE] in the main menu \rightarrow [NETWORK SETUP] \rightarrow [NETWORK SEL].

2 When the main menu → [NETWORK SETUP] → [4G/LTE PROPERTY] is enabled, select [4G/LTE PROPERTY] and configure each setting as necessary.

When the setting of [4G/LTE PROPERTY] is required for the connected 4G/LTE USB modem, [4G/LTE PROPERTY] will become enabled.

When following setting is required, enter the information provided from the provider accurately.

[APN]: Sets the APN (access point name) provided from the provider.

[USER ID]: Sets the user name provided from the provider.

[PASSWORD]: Sets the password provided from the provider.

[DIAL NO.]: Set the phone number. For details, refer to the manual of the provider you have contracted.

3 Check the network connection.

Check whether to connect the camera to the network with 4G/LTE.

[4G/LTE, ill] is displayed in the screen when network connection is correct. Also, the network status icon in the top right of the thumbnail screen will display in yellow, and the application that will use the network can be used.



• There are following restrictions while [4G/LTE] is set.

- Regardless of menu settings, signals are not output from all external video output terminals.
- The LCD monitor and viewfinder cannot be used together. If you close the LCD monitor, the viewfinder can be used.
- microP2 memory cards can be used only in slot 1. (They cannot be in slot 2.)
- The startup time after turning on the power may be longer due to starting of the network.
- When you change the settings of [NETWORK SEL], the changes will not be reflected until the camera is restarted. After the settings have been
 changed, the setting screen termination may take time due to the restart of the network service.

Wired LAN settings

The settings to connect to computers using the wired LAN are as follows.

1 Set each item in the main menu \rightarrow [NETWORK SETUP] \rightarrow [LAN PROPERTY] as necessary.

[DHCP] and [DHCP SERVER] are mutually exclusive.

[MAC ADDRESS]: MAC address of wired LAN (cannot be changed)

[DHCP]: Setting whether to use automatic acquisition via DHCP ([ENABLE]: Use automatic acquisition/[DISABLE]: Does not use automatic acquisition (Factory setting: [ENABLE])

[IP ADDRESS]: IP address (Factory setting: [192.168.0.1])

[SUBNET MASK]: Subnet mask (Factory setting: [255.255.255.0])

[DEFAULT GATEWAY]: Default gateway (Factory setting: [192.168.0.254])

[PRIMARY DNS]: Primary DNS server setting (Factory setting: [0.0.0.0])

[SECONDARY DNS]: Secondary DNS server setting (Factory setting: [0.0.0.0])

[DHCP SERVER]: Setting whether to use the DHCP SERVER function ([ENABLE]: Uses the DHCP SERVER function/[DISABLE]: Does not use the DHCP SERVER function) (Factory setting: [DISABLE])

2 Select [LAN] in the main menu \rightarrow [NETWORK SETUP] \rightarrow [NETWORK SEL].

3 Configure the settings of wired LAN of your computer.

(For Windows)

Display [Properties] in [Internet Protocol Version 4 (TCP/IPv4)] and configure the settings. For details on how to display the screen, refer to [Start] → [Help and Support].

• When [DHCP SERVER] is set to [ENABLE] on the camera

Select [Obtain an IP address automatically] and [Obtain DNS server address automatically] in the [General] tab. Select [Automatic private IP address] in the [Alternate Configuration] tab.

• When [DHCP SERVER] is set to [DISABLE] on the camera

In the [General] tab, select [Use the following IP address], and enter the following items.

- [IP address]
- [Subnet mask]
- [Default gateway]/[Preferred DNS server]/[Alternate DNS server]: Not necessarily to be entered.

(For Mac OS)

• When [DHCP SERVER] is set to [ENABLE] on the camera

[Configure IPv4]: Select [Using DHCP].

[Configure IPv6]: Select [Automatically].

• When [DHCP SERVER] is set to [DISABLE] on the camera

[Configure IPv4]: Select [Manually] and enter the following items.

- [IP Address]
- [Subnet Mask]
- Entering [Router] is not required. Leave it blank.

[Configure IPv6]: Select [Automatically].

P2 browser function settings and connection status check

Setting for connection with Remote Operation Panel (AK-HRP200G)

You can remotely control some functions by connecting the remote operation panel AK-HRP200G (optional) via an IP connection.

To remotely control the camera after connecting the AK-HRP200G using a LAN cable, configure the settings using the following procedures:

1 Configure the network settings of the AK-HRP200G.

For the network settings, use ROP setup software that is supplied with AK-HRP200G.

2 Configure the network settings of the camera.

Set [DISABLE] in the main menu \rightarrow [NETWORK SETUP] \rightarrow [LAN PROPERTY] \rightarrow [DHCP], and refer to steps **1** to **2** in "Wired LAN settings" (page 187) to configure the network settings.

3 Set each item in the camera's main menu \rightarrow [NETWORK SETUP] \rightarrow [NETWORK FUNC] \rightarrow [USER ACCOUNT].

[USER NAME]: Sets the user account name. (Factory settings: [guest])

[PASSWORD]: Sets the password. (Factory setting: [p2guest])

Enter up to 31 characters for the user account name, and 6 to 15 characters for the password.

4 Set the camera's main menu \rightarrow [NETWORK SETUP] \rightarrow [NETWORK FUNC] \rightarrow [IP REMOTE] to [ENABLE].

The camera will restart. The IP connection will be possible after the camera is started. The camera will also restart when [IP REMOTE] is set to [DISABLE]. The IP connection mode is canceled after the camera is started.

Connection settings for the streaming function

You can perform live streaming of audio and video from the camera over the network (wired LAN, wireless LAN, 4G/LTE).

Streaming can be performed through an application software (e.g. P2 Browser, P2 Streaming Receiver) of a device connected to the camera through a network, or through a server that is capable of receiving streaming video sent from the camera.

There are two ways to start streaming: streaming from an application software and streaming from the camera. This section describes the camera's network connection method for each method.

For the procedures on using the streaming function, refer to "Using the streaming function" (page 93).



To display the streaming video in the P2 Browser, start the streaming distribution by operation from the application software. The streaming video cannot be displayed when operated from the camera.

Setting when starting streaming through operation from an application software

1 Set the connection method when connecting the camera to a network.

Select [WLAN], [4G/LTE], or [LAN] in the main menu \rightarrow [NETWORK SETUP] \rightarrow [NETWORK SEL]. For details on each connection method, refer to "Wireless LAN settings" (page 185) and "Wired LAN settings" (page 187).



• [4G/LTE] is disabled when connecting to the P2 Browser.

Setting when starting streaming through operation from the camera

There are two ways to configure the network settings on the camera: configuring the settings from the camera menu or using the settings contained in the SD memory card.

Configuring the settings from the camera

The followings are the steps to configure the settings from the camera menu.

1 Set the connection method when connecting the camera to a network.

Select [WLAN], [4G/LTE], or [LAN] in the main menu \rightarrow [NETWORK SETUP] \rightarrow [NETWORK SEL]. For details on each connection method, refer to "Wireless LAN settings" (page 185) and "Wired LAN settings" (page 187).

2 Configure the network settings of the camera.

1) Select [INTERNAL] in the main menu \rightarrow [NETWORK SETUP] \rightarrow [STREAMING SETTING] \rightarrow [SETTING DATA]

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2) Configure each item by matching the connection destinations in the main menu → [NETWORK SETUP] → [STREAMING SETTING]. [SERVER ADDR.]: Sets the IP address of the connection destination. [RTSP PORT]: Sets the RTSP port number of the connection destination.



• You can save the details you set in Step 2 into an SD memory card by using the steps below. Insert the SD memory card and select [SAVE (SD CARD)] in the main menu → [NETWORK SETUP] → [STREAMING SETTING].

Configuring the settings by directly referring to the settings contained in the SD memory card

Configure the settings by directly referring to the settings contained in the SD memory card without saving it in the camera.

First, insert the SD memory card that contains the settings, then turn on the power of the camera.

1 Set the connection method when connecting the camera to a network.

Select [WLAN], [4G/LTE], or [LAN] in the main menu \rightarrow [NETWORK SETUP] \rightarrow [NETWORK SEL]. For details on each connection method, refer to "Wireless LAN settings" (page 185) and "Wired LAN settings" (page 187).

2 Configure the network settings of the camera.

Select [SD CARD] in the main menu → [NETWORK SETUP] → [STREAMING SETTING] → [SETTING DATA].



- The setting value of the SD memory card can be saved in following method.
- Select [SAVE (SD CARD)] in the main menu → [NETWORK SETUP] → [STREAMING SETTING].

Configuring the settings after saving the settings contained in the SD memory card to the camera

Configure the settings after saving the settings contained in the SD memory card to the camera.

1 Set the connection method when connecting the camera to a network.

Select [WLAN], [4G/LTE], or [LAN] in the main menu \rightarrow [NETWORK SETUP] \rightarrow [NETWORK SEL]. For details on each connection method, refer to "Wireless LAN settings" (page 185) and "Wired LAN settings" (page 187) before configuring the settings.

2 Configure the network settings of the camera.

- 1) Select [INTERNAL] in the main menu → [NETWORK SETUP] → [STREAMING SETTING] → [SETTING DATA].
- 2) Insert the SD memory card which contains the settings and select [LOAD (SD CARD)] in the main menu → [NETWORK SETUP] → [STREAMING SETTING].

Using FTP client function

To use the FTP client function, network configuration and FTP client settings are necessary in advance.

FTP client function setting

By connecting the camera to network using wireless LAN (wireless access point connection),4G/LTE, or wired LAN, you can transfer clips to a server device on the network.

Client settings

To transfer clips with the FTP client function, you need to set the connection destination and other settings in advance.

1 Set each item in the main menu \rightarrow [NETWORK SETUP] \rightarrow [FTP CLIENT SERVICE].

[SETTING DATA]: Sets from where client service settings are acquired.

- [INTERNAL]: Uses the settings set on the camera.
- [SD CARD]: Uses the settings of the file inside the SD memory card inserted in the SD card slot. When this item is set to [SD CARD], insert an SD memory card before turning on the power of the camera.

[SERVER URL]: Sets the name or address of the server to connect to. (Up to 500 characters)

[LOGIN USER]: Sets the user ID to connect to. (Up to 31 characters)

[LOGIN PASSWORD]: Sets the password to connect to. (Up to 15 characters) The set password cannot be displayed on the unit.

[SSH]: Sets when transferring files using SSH. ([ENABLE]: Uses SSH/[DISABLE]: Does not use SSH)

[SSH PORT]: Sets the port number when the SSH is used. Set the same number as the server.



- The FTP client function does not function when [WLAN] is set in the main menu \rightarrow [NETWORK SETUP] \rightarrow [NETWORK SEL], and [DIRECT] is set in the main menu \rightarrow [NETWORK SETUP] \rightarrow [WIRELESS PROPERTY] \rightarrow [TYPE].
- The setting value of the SD memory card can be saved in following method.
- Select [SAVE (SD CARD)] in the main menu \rightarrow [NETWORK SETUP] \rightarrow [FTP CLIENT SERVICE].

Saving client service settings in the SD memory card

 $\textbf{1} \ \, \text{Select [SAVE (SD CARD)] in the main menu} \rightarrow \text{[NETWORK SETUP]} \rightarrow \text{[FTP CLIENT SERVICE]}.$

The setting values of [SERVER URL], [LOGIN USER], [LOGIN PASSWORD], [SSH], and [SSH PORT] of the main menu \rightarrow [NETWORK SETUP] \rightarrow [FTP CLIENT SERVICE] are saved in the SD memory card.

Loading the client service settings from the SD memory card

1 Select [LOAD (SD CARD)] in the main menu → [NETWORK SETUP] → [FTP CLIENT SERVICE].

The client service settings loaded from the SD memory card are reflected on the settings of the camera.

Operation check tools, status indication, and initialization

You can check FTP client network connection status as follows.

- Checking connection (PING)
- 1 Press the <THUMBNAIL> button.

The thumbnail screen is displayed.

- $\label{eq:select_pind} 2 \text{ Select [PING] in the main menu} \rightarrow \text{[NETWORK SETUP]} \rightarrow \text{[NETWORK TOOLS]}.$
- 3 Press the control stick.
- 4 Perform status check of the connection with the address that has been set.

When a connection is confirmed, [PING SUCCESSFUL!] appears.

If a connection cannot be established within approximately 30 seconds, [PING FAILED!] is displayed. The log may indicate the cause of the failure.

- Displaying the connection log (LOG)
- 1 Select [LOG DISPLAY] in the main menu → [NETWORK SETUP] → [NETWORK TOOLS].
- 2 Press the control stick.

The log appears.

3 After checking the log, press the <EXIT> button.

The setting menu screen returns.



- Some operations may not generate any information in the log.
- The password is indicated as [*] in the log.
- Displaying the status
- 1 Select [STATUS DISPLAY] in the main menu → [NETWORK SETUP] → [NETWORK TOOLS].

2 Press the control stick.

The connection status is displayed.

3 After checking the log, press the <EXIT> button.

The setting menu screen returns.



- · The status information is not updated in real-time. To view the most recent data, perform the procedure again.
- If [ENABLE] is set in the main menu → [NETWORK SETUP] → [LAN PROPERTY] → [DHCP], or in the main menu → [NETWORK SETUP] → [WIRELESS PROPERTY] → [DHCP], IP address and other necessary information are assigned automatically. However, the status information is not displayed correctly while the address information is being obtained.
- · The default gateway is displayed as status information only when correctly set up.
- · If only [SECONDARY DNS] is set without setting [PRIMARY DNS] for the network setting (wireless LAN, wired LAN), [DNS1] is displayed.
- Initializing network settings
- **1** Select [INITIALIZE] in the main menu \rightarrow [NETWORK SETUP] \rightarrow [NETWORK TOOLS].
- 2 Press the control stick.

When initialization completes, the setting menu screen returns.

FTP server folder list (FTP explorer screen)

The information and subfolder list of folders in the FTP server can be displayed. You can also display the thumbnail list of a desired CONTENTS folder (folder storing clips of P2 card).

1 Press the <THUMBNAIL> button.

The thumbnail screen is displayed.

- $2 \text{ Select [FTP] in the main menu} \rightarrow \text{[CLIP]} \rightarrow \text{[EXPLORE]}.$
- 3 Press the control stick.

The FTP explorer screen appears.

FTP explorer screen



1 Status indication

Indicates that the screen is the FTP explorer screen.

2 FTP server information

[URL]: The address of the connected FTP server

[USER ID]: ID of the user who has logged in

[SSH]: [ENABLE]/[DISABLE] indication of [SSH]

3 Media status

Indicates the P2 card insertion status, hard disk connection status, type, and network connection status.

For the indicators of media status, refer to "Status displays for card slot, storage device, and network connection" (page 114).



• The display of the network status indicator is updated a few seconds behind the actual state.

4 Folder information

[PATH]: The path of the current folder on the FTP server

[NO.]: Folder number

[FOLDER NAME]: Folder name

[DATE]: Date of last update

[TIME]: Time of last update

NOTE

- The folder list displays only folders, and does not display ordinary files or link files.
- [.] indicates the current folder. No date and time information is displayed.
- The date and time information displays either local time or world standard time, which depends on the information from the FTP server. In some cases, only the year or time is displayed.
- · Whether text is case sensitive or not depends on the FTP server.

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- · Folder names using multi-byte characters are not displayed correctly.
- Up to 100 folders can be displayed in one folder. The 101st folder and subsequent folders cannot be accessed from the FTP explorer screen. However, if you have directly entered the folder name in the main menu → [NETWORK SETUP] → [FTP CLIENT SERVICE] → [SERVER URL], you can access the folder even when it is the 101st or later.
- · Connectivity and folder appearance may differ from those when connected to an FTP server with a computer, etc.
- · Depending on the FTP server and the connection environment, error messages may not be displayed correctly.
- To discontinue the connection procedure, press the control stick.
- If an error occurs, perform the operation again.
- An error may occur when a network operation is performed immediately after inserting a LAN cable or connecting via wireless LAN, or when an
 operation is performed again immediately after cancelling the previous operation.
- If connection error persists after attempting several times, check the main menu \rightarrow [NETWORK SETUP] \rightarrow [NETWORK TOOLS] \rightarrow [PING]. Note that connection to FTP may succeed even when [PING] fails. If connection cannot be established even after checking with PING, consult your system administrator in charge of your network environment.
- · When [PING] fails, check the following items.
- Network configuration is correct
- LAN cable is correctly inserted
- Hubs and routers in the path operates normally
- · When connection is not established even after [PING] has succeeded, check the following items.
- Server function services of the FTP server are running
- There is not a firewall in the communication path
- User ID and password that permits access to the FTP server have been set
- · Some on-screen operations may not be possible for a while after the use of FTP client function has been cancelled.

Control stick operation on the FTP explorer screen

Pushing rightward: Contents of the subfolder at the cursor position are displayed.

Pushing leftward: Contents of higher-level folder to the current folder are displayed.

Pushing upward/downward: The cursor is moved.

Pushing upward/downward while holding down the <SHIFT> button: The cursor is moved to the top/bottom folder on the list.



- · Depending on server operating specifications or access rights setting, folder contents or folder path may not be displayed correctly.
- The cursor position of the previous folder is stored. If an error occurs, the cursor position will be reset to the top folder.
- If a thumbnail has been displayed, only the cursor position in the previously displayed folder list will be stored.

FTP thumbnail screen



1 FTP server/folder information

[URL]: The address of the connected FTP server

[USER ID]: ID of the user who has logged in

[SSH]: [ENABLE]/[DISABLE] indication of the main menu \rightarrow [NETWORK SETUP] \rightarrow [FTP CLIENT SERVICE] \rightarrow [SSH]

[PATH]: Path in the FTP server of the folder where currently displayed thumbnails are contained

[DATE]: Date of last update [TIME]: Time of last update



- When a proxy recording clip is displayed on the FTP explorer screen, [P.only] is displayed on the thumbnail. This is displayed only on proxy clips to indicate that the main recording video and audio data are not included.
- Press the <EXIT> button to return to the explorer screen.
- The 1001st clip and subsequent clips cannot be displayed.
- The date and time information displays either local time or world standard time, which depends on the information from the FTP server.
- ${}^{\:\raisebox{3.5pt}{\text{\circle*{1.5}}}}$ Opening thumbnails using [.] will not display the date and time of the folder.

Deleting clips on the FTP server

Clips on the FTP server that are no longer necessary can be deleted in the same way as clips on P2 cards.

For details, refer to "Deleting clips" (page 120).



• If you leave the FTP thumbnail screen displayed, the FTP server may be disconnected after a while. After the server has been disconnected, clips cannot be deleted. In this case, return to the FTP explorer screen, display the FTP thumbnail screen again, and then delete clips.

Viewing information of clips on FTP server

You can view metadata of clips on the FTP server.

The information and the procedure to display are the same as that of P2 card clip properties.

1 Move the cursor to the target clip on the FTP thumbnail screen.

The detailed information of a clip can be displayed and checked on the screen.

- ${f 2}$ Select [CLIP PROPERTY] in the main menu ightarrow [CLIP] ightarrow [PROPERTY].
- 3 Press the control stick.



- · Metadata can be viewed but cannot be edited.
- If you leave the FTP thumbnail screen or clip properties displayed, the FTP server may be disconnected after a while. After the server has been disconnected, thumbnails may not be able to be displayed. In this case, return to the FTP explorer screen and display the FTP thumbnail screen again.

Transferring from a P2 card to an FTP server (copy)

Clips on P2 cards can be transferred to the FTP server.

1 Press the <THUMBNAIL> button.

The thumbnail screen is displayed.

- 2 Select a clip to be transferred.
- $\textbf{3} \ \, \textbf{Select [FTP] in the main menu} \rightarrow \textbf{[CLIP]} \rightarrow \textbf{[COPY]}.$

If you copy only proxy recording, select [FTP(PROXY)] in the main menu \rightarrow [CLIP] \rightarrow [COPY].

4 Press the control stick.

The folders of FTP server are displayed.

5 Select the transfer destination folder using the control stick.

Press the control stick while pressing the <SHIFT> button (<MULTI SEL>) to create a new folder in the current folder list. Numbers that indicate date and time are automatically entered as the name of the new folder. You can also use the software keyboard to set the folder name. However, some characters cannot be used depending on the FTP server. You cannot set a folder name that is same as an existing folder.

6 Move the cursor to [YES] and press the control stick.

Copving starts.

For the procedure to import by clips, refer to "Copying clips" (page 121).

When copying is completed, [COPY COMPLETED!] appears.



- · When a proxy recording clip recorded in the following conditions has been transferred to the FTP server, it is displayed as a divided clip on the server.
- A clip recorded over the continuous recording time in a memory card
- A clip recorded across multiple memory cards
- A clip recorded with one-clip recording
- · Folder names using multi-byte characters are not displayed correctly.
- · Depending on the number of clips on the server and network conditions, it may take some time to display thumbnails or to copy them.
- To cancel the copy process, use the control stick to place the cursor on [CANCEL] and press the control stick. Select [YES] when a [CANCEL] confirmation message appears, and then press the control stick. If the network has not been disconnected, the partially copied clips at the copy destination are deleted. If the network has been disconnected, incomplete clips may remain on the FTP server.
- Cancelling the copy process may not be possible depending on the network status. In this case, turn <OFF> the camera's power switch to interrupt the copy process.
- · After copying starts, disconnection errors will no longer be detected. Cancel the copy operation if the copying progress has stalled.
- Contact your FTP server administrator for the amount of free space on the FTP server in advance, as it cannot be checked automatically before copying starts.
- Whether an error is generated when the remaining capacity of the FTP server reaches 0 depends on the FTP server. If an error is not generated, cancel the copy operation.
- \cdot Clips cannot be copied to an FTP server destination folder that contains more than 1000 clips.
- To transfer clips using SSH, the FTP server must support SSH.
- Using SSH will reduce the transfer speed.
- To check the transfer result on a computer or another device, refreshing the display on the computer or another device may be necessary.

Writing back from an FTP server to a P2 card (copy)

You can write back the selected clips from an FTP server on the network to a P2 card.

- 1 Display the FTP thumbnail screen
- 2 Select a clip to be copied.
- **3** Select one from [SLOT 1]/[SLOT 2]/[SLOT 3] in the main menu \rightarrow [CLIP] \rightarrow [COPY].

4 Press the control stick.

Copying starts.

When copying is completed, [COPY COMPLETED!] appears.



- Only clips that include audio and video of the main recording can be written back to the P2 card from the FTP server. Only proxy recording clips cannot be written back to the P2 card from the FTP server. (An error message [UNKNOWN CONTENTS FORMAT!] is displayed.)
- · Writing back only proxy clips can be performed to an SD memory card.

Refer to "Writing back from an FTP server to an SD memory card (import)" (page 197) for the writing back procedure.

You cannot use only proxy recording clips that do not include video and audio of the main recording for normal usage such as playback and metadata editing.

- · Depending on the number of clips on the server and network conditions, it may take some time to display thumbnails or to copy them.
- To cancel the copy process, use the control stick to place the cursor on [CANCEL] and press the control stick. Select [YES] when a [CANCEL] confirmation message appears, and then press the control stick. Clips copied halfway to the copy destination are deleted.
- · After copying starts, disconnection errors will no longer be detected. Cancel the copy operation if the copying progress has stalled.
- · Clips cannot be copied to the copy destination P2 card folder that contains more than 1000 clips.
- · To transfer clips using SSH, the FTP server must support SSH.
- · Using SSH will reduce the transfer speed.
- After an error occurred during an operation such as copying, the FTP server may be disconnected and the operation can no longer be continued. In this case, return to the FTP explorer screen, display the FTP thumbnail screen again, and then restart the copying or another operation.

Transferring from an SD card to an FTP server (export)

You can collectively transfer the data in an SD memory card to the FTP server.

1 Press the <THUMBNAIL> button.

The thumbnail screen is displayed.

- **2** Select [SD CARD] in the main menu \rightarrow [CLIP] \rightarrow [EXPORT].
- 3 Press the control stick.

The folders of FTP server are displayed.

4 Select the transfer destination folder using the control stick.

Press the control stick while pressing the <SHIFT> button (<MULTI SEL>) to create a new folder in the current folder list. Numbers that indicate date and time are automatically entered as the name of the new folder. You can also use the software keyboard to set the folder name. However, some characters cannot be used depending on the FTP server. You cannot set a folder name that is same as an existing folder.

5 Move the cursor to [YES] and press the control stick.

Exporting starts.

When exporting is completed, [COPY COMPLETED!] appears.



- · You cannot select clips to be exported.
- · Folder names using multi-byte characters are not displayed correctly.
- · Depending on factors such as the number of files, file sizes, and network conditions, exporting may take time.
- To cancel the export process, press the control stick. Select [YES] when a [CANCEL] confirmation message appears, and then press the control stick. If the network has not been disconnected, the partially exported files remaining on the FTP server are deleted. If the network has been disconnected, incomplete files may remain on the FTP server.
- · After exporting starts, disconnection errors will no longer be detected. Cancel the export operation if the copying progress has stalled.
- Contact your FTP server administrator for the amount of free space on the FTP server in advance, as it cannot be checked automatically before exporting starts.
- Whether an error is generated when the remaining capacity of the FTP server reaches 0 depends on the FTP server. If an error is not generated, cancel the export operation.
- If existing folders are selected and a file that has the same path name as data in the SD memory card is included in the selected folders, the file is overwritten. However, if the path names are the same but the types differ (folder and file), an error is generated.
- To prevent unintended overwriting, create new folders to export data whenever possible.
- To transfer clips using SSH, the FTP server must support SSH.
- Using SSH will reduce the transfer speed.

Writing back from an FTP server to an SD memory card (import)

You can write back the selected folders from an FTP server on the network to an SD memory card.

1 Display the FTP explorer screen.

The folders of the server that has been set are displayed.

- 2 Select folders to be written back.
- $\boldsymbol{3}$ Select [SD CARD] in the main menu \rightarrow [CLIP] \rightarrow [IMPORT].

4 Press the control stick.

A confirmation message appears. Select [OK] to start writing back to the SD memory card. When writing back is completed, [COPY COMPLETED!] appears.

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- To cancel the writing back process, press the control stick. Select [YES] when a [CANCEL] confirmation message appears, and then press the control stick. Files partially written back in the SD memory card are deleted, but successfully written files remain.
- · After writing starts, disconnection errors will no longer be detected. Cancel the import operation if the copying progress has stalled.
- Depending on factors such as the number or sizes of files in the selected folder, and network conditions, writing back may take time.
- Any files with the same path names as the one in the SD memory card will be overwritten. However, if the path names are the same but the types differ (folder and file), an error is generated.
- To prevent unintended overwriting, format the SD memory card before writing back whenever possible.
- ${}^{\raisebox{3.5pt}{\text{\circle*{1.5}}}}$ To transfer clips using SSH, the FTP server must support SSH.
- · Using SSH will reduce the transfer speed.

Rec during upload function

Clips recorded in the P2 card can be automatically transferred to a server device on the network during recording/playback with the camera.

The rec during upload function has the following two modes:

- · Automatic transfer mode: After the rec during upload function is enabled, uploads recorded clips in order.
- Manual selection mode: Uploads clips selected beforehand.

To use the rec during upload function, network settings and FTP client settings need to be configured beforehand.

Transferring recorded clips automatically (automatic transfer mode)

- 1 Establish the network connection between the camera and a server device.
 - Refer to "FTP client function setting" (page 193) for the settings.
- $\textbf{2} \text{ Set the camera's main menu} \rightarrow \text{[NETWORK SETUP]} \rightarrow \text{[FTP CLIENT SERVICE]} \rightarrow \text{[REC DURING UPLOAD] to [ENABLE]}.$
- f 3 Select the type of clip to upload in the camera's main menu o [NETWORK SETUP] o [FTP CLIENT SERVICE] o [AUTO COPY].

[REC CLIP(PROXY)]: Upload target is proxy data of recorded clips.

[REC CLIP]: Upload target is recorded clips (main recording data and proxy data).

[DISABLE]: Recorded clips are not upload targets.

4 Shoot.

Clips are registered in the upload list immediately after recording is stopped, and then recorded clips are automatically transferred.

The viewfinder or LCD monitor shows the operation status of the rec during upload function. In addition, the thumbnail screen shows the operation status of the rec during upload function and the transfer status of clips.



- Uploading of the clip will start after the rec during upload function is enabled. To prevent the upload error, do not remove the card from the P2 memory card slot and the microP2 memory card slot before upload is complete.
- Up to 100 clips can be registered in the upload list for the upload of clips. Clips exceeding 100, excluding the uploaded clips and clips failed to upload cannot be registered.
- While recording is stopped, you can add recorded clips to transfer. From the thumbnail screen, select the main menu \rightarrow [CLIP] \rightarrow [COPY] \rightarrow [FTP] or [FTP(PROXY)], and then select clips to transfer. The selected clips are registered in the upload list.
- · Clips are also automatically transferred during recording, playback, and thumbnail display.
- The dividing unit of the recording files will become smaller allowing to make the timing to start the clip transfer earlier while recording when [SHORT SPLIT] is selected in the main menu → [RECORDING SETUP] → [FILE SPLIT] while the rec during upload function is used.
- If the network is disconnected during transfer, or the power of the camera is turned off and on again, transfer resumes in clip units.
- During background recording and simultaneous recording, only recorded clips in slot 1 are automatically transferred.
- · Clips of interval recording, loop recording, one-clip recording, and one-shot recording are not automatically transferred.
- · While the rec during upload function is enabled, the last clip delete function is disabled.
- · While the rec during upload function is enabled, the streaming function is disabled.
- The directory on the FTP server is not listed in the FTP explorer screen during the transmission or waiting to transmit the clips registered in the upload list.
- $\bullet \text{ While the rec during upload function is enabled, the setting values in the main menu} \rightarrow \text{[NETWORK SETUP] cannot be changed or initialized.}$
- The copying between the P2 cards will not operate during the transmission or waiting to transmit the clips registered in the upload list.
- The clip delete function will not operate during the transmission or waiting to transmit the clips registered in the upload list.
- The format function of the P2 card will not operate during the transmission or waiting to transmit the clips registered in the upload list.

Transferring selected clips automatically (manual selection mode)



- **1** Establish the network connection between the camera and a server device. Refer to "FTP client function setting" (page 193) for the settings.
- f 2 Set the camera's main menu ightarrow [NETWORK SETUP] ightarrow [FTP CLIENT SERVICE] ightarrow [REC DURING UPLOAD] to [ENABLE].
- $\textbf{3} \hspace{0.1cm} \textbf{Set the camera's main menu} \rightarrow \textbf{[NETWORK SETUP]} \rightarrow \textbf{[FTP CLIENT SERVICE]} \rightarrow \textbf{[AUTO COPY] to [DISABLE]}.$

4 From the thumbnail screen, select the main menu → [CLIP] → [COPY] → [FTP] or [FTP(PROXY)], and then select clips to transfer. (Fig. 1)

Selected clips are registered in the upload list, and transferred automatically.

You can check the transfer status of clips registered in the upload list in the main menu \rightarrow [NETWORK SETUP] \rightarrow [FTP CLIENT SERVICE] \rightarrow [UPLOAD LIST].

The viewfinder or LCD monitor shows the operation status of the rec during upload function. In addition, the thumbnail screen shows the operation status of the rec during upload function and the transfer status of clips.

NOTE NOTE

- The clips selected with the manual selection mode will be transferred prioritized to the clips registered to the upload list with the automatic transfer mode.
- Uploading of the clip will start after the rec during upload function is enabled. To prevent the upload error, do not remove the card from the P2 memory card slot and the microP2 memory card slot before upload is complete.
- Up to 100 clips can be registered in the upload list for the upload of clips. Clips exceeding 100, excluding the uploaded clips and clips failed to upload cannot be registered.
- · Clips are also automatically transferred during recording, playback, and thumbnail display.
- The dividing unit of the recording files will become smaller allowing to make the timing to start the clip transfer earlier while recording when [SHORT SPLIT] is selected in the main menu → [RECORDING SETUP] → [FILE SPLIT] while the rec during upload function is used.
- If the network is disconnected during transfer, or the power of the camera is turned off and on again, transfer resumes in clip units.
- · While the rec during upload function is enabled, the last clip delete function is disabled.
- While the rec during upload function is enabled, the streaming function is disabled.
- The directory on the FTP server is not listed in the FTP explorer screen during the transmission or waiting to transmit the clips registered in the upload list
- While the rec during upload function is enabled, the setting values in the main menu → [NETWORK SETUP] cannot be changed or initialized.
- The copying between the P2 cards will not operate during the transmission or waiting to transmit the clips registered in the upload list.
- The clip delete function will not operate during the transmission or waiting to transmit the clips registered in the upload list.
- · The format function of the P2 card will not operate during the transmission or waiting to transmit the clips registered in the upload list.

Displaying the upload list

The upload list allows you to check the transfer status of clips to be uploaded.

1 Select the main menu \rightarrow [NETWORK SETUP] \rightarrow [FTP CLIENT SERVICE] \rightarrow [UPLOAD LIST].

The upload list is displayed.

Upload list screen



1 [CLIP NAME]

Displays clip names. For the clip where automatic transfer is set, [AUTO] is displayed after the clip name.

2 [STATUS]

Displays the upload status.
[OK]: Uploaded
[ERROR]: Upload failed
[PAUSE]: Preparing the upload
[COPY]: Uploading
[WAIT]: Waiting for upload

3 [SIZE]

Displays the file size.

4 [LAST UPDATE]

Displays the date and time when the [STATUS] display changed.

Operations on the upload list screen

You can delete, cancel, or re-transfer items from the upload list.

1 Select an item from the upload list.

2 Perform one of the following operations.

- To delete an item, select [DELETE] with the control stick.
- To cancel upload, select [CANCEL] with the control stick.

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- To re-transfer an item, select [RETRY] with the control stick.
- To delete all items, press the <SHIFT> button and the <RESET> button simultaneously. When the confirmation screen is displayed, select [YES] using the control stick. The current log of the clip information registered to the upload list will also be deleted at this time.
- To delete history (items of which [STATUS] is [OK] or [ERROR]), press the <SHIFT> button and <EXIT> button at the same time. When the confirmation screen is displayed, select [YES] using the control stick.



- · If the [STATUS] display changes while displaying the upload list, the screen is not updated.
- Save up to the latest 1000 logs for clip information (month and date, clip number (global clip ID), status) registered in the upload list to an SD memory card.



Maintenance of the camera or frequently asked questions are described.

Frequently asked questions

Power supply

- What is the range of voltage supported by the attached AC adaptor?
- AC 100 V 240 V
- Can I use the AC adaptor with the battery attached?
- Yes, you can. When you connect the AC adaptor with the battery attached (and the power is turned on), the power supply source will be switched to the AC adaptor.

Battery

■ Can I use the battery of a previous model that I have been using?

- You can use the battery of P2 hand-held camera recorder of previous models (CGA-D54/CGA-D54s).
- · Using the genuine Panasonic battery is recommended.

Can I use the attached battery with charge level indicator with a P2 camera recorder of previous model?

You cannot use the attached battery with a device other than this camera.

Shooting

■ The focus is not adjusted automatically.

- Is manual focus mode set? The focus will be adjusted automatically by setting auto focus mode.
- Do you perform shooting in an environment where focus may not be adjusted properly in auto focus mode? In some environment, auto focus function
 cannot adjust the focus correctly. In such cases, adjust the focus in manual focus mode.

Under following conditions, focus may not be adjusted properly:

- Shooting subjects that is in long and short distances at the same time
- Shooting a subject through a dirty glass
- Shooting in a dark place
- With a glittering object nearby
- Shooting a fast-moving subject
- Shooting a low contrast subject

■ Shooting cannot be performed even when the microP2 memory card or P2 memory card is inserted correctly.

- Recording cannot be performed when the write protect switch on the P2 memory card is at the PROTECT position.
- Recording cannot be performed when the write protect switch on the microP2 memory card is at the LOCK position.
- If the remaining free space of the P2 card is extremely small, save the contents to another medium and delete them, or insert a new card.
- If the P2 card is in a format that cannot be used, reformat the card on the camera.
- Is it a 2 GB P2 memory card? If so, the media information display shows [E] and the card cannot be used.
- Does the number of clips exceed 1000? Clips over 1000 cannot be recorded in a single P2 card. Recording in the one-clip recording mode creates
 combined clips with multiple clips included. Even when the thumbnail screen shows smaller number of clips, the actual number of clips may be 1000.

Loop recording cannot be performed.

· Loop recording can only be performed on the microP2 memory card slot. Also, two cards with at least one minute of free space must be inserted.

Editing

Computer (Windows/Mac) cannot be connected via USB. (The computer does not recognize the camera.)

- Is USB host mode set? The USB host mode is a mode to connect a hard disk to the camera. Set [DEVICE] in the main menu → [NETWORK SETUP] → [USB MODE SELECT].
- Is the USB driver installed? (Windows)

Download and install the latest USB driver. For Mac, installation of a USB driver for the camera is not necessary.

- Clips imported to computer or external hard disk drive cannot be recognized on application such as P2 Viewer Plus.
- Check if the clips are correctly saved in the file structure of the P2 system (folders and data contained in the CONTENTS folder).
- If clips in the CONTENTS folder or subfolders are renamed or saved as divided data, the clips may not be able to played back.

Playback

Hot swap playback cannot be performed.

• This camera does not support hot swap playback.

Clip copying cannot be performed.

• Clips cannot be copied when they are continuously linked in one-clip recording mode. Press the REC button for two seconds and release the clip linking.

Others

■ SD memory card is not recognized.

• Is the SD memory card is formatted properly? Format the card on the camera.

■ The camera clatters when tilted forward/backward.

• When the power switch is <OFF>, the camera may clatter due to the camera part mechanism. This is not a malfunction.

■ A short click sound occurs when the power is turned on.

• This is an initial operation of the startup of the lens of the camera recorder. This is due to the camera recorder mechanism and is not a malfunction.

■ Which lens filter can be attached?

• You can attach filters with 72 mm diameter that are common for broadcasting or professional use.

■ Can I use the wired remote controls that I have used with the AG-HPX170 series and AG-HPX250 series?

• You can basically use them as the control method is the same on the AG-HPX170 series and AG-HPX250 series. If they do not work, contact the manufacturer of the wired remote control.

Warning system

If an error is detected immediately after the camera is turned on or during operation, the viewfinder, LCD monitor, and tally lamp indicate the error. Deal with the error by following the indications.

Cleaning and storing

Cleaning the camera recorder

- Either remove the battery or disconnect the AC cable from the power outlet before cleaning.
- Do not use benzine or thinner to clean the camera. Using benzine or thinner may cause deformation or peeling off of the paint of the camera recorder body.
- Wipe the camera recorder with a soft and clean cloth. If there is heavy dirt attached, wipe the camera recorder using a cloth soaked in kitchen detergent diluted with water, and then wipe it with a dry cloth.

Cautions when storing the camera recorder

Remove the battery when storing the camera recorder. Store them in a place where humidity is low and temperature is relatively constant.

- Recommended temperature: 15 °C to 25 °C (59 °F to 77 °F)
- Recommended relative humidity: 40% to 60%

Camera recorder

• Wrap the camera recorder with a soft cloth so that dust does not get into it.

■ Battery

- The battery life shortens where the temperature is extremely high or low.
- Storing in a place where there is heavy oil smoke or dust may lead to malfunctions due to rust on terminal connectors, etc.
- Do not let the battery terminal contact a metal object (such as a necklace or hairpin). Short circuit may occur between terminals and it may lead to heat generation. Touching on a heated part may cause severe burns.
- Store the battery with electrically discharged. If you store it for a long period of time, it is recommended that you charge it once a year, use the camera recorder until the battery runs out, and then storing it again.

■ P2 memory card

- If you remove it from the camera recorder, be sure to attach the dedicated cap so that sand and dust do not adhere to the connector part. Also, put it in the dedicated case when storing or carrying it.
- Do not place it in a place where there is corrosive gas.

■ microP2 memory card, SD memory card


